

DISTRICT No. 3.—Mr. E. H. Bronson: Richmond Road from the toll gate eastward, Rochesterville, Wellington Street south, and Albert Street north and south, westward from Concession Street.

DISTRICT No. 4 -Mr. G. P. Drummond: Ashburnham Hill, eastward to Bay Street and nothward to Sparks Street.

DISTRICT No. 5.-Mr. Clegg: From Bay Street eastward to Bank Street and northward to Sparks Street.

DISTRICT No. 6.-Mr. Gibson: From Maria Street northward to Sparks Street, and from Bank Street eastward to the Canal.

DISTRICT No. 7.-Mr. Hamilton: From Maria Street southward to Lewis Street, and from Bank Street eastward to the Canal.

DISTRICT No. 8.-Mr. F. H. Chrysler: From Lewis Street southward, and Bank Street eastward to the Rideau River and Billings' Bridge.

DISTRICT No. 9.-Mr. A. Drummond: From Sparks Street northward to the Ottawa River.

DISTRICT No. 10.-Mr. Larmonth: Sandy Hill from Rideau Street southward, and from the Canal eastward to Rideau River.

DISTRICT No. 11. - Lieut. Colonel Macpherson: From Mackenzie Avenue eastward to Rideau River, and from Rideau Street northward, and New Edinburgh.

DISTRICT No. 12.-Mr. Borthwick: Gloucester and Country sections beyond Rideau River.

The brief Reports which follow can do no more than indicate the work of the Church during the past year; yet I am sure you will read them with as much interest, and, perhaps, greater profit than more elaborate statements which, though they might foster congregational egotism, would make us less eager to leave the things that are behind and reach forth unto the things that are before. Statistics have a limited value after all: and I fervently trust therefore, that whatever may appear in these pages, some memorial of our history will find its place also in the records of the Book of Life.

The faithful attendance of most of you at the public services of the Church is a source of much encouragement to me. I cannot help feeling, however, that there are some amongst us who for very trifling reasons absent themselves from the house of God; and while I judge no one, and do not wish to bring any of you here unwillingly, I should like to feel that when you are not in your places, it is not indifference nor neglect of manifest duty which keeps you away. Suffer this word in regard to a matter of which I speak but seldom.

You have had the pleasure of witnessing the good effects of your kindness in making all pews free on Sunday evenings. I am sure you must doubly enjoy the service when you feel that no one, rich or poor, is now—even in appearance—deprived of the privilege of worshipping with you.

I hope that the reminder of our mid-week service will not lose its force by repetition. While I am glad to see so many with us on Wednesday evenings, I still look for further improvement in this regard, and I would affectionately urge you to make some sacrifice, if need be, in order to take part in this hour of prayer and Bible study.

While I must always regard the work of the pulpit as of paramount importance, it has given me much pleasure to make pastoral visits, though necessarily brief ones, through the whole congregation during the year. I cannot hope to repeat this frequently; but to those who

are sick or in any trouble I shall deem it a privilege to minister at all times to the best of my power and opportunity.

Your personal kindness to me has shown itself in many ways during the year, and has greatly cheered me in my labours. I desire to thank you especially for the generous action of the congregation assembled in annual meeting, and also for the cordial resolve to maintain an assistant minister with a view to the still further extention of our work. His appointment has been delayed, pending some negotiations with the Presbytery in regard to the proposed services in Stewarton; but when that matter is settled, as I have no doubt it will be shortly, the Session will lose no time in giving effect to your wishes.

The activity of the various Church organizations during the year has given me fresh impulse for my own special work. I am much gratified with the decision of the Home Missionary Society to support a missionary in the North-west, and I bespeak for them your cordial support.

May God's richest blessing rest upon every home and every heart in this Congregation, and siill more abundantly prosper our united efforts in the common vineyard of the Master.

## REPORT OF THE KIRK SESSION.

It is in a spirit of sincere gratitude to God that the Session desire to present a brief record of the congregational life during the year.

