On motion of the Lieutenant Grand Commander, the minutes of the last annual session, having been printed and distributed, were adopted.

The Sov.: Grand Commander then delivered his annual address as follows:

PEERS AND BRETHREN:

According to the requirements of the constitution, and as a matter of pleasure as well as of duty, we meet at our Grand East to deliberate and to act in the interests of the great branch of Freemasonry committed to our care. Three years have passed since we last met in this city for the purposes for which we have assembled to-day. Availing ourselves of the opportunity provided by our laws to meet elsewhere than at our Grand East, we last year held the Annual Session in St. John, and I feel confident that the experience of that Session will justify the assertion that it is for the benefit of the Rite to vary our places of meeting. Our business in that city was satisfactorily transacted, while it was manifested beyond any doubt that our brethren in New Brunswick were very much gratified at the opportunity afforded them of meeting members of the Supreme Council from other parts of our Jurisdiction, and of making the personal acquaintance of brothers known to them by name only. am able to say of personal knowledge that the meeting of the Supreme Council in that City had a most excellent influence, not alone for the benefit of the Rite, but for all the branches of the fraternity. It is a fair inference that what has resulted from our meetings in St. John and Hamilton will result should we decide to hold our annual meetings in other centres of population. We are a small and compact family rather than a large and loosely-jointed body, and it will add to our pleasure. as well as to the profit of the institution, to know each other. On the other side let me say that we must all rejoice to come back again to Montreal. Our meetings here have always been pleasurable in the extreme, and we have had so many and such hearty greetings from our brethren of this city, such warm evidences of kindliness and of the true spirit of our fraternity that Montreal has a place in our hearts which time, with all the changes that it brings, can never weaken.

Naturally our first thought after greeting the living, is for those whom we shall greet no more; for the warm hearts and the active minds who shared in our friendship and assisted in our work, but who have obeyed that summons to enter the unknown, from which no action or interference or loving interposition of ours can recall them. Three of the members who were present at St. John last year—two Active Members and one Honorary Member—are no more, and one Active Member, who was not able to be present then, has also gone to fill his place in the silent halls of the dead. Ill. Bro. Robert T. Clinch, of New Brunswick, Ill. Bro. David McLellan, of Ontario, Ill. Bro. George T. Smithers, of Nova Scotia, of our Active Membership, and Ill. Bro. Edward Mitchell, of Ontario, of our Honorary Membership, will never again respond to their names in this Supreme Council. They will become part of our record, and I need not add anything here even of the eulogies which I would like to utter. Bro.: Clinch was my personal friend and Masonic associate for thirty-four years. I was warmly attached to him, and his death came to me as a warning-a monitor-a lesson as well as a break in the current of my daily life. You, my brothers from the City of Hamilton, know the sterling qualities of Bro.'. McLellan, who had served as the Chief Magistrate of your City, and who, in his Masonic career, had left a most honorable record. My acquaintance with him goes back of his admission here, and I found him hearty in his friendships, and honest and earnest in all his aims. Bro.'. SMITHERS we did not see much of, for he was not able to attend these meetings, but I have known him from early life. He was heartily attached to our institution, and no labor that he could perform for it seemed to him to be labor at all. Of Bro. '. MITCHELL, too, none of you can speak better than I. But we all know that in the expression of kindly sentiment, in the eloquent utterance of noble thought, he had among us no peer, and by his death we have lost a brother who, with a single sentence, a flash of his genial wit, could recall us from the stern realities of life, or move us to the most generous feelings. By these deaths the number of our Active Members is reduced to nineteen, and of our Honorary Members to nine, and while probably these figures will vary slightly at the close of this session, they are sufficiently limited, I should think, to satisfy the most conservative feeling in respect to the number of members of this illustrious degree.

Speaking and thinking of the dead of our own family naturally leads us to thoughts of those who are gone from among us, out of other jurisdictions, some of whom at least have world-wide reputations. Foremost among these was Ill.'. Bro.'. Shadwell H. Clerke, Grand Chancellor of the Supreme Council for England, and Grand Secretary of the English Grand Lodge; and Ill.'. Bro.'. J. M. P. Montagu, Past Grand Chancellor of the Supreme Council for England, both of them personally known to some of our members. In view of our intimate relations with the English Council I annex the letters announcing the death of these Brethren, as I think they should form part of our printed proceedings. The Supreme Council for Scotland in its annual circular announces the death of Bro.'. SIR HENRY MORLAND, who was long its representative in India, and whose death is a great loss to the fraternity in that country. The Supreme Council for Mexico announces the death of General Mariano Jimenez, one of its Active Members. Supreme Council of Peru we have information of the death of Most Puissant Francis J. Mariategui, Grand Commander of that Supreme Council, a most esteemed citizen of that country. The Supreme Council of the Argentine Republic announces the death of its Sovereign Grand

Commander Ill.: Bro.: Manuel H. Langenhein, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the Province of Buenos Ayres. From the Supreme Council of Dominicana we have information of the death of Ill.. Bro.. Lucas Gibbes, lately Grand Secretary General of that Council; and from that of the Northern Jurisdiction of the United States, of Ill.: Bro.: WILLIAM PARKMAN, of Massachusetts, an old and tried Craftsman. To our brethren of these Supreme Councils we express heartfelt sympathy in the loss they have sustained by the removal of these active Masons from their earthly labors.

Opportunity was afforded me to attend the annual session of the Supreme Council of the Northern Jurisdiction of the United States in the City of Providence a few weeks ago. By Ill.: Bro.: Palmer, Grand Commander, and by the officers and members of the Supreme Council I was most heartily welcomed as head of this Supreme Council, and I received from them many courteous attentions. Our Representative at that body, Ill.. Bro.. Tracy, and Ill.. Bro.. George O. Tyler, of Vermont, did everything in their power to make my visit agreeable. That Supreme Council is, I need scarcely say, in a most excellent condition. Out of its forty-five Active Members forty-three were in attendance at the session, and there were many Honorary Members, including eighteen upon whom the Thirty-third degree was conferred. In his address the Sovereign Grand Commander dealt almost wholly with home affairs. He suggested that steps might be taken to hold at Chicago next year a representative gathering of members of all the regular Supreme Councils of this Rite, and as the Supreme Council itself voted to meet in that city next year in annual session, the first steps may be regarded as taken towards that most interesting movement. There can be little doubt that the exposition at Chicago next year in memory of Columbus, the discoverer of the new world, will take to that city many eminent members of the Craft from all parts of the world, and that the opportunity of such a meeting as suggested by Grand Commander Palmer is unique.

