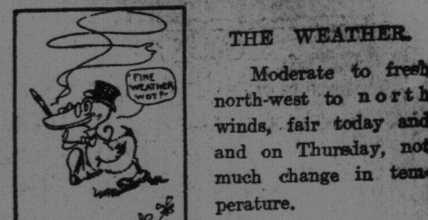

PULP AND PAPER

Replying to Senator Edwards' contention that the pulp and paper making industry will gradually gravitate to Canada, and that meantime we should not check the export of pulp-wood to the States, the Montreal Star remarks:—"If the American paper-making business is coming over to Canada, why should we supply it with wood and wood pulp at home, why should not Canada hasten the date of failure by shutting off the supply from this side of the border?"

There is a very general interest in the meeting this week of the High Court of the Independent Order of Foresters. If the old member who has been insured for a thousand dollars is to find himself after the next session of the Supreme Court insured for only seven or eight hundred, he will naturally be very much disappointed.

Of the Conservative outlook in British Columbia, the Victoria Colonist says: "Mr. Eaton, organizer for the Provincial Conservative Association, after a tour through British Columbia lasting two months, declares that the party is in a splendid state of organization at all points. This confirms a conviction which the Colonist had formed from the numerous reports which had reached it from independent sources and a perusal of its interior exchanges, which pretty accurately reflect public opinion. And the party has every reason to feel in fine fettle. Not only does a Conservative administration enjoy the confidence and esteem of the people of this province to a degree never before accorded a previous government but it is as certain as anything can be that there will be no solid seven from British Columbia, to support the Liberal leader when the ballots have been counted at the approaching general elections."

Another newspaper man, this time from Halifax, has got a government job. After all, the Laurier government has some lucid intervals. It requires some sacrifice, of course, for a man to give up the task of setting the world right and settle down to the routine of a small office, but it must be said that he is not unwilling to suffer for his country. There are still a few of us left. This last remark is not made obtrusively, but for the information of the government.

The statement of the provincial premier yesterday makes it clear that under the new audit act the auditor general will be perfectly independent of the government of the day. This is as it should be, and should have been in years past. With an independent audit there would have been less mystery about the public accounts.

The meeting of the board of trade rooms this evening should be well attended. The Workmen's Compensation Bill will be considered. There is a very generally expressed view that the measure is too drastic in some of its provisions, and those who are of this opinion should be heard.

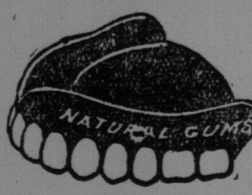

A despatch today from Blackville states that the men are going home today, it being the last of the stream drives. The corporation drive will come along later.

Boiestown reports a good run of logs yesterday and encouraging reports from the drives, the water falling somewhat since yesterday.

The water in the river here has fallen a couple of inches since yesterday Edmundston and Woodstock this morning reported a few new logs running and that the water had fallen a few inches during the night.

The Little River drives are all out, there being about 3 1/2 millions of new stuff and about a million old logs. The Newcastle drive in Queens county consisting of about 1 1/2 millions is also in safe waters.

WANT TO ESTABLISH MANUFACTORY HERE

Manager of Maine Light, Heat and Power Company Writes to Board of Trade.

S. W. Perregine, manager of the Maine Light, Heat and Power Company, of Portland, Maine, has written to the board of trade here, stating that they wish to locate a factory either in New Brunswick or Nova Scotia for the manufacture of gasoline gas machines. They state there has been some demand for the machines from parties in New Brunswick who have seen them in operation, and the price is high, hence the decision to establish a factory in New Brunswick or Nova Scotia. The company desires to hear from some good business men who would be interested in the formation of a company here. The Portland concern will furnish patterns, machines, use of Canadian patents, etc., and give the benefit of their experience.

The secretary of the board of trade has sent a reply, stating that he will lay the communication before the "new industries" committee of the board, and advise later of its action.

POLICE COURT

Hearing Opened in McCann-Trecartin Assault Case and Prisoner Remanded.

James McCann, who was arrested yesterday afternoon by Sergeant Kilpatrick and Patrolman D. Hamm on a charge of assaulting William H. Trecartin, on Monday last, appeared before Judge Ritchie this morning when he pleaded not guilty, and after hearing of evidence was remanded for the present.

The information was that McCann had placed his knee against Trecartin's back, pulled him down on the sidewalk, and then kicked him.