For some time the recent epidemic greatly reduced the numbers at the Sabbath services, but with that exception, they have been extremely well attended. The Session share the pleasure which the whole congregation must feel in welcoming the strangers who in such large numbers join our worship, and they are more than satisfied with the generous action of the pew-holders in declaring the seats free on Sabbath evenings.

The attendance at the Wednesday service still leaves room for improvement, and it is hoped that during the current year a more general effort will be made by members of the congregation to join in this hour of prayer and Bible study.

The Prayer Meetings conducted by the young men and young women on Sabbath morning and Wednesday evening respectively have been maintained with beneficial results throughout the year.

The three Sunday Schools under the care of the Session are in a healthy condition, and the whole Church has reason to be grateful to the earnest labourers in this important department of christian work.

During the year the Ladies' Aid Society, in addition to other useful services, has raised a goodly sum as the nucleus of a building fund for a new Sunday School Hall.

The Home Missionary Society has increased in numbers and liberality, and has decided this year to assume the entire responsibility for the support of a missionary in the North-west.

The thanks of the Session are due to the District Visitors for the valuable aid which they continue to render in pastoral work.

The success of the Institute has been marked, and its programmes uniformly of a high degree of excellence. The Session cordially commend the Institute to the young people of the congregation.

It was with sincere regret that the Session received the resignation of Mr. J. A. Seybold as organist of the Church, owing to business engagements. They take this opportunity of expressing their great

Year by year we have to speak of some who are called away to the higher sanctuary. Among those who since the last report have joined the majority is Mr. H. F. Bronson, one of the oldest and most devoted friends of St. Andrew's Church. His face, with those of many others, will long be missed amongst us.

The Session record with pleasure the increased attendance at the Communion services, the average this year being higher than ever before. The number of names on the Communion Roll at present is 508, after deducting deaths and removals. During the year forty-five new names were added.

While the total amount contributed to the schemes of the Church remains about the same as last year, owing to the falling off in a few large sums, the Session record with pleasure the fact that a larger number have contributed than in any previous year. The allocations are as follows:

## ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

The Annual General Meeting of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, was held in the lecture room of the church this day, Monday, the 3rd day of March, 1890, at the hour of 7.30 p.m.

James Cunningham, President of the Temporal Committee, in the chair.

The meeting was opened with prayer by F. H. Chrysler.

Minutes of the last Annual Meeting, and Special Meetings held on 8th April, 1889, 30th December, 1889, and 10th February, 1890, were read and sustained.

Reports and accounts of Kirk Session, Temporal Committee, Ladies' Aid Society, Schedule Fund Account, St. Andrew's Church Institute and Sabbath Schools were read.

After reading the report of the Kirk Session, Mr. Hamilton read to the meeting the resolution of the Presbytery of Ottawa regarding the holding of church services in Stewarton, and read also the resolution of the Kirk Session of St. Andrew's Church regarding the matter.

It was moved by A. M. Burgess, seconded by F. P. Bronson, that the resolution of the Kirk Session in regard to the action of the Presbytery at its meeting to-day, respecting the appointment of an assistant to the minister of this church, is approved by this meeting.—Carried.

It was moved by F. H. Chrysler, seconded by F. P. Bronson, that the reports and statements which have been presented to this meeting be approved.—Carried.

It was moved by Wm. Hamilton, seconded by E. H. Bronson, that Rev. W. T. Herridge, Jas. Cunningham, Jas. Gibson, P. Larmonth and the mover and seconder be a committee to attend to the printing of the Annual Reports and Statements for distribution to the Congregation.—Carried.

It was moved by F. P. Bronson, seconded by G. L. Orme, that the thanks of this meeting be tendered to the Ladies' Aid Society for their commendable zeal and efficient services during the past year.—Carried.

It was moved by J. B. Halkett, seconded by A. M. Burgess, that the thanks of this meeting be tendered to the Choir for their hearty services, and that this meeting concur with the Session in their expression of regret at the resignation of Mr. J. A. Seybold, as organist.—Carried.