It may not be improper to say that among the papers laid before the Supreme Council by Ill.: Bro.: Palmer was a letter from Mr. John J. GORMAN, who is the head of a body in the city of New York, alleging to be of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, and claiming to be a Supreme Council for the United States. This letter asked that steps be taken to unite the Supreme Council with the body over which Mr. Gorman presides. By a unanimous vote the Supreme Council directed the Grand Commander to return the communication to the writer of it inasmuch as the Supreme Council could not receive any propositions from the clandestine body named. 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a union by which they will become regular members of the Rite and admitted into fellowship with Scottish Rite Masons all over the world. Judging by the attitude and the expressions of the members of the Northern Supreme Council, when this document was presented, there is no possibility whatever of such a thing being brought about. There was neither temper nor feeling displayed; but there is a fixed determination in the minds of the members to pay no attention whatever to the acts or proceedings of this clandestine organization. My other reason for referring to it, is because I desire to lay upon the table certain correspondence with enclosures, sent to us by Bro.'. Eli Harrison, of Victoria, formerly our Deputy for British Columbia, who has acted very kindly and very promptly in our interests. This correspondence has reference to proceedings of a Mason resident in New Westminster who went to Seattle, in the State of Washington, and who passed through some ceremony which, he presumes, makes him a member of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite. Apparently, the body with which he united himself is an affiliate or subordinate of the society of which Mr. Gorman is the head. Whether you will deem any action desirable I do not know. Perhaps nothing more is necessary than to say that any Master Mason living in Canada desirous of becoming a member of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite must, in order to have standing in the Rite, apply for the degrees in this country and take them here from some organization under the authority of this Supreme Council, unless, indeed, there should be a special waiver of jurisdiction in a particular case by some one having authority to make it. It follows as a matter of course that if a Mason cannot legally take our degrees out of this country in a legal body of the Rite, he cannot be recognized at all if he takes them either in the country or out of it, in a body declared to be illegal, irregular and clandestine by all the recognized Supreme Councils in the world.

With all the Supreme Councils of our correspondence we are on friendly terms, and the letters which have been exchanged with any of these do not call for any special comment.

But there are two matters outside of our jurisdiction to which I may direct attention. In our proceedings last year reference was made to the trouble which had arisen in the Dominican republic, and which had split the Supreme Council in twain. Our Representative at Santa Domingo, where there was but one Council, was Ill.'. Bro.'. Lucas Gibbes, Secretary-General, an honored and esteemed brother, who in his day had done much for the Craft. I have just announced to you the death of this brother. We had some time ago a letter from one of the Supreme Councils asking us to appoint a new Representative, as Bro.'. Gibbes had ceased to be a member of the Supreme Council. Now following the announcement of Bro.'. Gibbes' death is a request from

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the other Supreme Council to appoint a successor. I have not full opportunity to so thoroughly examine into the whole matter as to say which of these two bodies is the legitimate head of the Dominican Freemasonry. Naturally I feel that old and tried craftsmen like Brothers Jacinto de Castro, Lucas Gibbes, and Eugenio de Marchena would not wilfully do acts injurious to a society in which they long filled honorable positions, and I incline, until better informed, to assume that communication with the body over which they preside should not cease. On the other hand there are true and excellent men in the other body. The Supreme Council of Colon has offered to mediate between the two groups. The Masons of the Dominican republic cannot afford to foster dissensions and to perpetuate divisions. Let them try and strengthen the chain of brotherhood. For the moment, then, I have not deemed it advisable to nominate any successor to Bro. Gibbes, and I do not think any interest will suffer by allowing the matter to stand.

The other matter to which I would refer relates to the Supreme Council of Egypt, and the principal point in consideration is stated at pages 239-240 of our proceedings of last year. The Supreme Council of England after due examination has recognized the Supreme Council of which Bro. The Figari is Grand Commander, and whose Grand East is at Cairo, as the legitimate head of the Rite in Egypt. This course has been followed by the Supreme Council for Scotland. A strong reason for its adoption by us is the fact that the body at Alexandria, with which we at one time were in amity, has practically become a body of what is known as the Rite of Memphis.

As regards our domestic concerns, they do not call for very extended remarks, as the reports of the Illustrious Secretary-General, of the Illustrious Treasurer-General, and of the Provincial Deputies show what has been actually done. I have not been called upon during the year to decide delicate points of law, or to enforce any disciplining powers. At our last Annual Session warrants were ordered to issue to Murray Chapter, Ottawa, Spry Chapter, Barrie, and Quebec Chapter, Quebec; and these bodies are now at work under these warrants. No dispensations have been issued during the year for the creation of new bodies.

The lodges at Kentville and at Amherst in the Province of Nova Scotia are still existing under authority, but it may be a question whether the authority should not be withdrawn. In small villages or towns we cannot hope to maintain bodies of the Rite, except under peculiarly favorable circumstances, such as the constant presence of some influential, intelligent and hard-working brother. Our experience must show us that even in large centres, to do the work properly involves an expenditure of time and money, which is not to be secured in a small settlement. For the enthusiasm which plants bodies in some of these places we must have no inconsiderable amount of admiration

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even if the results do not justify the anticipation of the founders. Perhaps, however, the report of the Ill.'. Deputy for Nova Scotia on this matter will justify some reflections of a more cheering nature and different action from that suggested. If they do not, I would recommend the Supreme Council not to continue the existence of the lodges named. The bodies of Halifax are, under ordinary circumstances, sufficient to do the work offering in the Province of Nova Scotia, and one good, substantial, well-appointed lodge is better than several ineffective ones. Since Bro.'. Foster was made our Deputy for Nova Scotia he has left nothing undone to maintain an interest in the Rite, and he has been most successful where the conditions were favorable.

Probably it will be found that about one hundred Masons have taken the degrees of the Rite in our Lodges of Perfection, and quite two-thirds of this number were admitted in bodies in Ontario. In that Province we are making the greatest relative and absolute progress. The influence exerted by the bodies at Hamilton is felt generally through that Province. The Lodge at Ottawa, and that at Barrie have been very busy in the past year. In this City, too, our bodies have been fairly active, and the returns for the Lodge of Perfection here are quite gratifying. I refer only to these matters as roting our progress. It is not, perhaps, as rapid as we had hoped for in the early years of the Supreme Council, but, taking into account all the circumstances of Freemasonry in Canada, it is rapid enough. Our population is not a wealthy one; there is a sense in which the degrees of the Rite are a luxury. It is a busy population, and comparatively few have the leisure necessary for the thorough cultivation of our system. But I think that yearly we receive a fair addition to our ranks of men, the majority of whom are doing good service to the works of humanity. I have made no reference to Winnipeg, nor do I intend to do more now than to say that our Ill.'. Lt.'. Grand Commander was able to visit the bodies there this year, and I doubt not that he found the members as enthusiastic and as harmonious as they were when I visited them two years ago.

