



The retiring warden, Councillor Hamm thanked the electors for courtesies extended to him and Councillor Dean was sunanimously chosen as his successor.

New York, May 11.—It has been the common opinion that cigarettes and the general use of tobacco and stimulants have caused an increase in mortality. especially amongst students. A writer in the N. Y. 




