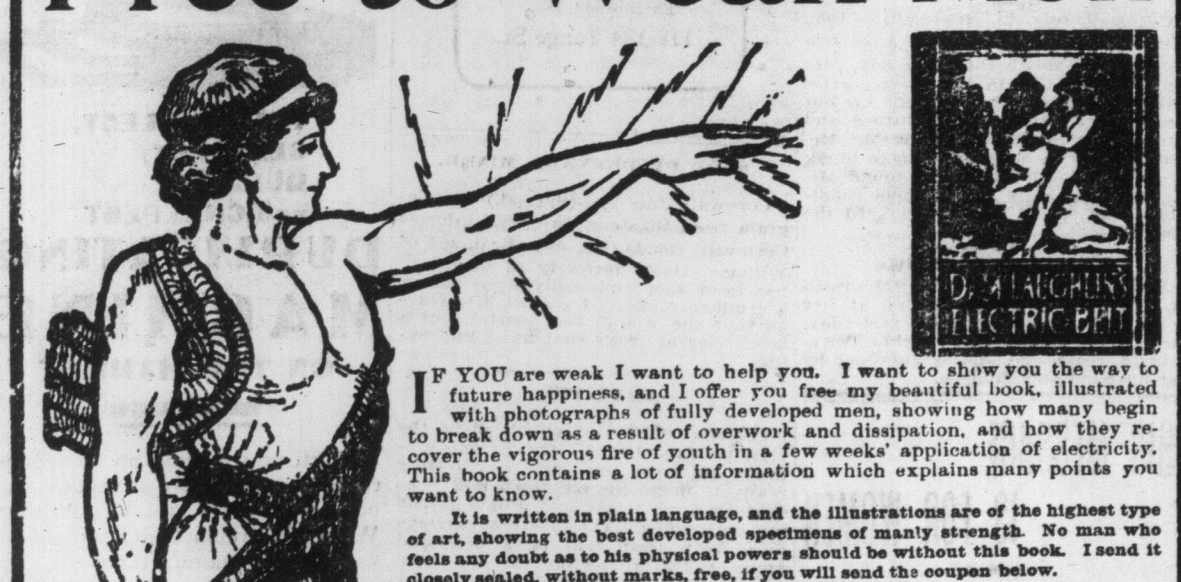

G.M.A. MAKE ARRANGEMENTS.
For Banquet to W. K. George on His Return From England.

WAGE GREATLY REDUCED.
Judge Magee (Gave Down Award of \$14,000 to \$1500).

\$500 SAVES HOCH'S LIFE WHILE IN DEATH'S SHADOW

Woman's Offer to Raise Amount Secured Postponement—Lawyer's Cash a Reprieve.

Chicago, July 28.—Alleged pitiless slayer and swindler of unnumbered women, "Bluebeard," Johann Hoch, was today, by a woman's pity, given a respite of two hours from the hanging, and before the two hours were up had been reprieved for four weeks more. The four weeks were secured, not by pity, but by cold cash. The exact amount of money essential was \$500.

The woman who asked Governor Deussen to reprieve Hoch's sentence on condition that she should raise the money necessary for an appeal of his case to the supreme court was Miss Cora Wilson. Her plan was not to give the money, but simply guarantee to raise it by subscription. The governor did not think her plan certain enough and after two hours' consideration refused to do so.

In the meantime Hoch's attorney succeeded in getting \$500 from an unknown source, and telephoned the governor to that effect. The governor thereupon, it is said, replied that he would reprieve Hoch and would telegraph the sheriff immediately.

State's Attorney Healy announced a few minutes subsequently that the governor had telephoned information of a reprieve for four weeks.

The condemned man slept soundly during the night and arose at his usual hour. For breakfast he refused everything but coffee and rolls. At that time appeared quite cheery and chatted pleasantly with his guards. He has been a model prisoner, and the jail guards have been particularly friendly to him.

STILL STIR UP TROUBLE OVER MOROCCAN MATTERS

Rouvier and Radolin Unable to Get Together on Terms of Conference.

Paris, July 28.—France's relations with Germany are again showing signs of strain owing to the inability of Rouvier and Ambassador Von Radolin to conclude a definite program for the Moroccan conference.

The agreement of July 8 contemplated a joint program, but the disagreement of the program is causing renewed difficulty, particularly in connection with France's right of intervention in Morocco.

It is the French view that the rights follow from the agreement of July 8, whereas Germany does not wish to define the extent of French police and financial reforms.

The indecisive status of the negotiations has caused renewed apprehension on the part of the newspapers and renewed their sharp criticism of Germany's course.

It is expected that the presidential election will be fixed for Jan. 28, 1906, but the government has not yet definitely announced the date owing to constitutional questions being raised.

GOD'S REWARD, SAYS SULTAN.

His Preservation From Bomb Due to Divine Protection.

Constantinople, July 28.—In reply to a Mussulman address of loyalty and gratification at his escape from an assassination by the explosion of a bomb on Friday last, the sultan says that the protection of divine Providence on that occasion was God's reward to him for his constant endeavor to promote the peace and happiness of his people.

The only feature of the incident which deeply affected him was the fact that so many of his dear, devoted soldiers and well-beloved people were killed or injured.

May Be Tested Again.

Bucharest, Roumania, July 28.—A plot against the life of the Sultan of Turkey has been discovered by the authorities of Kustendj. A search of houses occupied by Turks disclosed large quantities of revolvers, rifles, cartridges and compromising documents.

Roumanian officials subsequently discovered a right of passage for a Turkish steamer now at Kustendj.

EXODUS OF CABINET. MORE CHANGES FORECAST. SPINAL MENINGITIS OUTBREAK.

Eleven Cases and Four Deaths in Carleton County. Dr. C. A. Hodgets, secretary of the provincial board of health, has returned from Carleton County, where there is an epidemic of cerebro-spinal meningitis. The physician is attending 11 cases, and four deaths have already occurred.

Dr. Hodgets has taken steps to have the victims isolated, as the disease is contagious under certain conditions. The disease has a considerable mortality, and in Ontario, a whole doctor reports six deaths in one family.

TO RAISE HUGE LOAN.

Stockholm, July 28.—In pursuance of the authorization of parliament, the government has concluded an arrangement with the Swedish National Bank and a syndicate of foreign banks represented by the Commercial Bank of Stockholm, for a loan of 500,000,000 kronor, the whole amount to be placed at the government's disposal within a year from Aug. 1.

Referendum Agreed On.

Christiana, Norway, July 28.—The special committee of the Storting, to which was referred the government's proposal for a referendum on the dissolution of the union with Sweden, has unanimously decided to recommend the acceptance of the proposal.