With respect to British Columbia I may say that I have had some correspondence in regard to the condition there. I do not think that the time has yet arrived when we can, with a full assurance of success, revive our bodies at Victoira, and it is better to wait than to make a second attempt, and then to meet with failure a second time. But I believe that at Vancouver we can establish a lodge of Perfection with a pretty firm assurance that it will live. One of the brethren upon whom I conferred the degrees 4° to 18° in 1890 was Bro. WM. Dowinie, now Grand Master of the Province. Bro. Dowinie will give us every assistance in his power, and is quite hopeful that we can succeed. My observation of the conditions of life in British Columbia justifies the

declaration that it would be very unwise to endeavor to establish three or four lodges there, and one strong reason against this is: the population is constantly shifting, that is, a large portion of it. Men think nothing of moving from place to place, of going hither and thither in the hope of bettering their condition materially, or in pursuit of some plan or hobby, or from mere fancy, and for some time this will affect the conditions there much more materially than they do in places longer settled. I will place Bro. Downe's views in the hands of the Ill. Deputy for the Province—the Secretary-General.

Successful re-unions have been held during the year at Winnipeg, Ottawa and Hamilton. At these places the brethren have their own apartments, and I am glad to be able to say that at St. John they will also have them at an early day. Unoccupied space in the Freemasons' Hall has been taken, and is now being specially fitted up for the use of the Rite. In the course of a few weeks they will be ready, and the Rite will then have a very comfortable home in that City. This is one result of the visit to St. John of the Supreme Council.

So far as I am aware a very hearty and kindly feeling prevails throughout our jurisdiction among the members, and if, occasionally, a matter comes up to give us some concern there is none that is really embarrassing. But as we stand continually, by reason of our position, in the brightest light, so that all our defects may be as fully observed as our virtues, it behooves us to endeavor to live up to our professions. Charitable as we are in dealing with the faults to which all men are liable, none of us can read in the public press with other feelings than of the deepest regret that some one whom we have loved and trusted has not justified the confidence placed in him, To forgive the erring is a work of mercy to which we would all cheerfully conform: none the less is it a duty to our society to insist that those whom we trust shall prove themselves, in all the walks of life, worthy of our trust. The Ancient and Accepted Rite of Freemasonry is something more than an institution which instructs men in its philosophy and its principles. It aims to fit thosewhom it receives to be teachers of mankind, even though many or most of the pupils never enter our doors. And that is a powerful reason why we should insist that regular and well-ordered lines of conduct should be followed by those who lead in this institution.

PEERS AND BRETHREN—This is the year fixed by our constitution for the election of office-bearers. Since the formation of this Supreme Council I have held office, and I have gladly done what little was in my power to advance the common interest. For six years I have presided over your deliberations, and they have been most pleasant years to me, for you have heartily given me your confidence and have patiently borne with my shortcomings. What I have done has fallen very short of my desires; and I am quite conscious that many things have been left

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No excuse deliver undone which duty required me to do. The best that I can say by way of excuse is that if sometimes I have rested when I should labor, so also at times I have worked when I would prefer to be idle. Now I look forward to rest which I can enjoy without reproach, not from you for you have ever been too kind—but from my own conscience. I do not expect that my interest in the concerns of the Supreme Council will cease so long as I have strength and health, but I most gladly resign into your hands the authority which you have given me, and will give to my successor, should he need it, any assistance in the discharge of his duties which he may require of me. In so doing I can best repay the loving kindness, the fraternal feeling displayed towards me since I came among you.

Let us now proceed to the work before us, upholding as we have ever done, the high principles of our order, cherishing brotherly affection, and striving to do faithfully all that we may to advance the interests of the great branch of the brotherhood which is our special care.

ONTARIO.

To the Supreme Council A. . &A. . S. . Rite for the Dominion of Canada:

I respectfully present my Fifth Annual Report as Deputy for the Province of Ontario. The continued prosperity of the Rite is shown by the increase in the membership of the various bodies and the warm interest taken by the best Masons of the jurisdiction in the work, and the desire of others to be admitted among us. While popularity is not always a proof of efficiency or of that progress which is beneficial to the Masonic fraternity generally, it is satisfactory to know that as only those who are in every respect worthy can be admitted to membership in this Rite, we are assured that increased membership and more active zeal means to us the appreciation by the best of craftsmen of the teaching of the degrees, which cannot in any other grade be obtained, as the lessons learned from our rituals must have a beneficial effect upon the Masonic fraternity at large. 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HAMILTON.

The Reunion held on January the 27th, 28th and 29th last was again the great attraction of the year. It is difficult to speak in fitting terms of the exertions of the Hamilton brethren, as they spare neither time labor nor expense in making these Reunions of special benefit to the Rite. The convenience which these occasions afford to brethren who, residing out of the city, cannot, without much inconvenience obtain the degrees, is fully appreciated, and many take advantage of the opportunity afforded them to make further advancement in the Rite. They have the still further advantage of bringing together the leading Masons of Canada, and many from the United States, who are enabled to exchange ideas with mutual benefit to all who gather together on such occasions. While I was unable to be present the loss was mine, and I regret that circumstances made it impossible to be with my brethren.

TORONTO.

It is gratifying to me to report that both the Rose Croix Chapter and Lodge of Perfection have done excellent work. The officers and members have shown much zeal and energy, and the result is satisfactory. Both bodies have made considerable accessions to the ranks, which shows that Toronto can and will soon occupy a front place in Scottish Rite Masonry. With four resident Inspectors-General of the 33° to aid, encourage and direct them, we have a reasonable right to expect good results, especially as our thirty-third degree members are, no doubt, always present at the meetings of the various bodies to bear a fair share in the work devolving upon the brethren.

LONDON.

The progress of the Rite in London is satisfactory, but there is room for greater progress, and I feel assured that the next year's report will give evidence of what can be accomplished by the worthy brethren who have token hold of the work with a determination to make the A. & A. S. Rite a power for good in that City.

KINGSTON.

Not much progress has been made in the Royal City. I regret that I could not personally visit the bodies there, as I know there is good material that should be employed in the Master's building, and I am assured that Ill. Bro. Waddington, 33°, will see that this material is put to its proper use. More activity on the part of the brethren would be appreciated, and the result would soon be apparent.

OTTAWA.

The brethren at Ottawa have been most active, and have made the Rite one of the most influential in the Ottawa valley. Nine members have been admitted to the Chapter, and fifteen to the Lodge of Perfection. This is excellent work and most encouraging. During the year a Reunion has been held, which was well attended, and at which the degrees were conferred in a perfect manner. We may look for a large increase in the membership in that City. The Capital of the Dominion should occupy a prominent place in Masonry, and from the zeal so far displayed by the brethren there is no doubt of the rapid growth of the Scottish Rite in that City.

GUELPH AND WINDSOR.

Only fair progress has been made at these places. Perhaps I am to some extent to blame owing to my inability to visit them and encourage the brethren in their work. My successor will, no doubt, make up for my short-comings, and visit those who will be pleased to see him.

BARRIE.