It was moved by G. L. Orme, seconded by F. P. Bronson, that this

meeting is of the opinion that the salary of the minister should be increased to the sum of \$3,500.00 per annum, but on account of the small attendance, do not feel warranted in committing the Congregation to the increase until another General Meeting is held.—Carried.

It was moved by Jas. Gibson, seconded by G. S. May, that the Temporal Committee of the past year be re-elected.—Carried.

The meeting was closed with prayer by Jas. Gibson.

#### REPORT OF THE TEMPORAL COMMITTEE.

To the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church in general meeting assembled:

. In presenting their Report for the past year the Temporal Committee hand herewith a Statement of the Receipts and Disbursements, shewing a balance in hand of \$86.55. This statement has been duly audited, and in reference thereto, it will be noticed that the receipts from pew rents are less than the previous year. It will also be noticed that the arrears of pew rents are still considerable. The liabilities are somewhat reduced, there being at the present time a note of \$500 under discount, instead of \$1,000 at the same time last year. Should these arrears be paid promptly it would enable the Committee to start on the next year with a clean sheet. The receipts from sales of land in Spenceville and interest thereon, amounting to \$822.60 has been absorbed in paying interest on the Church debt. This shews the necessity of some special effort to remodel the income so as to place the finances in a satisfactory condition. The Committee think it right to notice that the Church wants a considerable expenditure, in repairs to the roof and internal renovation, and as special arrangements must be made to meet this contemplated outlay, would recommend their successors to take the matter into their early attention.

The meetings of the Society have been held as usual in the Bible class room, on Friday afternoons at three o'clock, and the Poor Relief Committee in the vestry at half-past two.

The average attendance has been 15; the largest number present at any one meeting having been 27; the smallest 8.

The attention of the Society having been drawn to the necessity of a lecture hall, seperate from the church, has directed all its energies this year towards raising funds for the purpose of assisting in the erection and equipment of such a building. Although the Temporal Committee did not see its way clear to undertake the work last year, and could only recommend to the consideration of the congregation the Society's offer of \$1,000 in three annual payments, the Society has felt that the day was not far distant when it would be called upon to assist in such an undertaking. With this end in view an entertainment called the "Feast of Days," was held on the 22nd, 23rd, 24th, 25th and 26th of last October, the result being most satisfactory, \$677.26 (six hundred and seventy-seven dollars and twenty-six cents) having been realized. The Society takes the opportunity to place on record its appreciation of the valuable aid rendered by the ladies and gentlemen of St. Andrew's and other congregations at the musical entertainments

held during the "Feast of Days," and especially by Miss Denzil, who undertook the direction of the same.

The thanks of the Society are also tendered to the Executive of the Institute for their generous donation, last April, of \$50 (fifty dollars) towards the building fund, and for their kindness in allowing the use of their piano at the various entertainments held in the basement of the church. For the general funds of the Society only one entertainment has so far been given, a "'C' Supper," held on the evening of the 26th of April, realizing the sum of \$53.26 (fifty-three dollars and twenty six cents).

As the usual Christmas sale was not held, and as the ladies had various useful and fancy articles on hand it was decided to offer these for sale on the evening of the "Anniversary Social," January 24th. By doing so the ladies had the pleasure of augmenting the Society's funds by \$31.75 (thirty-one dollars and seventy-five cents).

The whole amount raised from all sources during the year has been \$1078.66 (one thousand and seventy-eight dollars and sixty-six cents). The Society is at present engaged in work for the benefit of the Protestant Hospital, and will shortly present to that Institution two dozen night-shirts and twelve pairs of sheets.

## SECOND ANNUAL REPORT.

# The Home Missionary Society,

NOVEMBER 8TH, 1889.

In presenting this report, we are glad to be able to say that the good work begun in November 1887, has steadily increased, and although our Society is yet young, and our membership small, it has been the means of bringing cheer and substantial aid to several deserving objects.

At the Annual Meeting held on November 9th of last year, the following office-bearers were elected:

Acting on the suggestion of Mr. Herridge, a Council, consisting of five members of the Society, was also elected, and was as follows: Mrs. Peterson, Mrs. A. Gilmour, Mrs. Hutcheson, Miss Smith and Miss Stewart. This Council, with the office bearers, forming the Executive Committee.