As I am a member of both the Chapter and Lodge of Perfection in Barrie, I have some diffidence in speaking of the work done, but as the returns show quite an increase in the membership, I may with propriety say that the officers and members are most zealous in the performance of their duties. The degrees, such as are worked, are given in full, and the Supreme Council has not more earnest or more skillful workers anywhere than in Barrie. The Rite occupies a high place in the opinion of the Craft, and the leading masons of the Town and County are on the roll of membership.

DEATHS.

The great destroyer has been among us, and has removed from us two of our well-beloved brethren. We have to mourn the death of Ill.. Brothers David McLellan, 33°, and Edward Mitchell, 33°. Bro.. McLellan was long one of my nearest and dearest friends. For some years we journeyed together in life. In the Blue Lodge, R. A. Chapter, and the several grades in Masonry up to the Scottish Rite, we were closely associated. Many of the degrees were conferred upon us at the same meeting, and for years we were, in Masonry and in private life, most intimately connected. He was upright and honorable, and in every respect a good man and a true friend. Ill. Bro.. MITCHELL was the personification of honor. True and loyal to his friends, just with all men, honest and upright in all the transactions of life, he passed away, leaving many a sore heart to mourn his death.

In closing my official report, I am enabled to say that peace prevails in all the valleys of the Rite.

I have to express my regret that my public duties would not permit of more time being given to visiting the bodies that have been under my direction during the six years I have been Deputy for Ontario, as I know that without a system of regular visitation the office is useless. I must can b to an

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In Brunsw must ask, therefore, to be relieved from the position, so that a brother can be chosen who will more efficiently discharge the duty pertaining to an exceedingly pleasant office.

NOVA SCOTIA.

To the Supreme Council A. `. & A. `.S.`. Rite for the Dominion of Canada: Illustrious Brethren:—

I beg to present my First Annual Report as Deputy for Nova Scotia

In November last I paid an official visit to Cumberland Lodge of Perfection in Amherst. I found the Lodge had been nearly dormant ever since its establishment. I therefore called a meeting, requested and received the resignation of all its officers, and that same evening I opene on th

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opened a "Council of Princes of Jerusalem" and conferred that degree on three brethren who had already been accepted in Keith Chapter, Rose Croix, in order to furnish material for the east. Next evening I held a meeting of the Lodge, and after election I installed the officers, and since then the progress of the Lodge under the able management of Bros. Tilden, Bird, Bert, Townshend and Curry has been very satisfactory, and I trust Cumberland Lodge of Perfection is now on a firm basis, and has come to stay.

My next official visit was to Kentville, and I regret to say I cannot make the same favorable report of Royal Oak Lodge of Perfection there. Kentville is a small place, but has an enthusiastic Blue Lodge, and the Illustrious Bro. R. S. Masters, 32°, T. P. G. M., feared that when the Lodge of Perfection was opened the applications for the degrees might be more numerous than desirable, and that refusals might bring dissentions into the Blue Lodge. I cannot but feel that he acted quite in accordance with the teachings of the Rite, where a man's first duty to Blue Masonry is so insisted upon. I have, therefore, withdrawn the warrant of Royal Oak Lodge of Perfection, and returned it to the Secretary-General.

I received a request from Yarmouth to come down and confer the degrees 4 to 14th on some thirty brethren, and establish a Lodge of Perfection, but as the town has now, I believe, two Blue Lodges, a Royal Arch Chapter, and a Preceptory of Knights Templar, I considered they had quite as much Masonry as they could conveniently handle, and that the establishment of another body would only create discord in those already existing. I therefore refused the request.

The Halifax Bodies have suffered much from the death and removal of some of the most edthusiastic members, and therefore their progress in the last two or three years has been slow. They were also weighed down by a heavy debt, mostly contracted by re-furnishing the rooms, but I am happy to state that Illustrious Bro. Crowe, 32°, our Treasurer, can now show pretty nearly a clean sheet, and being now almost free from debt, and a splendid lot of new material coming forward, I feel sure the Halifax bodies will soon give evidence that they are adding, not so much in numbers, but in quality, the proper material for the re-building of the Holy House of the Temple.

They will always have one weak spot, that is, many of our members are officers in H.'. M.'. forces, and after a few years' stay on this station are removed to another, thus depriving us of many warm supporters and good workers. Victoria Lodge of Perfection is working up and many applications are in hand. Keith Chapter,, Rose Croix, under the able management of Rev. T. B. N. NORMAN LEE, Garrison Chaplain, M. W. S., has attained to a perfection of work, the Easter ceremonies being particularly fine. A new departure was made in this instance

of inviting all prominent Masons not members of the Rite to be present with us on Easter Sunday, and partake with us in the Mystic Banquet, the ceremonies, signs, etc., being adopted to suit the occasion. Nova Scotia Consistory has done good work and added ten good members to the list, and more coming.

Before closing I must mention with gratitude the valuable assistance I have received from Bros. W. V. Murray, 18°, and W. C. Smith, 32°. If any of my acts may seem arbitrary I must appeal to the leniency of the Supreme Council, and remind them that in this, my first year as Deputy, I have been deprived of the valued assistance and advice of Illustrious Bro. Rev. Dr. Partridge, 38° by his resignation; and by the death of Illustrious Brothers George T. Smithers, 38°, Col. Geo. Firebrace, 32°, and Samuel Porter, 32°, all of whom leave a vacancy in our list we will find it hard to fill.

MANITOBA.

To the Supreme Council A. A. A. Ritefor the Dominion of Canada: Illustrious Brethren:—

I have the honor to submit my Annual Report as your Deputy for Manitoba.

Affairs of the Rite in Manitoba are in a most satisfactory condition with the exception of Brandon Lodge of Perfection which has not been in a working condition for some years. I strongly recommend that the charter for the Brandon Lodge be withdrawn and cancelled, as I find it impossible to hold out any hope for the immediate future, the original members having become scattered, and matters Masonic otherwise not being in such a dtate as to warrant the continuance of the charter.

The Winnipeg bodies have been favored during the past year with visits from several members of the Supreme Council who will, no doubt, give their views as to efficiency of the rooms and equipment and the character of the ritual work.

A reunion of the Lodge of Perfection was held on the 10th June last, or the day following the meeting of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba, A. F. & A. M., when some ten candidates, most of whom reside at remote points in the Province and North-west Territories, received the degrees 4° to 14°. The Lodge works in extenso 4°, 5°, 6°, 7°, 9°, 13° and 14°, utilizing twelve apartments, and possessing an excellent and thorough stock

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of paraphernalia and appliances. The financial position of the Body is sound, there being absolutely no indebtedness, while a balance of some hundreds of dollars is banked to their credit. The box of fraternal assistance is kept well supplied, and is made of practical use by members, the contents being drawn on for the greater part to relieve the distress of women and children not connected with Freemasonry.

Bethesda Chapter Rose Croix is prospering, and the degrees are carefully worked. Furnishings and paraphernalia necessary for the degree work has been purchased, and the 17° and 18° are worked in extenso on each candidate. The Chapter owes nothing, and has a good cash balance to its credit.

Manitoba Consistory did not increase greatly as to unmbers during the past year, the policy adopted being rather to build up the subordinate bodies, especially the lodges, before withdrawing the new material from gaining a perfect and adequate understanding of their duties there. The necessary furniture, etc., for ritual work in the Consistory is nearly all renewed, and I have no doubt but that the Body will give a proper account of itself and the character of the material accepted.

I am glad to report that many of our members in the various bodies who are not holding office have fully qualified themselves to work degrees, and, when occasion requires it, fill any office for an evening.

On the whole I can report most favorably on the condition of the Rite in Manitoba. The Supreme Council can have every reason to be satisfied with the standing and personal character of our initiates of this year.

I regret that it will be impossible for me to attend this session of the Supreme Council, but as it is my first absence in four years I confidently hope to be excused.

The Committee on the Doings of Iuspectors-General and Special Deputies, presented the following report:

 $To the Supreme \ Council \ A. \cdot . \& \ A. \cdot . S. \cdot . Rite for the \ Dominion \ of \ Canada: \\ Illustrious \ Brethren:$

Your Committee on the Doings of Inspectors-General and Special Deputies beg to report, that, as usual, the returns are on the whole of a most satisfactory character, and speak well of the solid progress of our beloved Rite.

The able Deputy for the Province of Ontario makes his usual report of continued progress of the bodies under his supervision—a report which is fully endorsed by the highly satisfactory figures that appear in the returns of the Ill., Secretary-General.

The Reunion in Hamilton has now passed into history, and is eagerly looked forward to every year as the great feature in Scottish Rite Masonry in Canada.

Needless to say the work was as admirably done as of yore, and the hospitality was beyond all praise, and both were enjoyed by numerous visitors both from our own jurisdiction and that of the Northern Jurisdiction of the U.S.

The Province of Quebec reports peace and harmony in all its bodies, and that the various bodies are well conducted and adding yearly good material to their rolls, which is as much as can be hoped for in a Provice where so much enmity to our order is shown.

The allusion in this report to the difficulty in keeping the Easter Festivals is one that your Committee thinks may be easily overcome in the Province itself, without the interference of the Supreme Council or occupying its time.

Your Committee trust that the effort to introduce the Rite into the Eastern townships will be crowned with success at an early date, as there is undoubtedly fertile ground there only awaiting the introduction of the plough to produce a verdant growth.

The Illustrious Deputy for New Brunswick reports, as the immediate result of the late visit of the Supreme Council to the City of St. John, a very marked increase and devotion to the work of the degrees, and an awakened interest in the Rite by the fraternity generally which is an evidence of the wisdom shown by the Supreme Council in deciding to hold occasional meetings away from its grand East.

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The perusal of this report brings to our minds the sad thinning of our ranks since our last annual meeting by the hand of death in the persons of our dear and respected friends, both from New Brunswick and Ontario: another proof that "in the midst of life we are in death."

Nova Scotia—Your Committee are pleased to learn that the action of the Ill.'. Deputy has resulted so satisfactorily as regards the Lodge of Perfection in Amherst, though they cannot endorse the means by which this was arrived at, and they would suggest that the Sovereign Grand Commander should call the attention of the Ill.'. Deputy to what was evidently a misapprehension of his powers.

Your Committee endorse the action of the Ill.. Deputy in the withdrawal of the warrant of the Lodge of Perfection at Kentville, though they are not prepared to admit that the Scottish Rite could not have been worked side by side with the Craft Lodge, though they do admit that the concentration of the bodies in the City of Halifax is at any rate for the present the proper course to follow.

The same remarks will apply to a certain extent to his action as to the request for a Lodge of Perfection from Yarmouth, but as this is evidently the most likely place in the Province, outside of Halifax, for the establishment of a body, we trust that the Ill... Deputy may see his way to atler his views in the early future.

Your Committee beg to congratulate the Ill.. Deputy on the success that has attended his efforts in the City of Halifax, and sincerely trust that the early evidence of the addition that he forecasts will very soon materialize.

Ill.'. Bro.'. C. N. Bell's report from Manitoba is highly satisfactory as regards the City of Winnipeg, and your Committee wish to call the attention of the Supreme Council to the energy of the Ill.'. Deputy, and hope that the reunions so well commenced may become a yearly institution.

Your Committee would recommend that the warrant for the Lodge of Perfection at Brandon be withdrawn, and that for the present, at least, the working of the Rite be confined to the energetic and well worked bodies in Winnipeg.

Illustrious Brethren:

The Committee on the address of the Most Ill. Sov. Grand Commander have pleasure in placing on record an acknowledgment of their high appreciation of both the style and the substance of the document. Like his previous annual deliverances it is characterized by clearness of statement, wideness of scope, and manifestly careful thought touching matters pertaining to the welfare of the Rite in this jurisdiction.

It is not intended, nor is it deemed necessary or advisable to review in detail its various paragraphs, or to re-echo in the shape of a report thereon much which has been so ably and commendably dealt with, and your Committee are strongly inclined to perform their duty by merely saying an emphatic "Amen" to the whole document. Usage, however, seems to be against this very simple and easy method of performing a duty, and your Committee, therefore, very briefly refer to a few—a very few—of the subjects dealt with by the Sov. Grand Commander.

Those Ill.. Brethren who last year had the pleasure of attending the meeting of Supreme Council at St. John will cordially concur in the view that advantage results from occasionally holding the annual meetings in different places in the jurisdiction, and if the pilgrimage of the western brethren to the Maritime Provinces last year has in any sense been of advantage to the Rite in those Provinces, such advantage has been mutual. The fraternal cordiality and kindness displayed by our brethren in the east are not likely ever to be forgotten.

The suggested meeting of the members of all Supreme Councils at Chicago next year should result in an ever memorable reunion of eminent brethren and lasting benefit to Scottish Rite Masonry on this continent.

Year after year our Sov. Grand Commander, the Lieut. Grand Commander and other Canadian brethren have testified to the genuineness of the welcome always accorded to them by the Supreme Council of the North, and there is no reason to fear that should we present ourselves in a body as a visiting Supreme Council the reception will not be most hearty and fraternal.

The fitting references in the address to the sad losses we have sustained in the removal by death of our Ill.'. Bros.'. CLINCH, McLellan, Mitchell and Smithers, forcibly present to our minds the fleeting and uncertain nature of life. At its longest very short, with an eternity beyond, how momentously important that no portion of it should be mis-

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from the R regret marke by am Rite i ruler ment spent. To those of us who were wont to associate in daily life with these departed brethren the bereavement has been specially severe.

The Committee concur in the observations of the Sov. Grand Commander respecting the valueless nature of degrees taken in a body recognized by the Supreme Councils of this continent only as an illegal, irregular and clandestine organization.