Early in the season the wants of the Metis Mission were brought to our notice by one of the members of our Society, who, from personal observation, had seen the struggles and hardships that the pastor there had to contend with in getting around among his scattered congregation and to his preaching stations. Our sympathies were at once enlisted, and \$20, all the funds then on hand, was sent to Rev. Mr. McCarter to help defray the expense of a conveyance, and also some presents for a Christmas Tree for the Sunday School children. This contribution, although trifling, was so gratefully received that the Society felt quite rewarded for its pains.

Our next donation went westward, \$100 to Dr. Jardine, in aid of the Nesbitt Academy, which we had helped last year. We remembered, too, the deserving institution in our midst, The Home for Friendless Women, by sending a donation of \$20.

The Thank Offering Meeting held in April was well attended, and exceedingly interesting. Mr McDowall, member for Prince Albert, addressed the ladies and spoke of the benefit the Nesbitt Academy was to the Protestant part of the community. The thank offerings amounted to \$122.25.

The meetings are held regularly on the second Friday of each month, and we hope that, as the aims and work of the society become better known, the membership will increase.

The Executive are striving to carry out the original ideas embodied in the Constitution, viz., "the religious, social and intellectual improvement of the members," and they have every reason to believe that their labor has not been in vain.

The number of scholars on the roll is 269; an increase of twelve during the year, but the average attendance has been somewhat less than that of last year, namely 161, chiefly on account of the epidemic which visited us in common with the whole country during the autumn and winter. We note an increase in the number of girls, and a decrease in the number of boys. This is accounted for by the fact that it is more difficult to retain boys than girls in the Sabbath School. What we need in order to keep our hold upon the older boys is the assistance of a greater number of earnest, faithful, christian men, who will teach in the Sabbath School, persevering amid all discouragements, teaching, guiding, influencing the boys up to and through the critical period that lies between boyhood and manhood.

A Bible Class for young women, with 33 on the roll, taught by Mrs. Gibson, is an important department of the School. We take this opportunity of reminding the congregation of this class, and of inviting the young women who have not yet joined it, to do so.

Teachers on the roll number twenty-seven,-nineteen ladies and eight gentlemen. During the year, we have lost ten teachers through removal from the city, ill-health and other causes. Their places have been filled so far by seven new teachers:—Mrs. Gillelan, Misses Cuming, Gibson, Hurlburt, McDonald, Wright and Mr. McDonald.

The officers remain as before, except that Mr. W. Macoun has re-

placed Mr. Baine as secretary.

The Sabbath collections are devoted wholly to Missions, and have been allocated as follows:

The Kirk Session as usual granted \$100 for the ordinary expenses of the School. Extra expense will be incurred this year in replenishing the library, and procuring maps, etc.; and a circular authorized by the Session will shortly be issued, asking the congregation for contributions for these purposes.

The General Assembly having inaugurated a scheme of Higher Religious Instruction, and invited the Sabbath Scholars of the Church to enrol themselves as candidates for examination, our school took the matter up, and a number of our pupils are now studying with a view to the examinations to take place on 7th and 8th March. Valuable assistance has been given by Mr. McMinn, in directing the studies of candidates for examination.

The Annual Festival on 21st February proved a source of much

enjoyment to the children.

We have long looked forward to the time when we shall occupy a well planned and equipped modern Sabbath schoolroom, where the more advanced classes can be separated so as not to Interfere with each other. Recent action on the part of the congregation leads us to hope that our long cherished wish will soon be realized.

The Young Women's Prayer Meeting, conducted by teachers and scholars of the school, has been held regularly on Wednesday evenings at a quarter past seven o'clock. The members are encouraged by the attendance and the interest manifested, and cordially invite all young

women of the congregation to join them.

During the year twelve of our scholars have professed their faith in Christ by uniting with the Church in full communion. Our earnest prayer is that year by year we may see the fruit of our labor in the conversion of our scholars, and in their growth in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.