They also agree that in connection with the unhappy difficulties in the jurisdiction of the Dominican Republic the prudent course has been adopted by refraining in the meantime from appointing a successor to our representative Ill.. Bro.. Lucas Gibbs. It is to be hoped that wise mediation may result in healing the dissensions which have so unhappily arisen.

To follow the action of the Supreme Councils for England and Scotland in recognizing the Supreme Council of Egypt, having its Grand East at Cairo under Ill.. Bro.. Tito Figari as its Grand Commander, as opposed to the other body at Alexandria, seems for the reason suggested by the Sov.. Grand Commander the course which should be adopted by this Supreme Council, and the Committee recommend accordingly.

There is in the general observations in the address respecting the condition of the Rite within our borders, and in the various reports of the Ill.'. Grand Secretary-General and Ill.'. Deputies, ample ground for congratulation. On the whole there appears to have been more or less good work done all along the line during the past year. In the nature of things we must expect that here and there progress will be slow, and it is not even to be wondered at that in some cases the seed planted has not taken root deeply enough to realize permanent growth. Local circumstances, the varying degree of importance attached to other branches of Masonry, and the ever exacting demands of business necessities, often resulting in depriving subordinate bodies of the services of most desirable officers, are all to be taken into account. Nevertheless, we have much cause for rejoicing, and he would indeed be a pessimist who to-day felt called upon to express any doubt as to the permanence and stability of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite in the Dominion of Canada.

Our Ill.. Sov. Grand Commander's expressed desire to be relieved from the duties and responsibilities attaching to the position of head of the Rite in this jurisdiction will have been received with sorrow and regret. He has presided over this Council for six years with dignity and marked ability. His intercourse with us all has ever been characterized by amiability and courtesy. His devotion to the best interests of this Rite in Canada, and his deliverances from time to time as its responsible ruler have gone far to secure and maintain that respectful acknowledgment and confidence which, as a Supreme Council, we now happily

enjoy among the Supreme Councils of the world. Ripe in years and experience, thoroughly imbued with the spirit of Scottish Rite Masonry and the lessons and principles taught all through our degrees, we all join in the earnest hope that, whether in the chair or out of it, he may be long spared to his loving brethren as a co-worker in the Council which he has so long adorned as its Sovereign Grand Commander.

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

With deep regret we have to announce to you the death of an Active Member of our Supreme Council.

On January 24th, at the city of St. John, died, after a few days' illness, Ill.: Bro,: Robert Thomson Clinch. Bro.: Clinch was of an old Irish family, long settled in America. His grandfather, in the revolutionary war, espoused the cause of the Crown, and at the close of the conflict came to New Brunswick, where he was given a large tract of land for his services. At the constitution of the Province of New Brunswick, he became a member of the Provincial Legislature, as subsequently did his son, the father of our late Illustrious Brother. Bro.: CLINCH was born in 1827. Initiated into Freemasonry in Albion Lodge, St. John, 1853, then on register of the Grand Lodge of England, he at once took a deep interest in all the affairs of the Craft, an interest that scarcely abated during his life. He served as Master of that ${\bf Lodge, as\ Principal\ Z\ of\ Carleton\ Royal\ Arch\ Chapter, and\ as\ Commander}$ of the Encampment of St. John, Knights Templar, both on the Scottish Registry. He became a member of the Royal Order of Scotland in the Provincial Grand Lodge at St. John. In 1867 he received the degrees of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite $4^{\circ}\, to\, 32^{\circ}\, in$ the Massachusetts Consistory at Boston, and soon after participated in the organization of the Rose Croix Chapter 18° and Consistory 30° of New Brunswick under authority of the Supreme Council of Scotland. He was Grand Commander of that Consistory from its organization in 1870 until, in 1878, it merged with the Harington Consistory, 32°, which united body became the New Brunswick Consistory, 32° . In the meantime the Supreme Council of Canada had been formed, and Ill.'. Bro.'. CLINCH was, at the session of 1876, crowned an active member. H_{\odot} faithfully attended to his duties, and was present at the last Annual Session in the City of St. John, in October, 1891. In 1866, Bro.: CLINCH was appointed Grand Master of the District Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, under England, by

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the then Grand Master, Earl of Zetland. At the time there was a movement on foot in the Province to establish an independent Grand Lodge, and the judicious and fraternal course pursued by the Illustrious Brother did a great deal to prevent any discord. He remained faithful to the Grand Lodge, whose officer he was, declining to accept the office of Grand Master, tendered him by the newly-formed Grand Lodge; on the other hand, he advised the Masonic authorities in England, that the movement was so general it would be for the interest of the fraternity not to oppose it. The Grand Lodge of England acted upon this advice, and the movement was successfully established. After the lapse of some years Bro.'. CLINCH was elected Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, which position he retained for three years; and the Grand Lodge of England, in the meantime, appointed him its representative in New Brunswick. Indeed, the duties of all the offices in the Craft, held by our late Brother were discharged with zeal, fidelity and judgment, and the Brethren in New Brunswick had unbounded confidence in him. He was capable in business, and diligent discharge of it; of great courtesy of manners; warm and steadfast in his friendships; kind and charitable; and faithful in every trust. As a member of the community in which he lived he was universally respected for all those excellent qualities which make up a good citizen. An active member of the Church of England, he was a constant representative of the parish to which he belonged in the Synod of Fredericton; was sent by that body as one of its representatives to the Provincial Synod of Canada; and was a fraternal representative of the Provincial Synod to the General Conventions of the Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

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Entering in his early life the telegraphic service, when almost in its infancy in New Brunswick, he grew up with it, rising through the different branches by his merit and capacity, until he became the superintendent of a great district, comprising the Provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and with important connections west, and with great cable lines. In mourning the death of one whose fidelity to the Craft was so great, and by whom the principles of our brotherhood were so well displayed, it is a melancholy satisfaction to us to see that those who had business associations with him appreciated and acknowledged his merit. In the formal announcement of his death to the telegraphic corps of his District, the General Superintendent makes this observation: "Mr. Clinch was in the telegraphic service for more than forty years; during the last twenty-five of which he filled the responsible position of Superintendent. He was a man of sterling character, diligent and faithful in the performance of his duties to the company, and a conscientious Christian gentleman, whose example it is well to emulate." The earthly career of our Illustrious Brother is ended, but the memory of all that he was will long be cherished by his

Brethren of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite in Canada.

DEAR BRETHREN,-

We had only a few days since received the sad news of the death of our dearly loved Bro. Clinch, of St. John, and prepared the circular in Memoriam of that Brother, when the telegraph again brings home to us another proof of the instability of life, announcing the sudden death of Ill. Bro. George Thomas Smithers, 33°, an active member of our Council for the Province of Nova Scotia, which took place in the City of Halifax, on 28th January, in the 57th year of his age.

When after the recent meeting of the Supreme Council in October, some of our members had the pleasure of visiting that city, and meeting that Illustrious Brother, they found him most assiduous in his kind attentions, and they could see from the activity displayed by him on behalf of the Rite there, that he was looked upon by the members in Halifax as an authority, and one upon which they largely depended for advice and assistance in carrying on the work of the Rite. Our Brother had but recently recovered from a severe illness which had caused him to look exceedingly frail, but they did not expect he would so soon be called to the unknown land from whence no traveler returns.

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Soon after he had attained his manhood, Ill., Bro., Smithers was admitted into Freemasonry in St. Andrew's Lodge, Halifax, in which he continued a member until his death. He took an active interest in its welfare, and after he passed the chair continued to give the Lodge the benefit of his experience and skill. He was exalted to the Royal Arch in Royal Union Chapter, No. 1, N.S., and at the time of his death was Grand Secretary of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter—a position he effectively filled for a number of years. In the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia he had the rank of Past Grand Warden. As a member of the Order of the Temple in the Preceptory at Halifax, he was greatly esteemed by that branch of the fraternity; but the work in which he took the deepest interest was that of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite. He received the degrees to 18° in the city of St. John in 1870, and at once assisted in the organization of the Rite in Nova Scotia. Afterwards he was admitted a S∴P∴R∴S∴, 32°, in New Brunswick Consistory, and finally at a special session of the Supreme Council, held in St. John in 1885, was crowned a Sovereign Grand Inspector General. Unable to participate in the deliberations of this Supreme Council itself, he gave his time and ability, generously, to advance the interests of the Rite in his native Province, and the brethren appreciating his labors, for he was greatly esteemed by them, will long lament the death of one whose Masonic knowledge and experience was extensive, and whose clear head and sound judgment were of great service to the different Bodies in which he served. His amiable character and consistent life endeared him to his most intimate friends, and in all his domestic relations his loss will be 'elt to be an irreparable one.

DEAR BRETHREN,-

Scarcely had the ink dried on our memorial circular announcing the death of late Bro.'. SMITHERS, ere the telegram, that swift messenger of weal or woe, brought the terrible tidings of the sudden departure of another of our much-loved members, Ill.'. Bro. Edward Mitchell. It will be remembered by some that our brother, although suffering at the time, journeyed with the members of the Council to the city of St. John in October last for the purpose of attending the session of the Supreme Council, which was held at that time, but on his arrival here found himself too ill to leave his hotel, and after being confined to his room for two days was obliged to return home, much to the disappointment of the members of the Supreme Council and his own chagrin.

Bro. MITCHELL was born in Scotland in 1841, but in early childhood came to Canada and spent his life in or near the home of his adoption, the City of Hamilton, where he was connected at one time with one of the local newspapers, but afterwards entered the service of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, and became Manager of the Branch of that institution there, in which position he was greatly liked and esteemed by his fellow-citizens. His health failing he was obliged to retire from active labor, and for the past few years enjoyed the ample competency with which fortune had favored him.

He was initiated into Freemasonry in St. Andrew's Lodge, Caledonia, on September 18th, 1861, was Arched in St. John's Chapter, R.A. M., on Oct. 12th, 1865, and was admitted to the degrees of the A.'. & A.'. S.'. Rite in 1868, being the first member received into the Rite in the City of Hamilton, and was created a S.'. G.'. I.'. G.'. 33°, Honorary Member, at the session of the Supreme Council in Montreal in 1889. He was also a member of Godfrey de Bouillon Preceptory of Knights Templar, and of the Royal Order of Scotland. In official position he was P. D.D.G.M., and was Grand Treasurer of the Grand Lodge of Canada, and also of the Grand Chapter of Canada. He was likewise Past District Superintendent of R.A. Masons, and in every position he merited and gained the approbation of his brethren.

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Bro. MITCHELL was one of those genial spirits who, overflowing with wit and humor, bring sunshine and harmony wherever they go, and any gathering favored with his company was sure to be inspired with the brilliant wit and genius of this generous-hearted brother. Who can speak of him as eloquently as he spoke of his brethren who had passed in "behind that door that never swings outward."

Thus, dear brethren, we one by one pass away, and the places that knew us once know us no more. The memories of those gone are very dear, but none among them was more loved than him whom we now lament. Dear brother, genial companion, loving friend, we bid you a long and lasting farewell. May you rest in Holy peace.

DEAR BRETHREN,-

Once more the solemn Rites of our Masonic Burial have been held over the remains of one who deserved well of the order, his country, and mankind, and we are again called upon to mourn the loss of an officer of our Supreme Council Ill.. Bro. David McLellan, 33°, Grand Captain of the Guard, who was present at our session in October last.

Bro. McLellan, while apparently in good health then, was no doubt still suffering from the result of a severe illness which he

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ewise on he had about a year before and which threatened at that time to carry him away, and this was manifest, as shortly after his return home from St. John he was obliged to go to a sanitarium in New York State for rest and treatment, remaining there until his friends thought he had fully recovered, but just after his arrival home, and when his dear ones were rejoicing in the thought of his complete restoration the silver cord became loosened, and the golden bowl was broken—he was stricken with paralysis of the brain on Tuesday, the 15th inst., and expired the following day.

Bro.'. McLellan was Ex-Mayor of the City of Hamilton, having but just completed his second term of office, and to say that he was esteemed by his fellow-citizens but poorly expresses the high opinion held of him by everybody who knew him in the capacity of Chief Magistrate. He was a man who thoroughly believed that duty was the one great law, not only for the Mason but the citizen, and the performance of it was to him a matter of religious obligation: he verily died from his devotion to what he conceived his duty, taking upon himself and fulfiling thoroughly so many laborious offices that his mental powers gave way.

He is mourned for, not only by his brethren of this Rite and of all the Rites of Masonry, but also by a large circle of the membership of other benevolent societies of which he was a valued and loved member, and by his fellow-citizens generally.

A man of thorough integrity of character, pure-minded, conscientious, temperate, of equal temper, charitable of judgment and of merciful impulses, he was an ideal member of our Order, to which he was so zealously devoted, and in which he had filled so many important offices; he has left behind him no uncancelled obligations, and his virtues are preserved in the memory of his brethren.

Bro.'. McLellax was born in Toronto on the 11th of January, 1841; was initiated into Freemasonry in St. Andrew's Lodge, Toronto, on August 10, 1865; received the Royal Arch Degree in King Solomon's Chapter, No. 8, Toronto, on October 17, 1866, and at a later date the Order of the Temple; was created a S.'. P.'. R.'. S.'. 32°, in Moore Consistory, 32°, in Hamilton, June 3, 1874, and finally was created a S.'. G.'. I.'. G.'. 33° in the Supreme Council in 1884, and crowned an active member in 1885. He was also a member of the Royal Order of Scotland.

Officially, Bro.'. McLellan was P.G. Reg. and an active member of the Grand Lodge; was Grand Scribe E. of the Grand Chapter of R. A. M. at the time of his death, was a P. E. Preceptor of Godfrey de Boullion Preceptory, had held important offices in all the Bodies of this Rite and was Grand Captain of the Guard of this Supreme Council. He

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deserved the rank and place he had attained, and the love and affection of his brethren.

In token of our sorrow for his death, and in honor of his memory, the furniture, jewels and implements of the Bodies of our Obedience will be draped for the space of sixty days; and may our Father who is in Heaven, have you in His holy keeping!

It is with profound sorrow that the Supreme Council have to announce the death of V. Ill.: Bro: Col.: Shadwell H. Clerke, 33°, an active member of their body, who went to his rest on the 25th December last.

Bro. CLERKE held the office of Grand Chancellor in the Supreme Council, was a past Grand Warden in the Mark Degree and in the Order of the Temple filled the high position of great Sub Prior; but he was even more widely known as Grand Secretary in the United Grand Lodge of England, a post in which for eleven years, he worked with constant zeal and attention and in which, it is not too much to say, he enjoyed the full confidence of the entire Masonic craft. It is unnecessary to dwell on the merits of one who thus held such a very prominent position in the several branches of Freemasonry and who was so widely known among all classes of English Freemasons, or to attempt in any way to enumerate the many bright and sterling qualities which he possessed in so eminent a degree, and which endeared

him to all with whom he came in contact, whether as intimate friends or as casual acquaintances.

The members of the Supreme Council, with whom the deceased was associated for many years, feel that they have lost in Bro.. CLERKE, not only a genial friend, but a wise and prudent counsellor, and they are confident that this feeling will be shared by the whole Body of Freemasons under their jurisdiction.

Bro.: CLERKE was initiated into Freemasonry at Malta as far back as the year 1855, from which time up to that of his decease he always proved himself to be an active, zealous and efficient member of the Craft. He joined the Ancient and Accepted Rite under the Irish jurisdiction, from which he was affiliated to the Supreme Council for England, and was, in 1873, appointed its Grand Secretary General. In the following year, 1874, he was, on the nomination of the Sovereign Grand Commander, unanimously elected to a seat in the Council, still retaining his Secretariat office, which he held until the year 1880, when he was selected by the M.W. the Grand Master, H.R. H. the Prince of Wales, to fill the high and important position of Grand Secretary to the United Grand Lodge of England.

Notwithstanding the many very arduous duties imposed upon him by this office, no one was more regular in his attendance at the weekly Committee meetings of the Council or more ready to render that assistance which his large experience in every branch of Freemasonry rendered him so eminently capable of giving.

As a mark of respect to the memory of the deceased, the Supreme Council direct that all Chapters under their jurisdiction shall appear in mourning for sixty days from the date of his decease.

Bro.'. Montague, who first saw the light of Masonry in the St. Paul's Lodge, at Montreal, in the year 1845, was admitted into the Ancient and Accepted Rite in 1856, being perfected in the "Coryton and Rougemont" Chapter at Exeter, on the 4th February of that year. In 1869, he became a member of the Supreme Council, in which he worked energetically and zealously for 21 years in various offices, resigning his seat at the close of 1890, owing to failing health.

Bro.: Montague was a prominent Mason in all branches of the Order. In the Craft, he was a Past Grand Deacon in the Grand Lodge of England and a Past Deputy Provincial Grand Master in the Province of Dorset. In Royal Arch Masonry he was Past Grand Superintendent for Dorset and Past Grand Sojourner in the Supreme Grand Chapter; while, in the Temple, he for some time held the office of Provincial Prior of Dorset.

The members of the Supreme Council mourn the loss of Bro. Montague as that of a tried and dear friend, and will long retain his memory with affectionate regard. 

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

FOREIGN AFFAIRS.

The Secretary-General prints a few notes on general matters connected with the Rite which may prove to be of general interest.

UNITED STATES.—Northern Jurisdiction.

The Annual Session for the year 1892—as stated in the address of the Sovereign Grand Commander—was held in Providence, R. I., in September. A report of the proceedings, with lists of the members, sketches and portraits of deceased members, and other like information make up a volume of nearly four hundred pages. Great attention is paid to the obituaries of deceased brethren. They are written in good taste, and present excellent summaries of the lives of the departed. The portraits are finely executed steel engravings. Among the memorial pages are two to active members of this Supreme Council—the late Ill... Bros... Robert T. Clinch and David McLellan. The address of Ill... Bro... Palmer, Sovereign Grand Commander, does not deal with any matter of foreign concern, but is a brief presentation of the more important facts connected with the home concerns of the Rite in his jurisdiction. The figures here given exhibit the initiates in three years.

"The past year," says the Grand Commander, "has not been an nuusually eventful one in this jurisdiction, not because the Rite has been dormant, or the brethren indolent or lethargic, but because it is now so well organized, and those charged with its administration are so thoroughly acquainted with the details of their duties that the subordinate bodies have been, and still are, quietly, peacefully, but energetically performing their allotted missions, and there has been little occasion for the exercise of official authority. The year, however, affords a record of satisfactory work and marked progress. The reports of the Deputies of the Supreme Council with one voice speak of zeal, progress and harmony in the Rite everywhere. Among the interesting events of the year was the conferring, at different Meetings of active and honorary members, of the thirty-third degree upon Bro.". WILLIAM SHERER, then Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New York; upon Thomas W. Palmer, a Senator of the United States from Michigan and President

of the Commissioners of the World's Columbian Exposition, and upon the Rt. Rev. John M. Walden, Bishop of Ohio. The death was announced of one active member and seventeen honorary members. A summary statement of the receipts showed that the income of the Supreme Council for the year was \$26,609.86, of which sum the dues of subordinate bodies provided \$14,369.50, the income of the permanent fund \$5,489.76, and fees for the thirty-third degree \$3,100. Among the expenditures were \$7,989.76 added to the permanent fund, and \$4,665 for the pay roll of active members who attended the session of \$1891. The permanent fund of the Supreme Council is \$111.090.38. Active membership in the Supreme Council was conferred upon two brothers, and honorary membership on eighteen. In his address Ill. Bro. Palmer said appropos of a gathering of Scottish Rite Masons the present year at Chicaco:

"All due arrangements are being perfected on a most gigantic scale for holding the World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago next year, in commemoration of the discovery of America by Christopher Columbus four hundred years ago. Those engaged in all branches of business, science, letters and art contemplate uniting in the great enterprise in the way of auxiliary organizations. It is understood that the Masonic fraternity of Illinois are arranging to bring together at Chicago, next year, during the continuance of the Columbian Exposition, as large a representation of the Masonic fraternity as may be practicable. It seems to be taken for granted that the next meeting of this Supreme Council will be held at Chicago. If you shall determine to hold our next meeting in that city it is probable that by proper effort the attendance of a representation from many of the Supreme Councils of the world can be secured on that occasion. As the site selected for this grand world's pageant is within the jurisdiction of the Supreme Council, it seems proper for it to co-operate with the fraternity in Illinois in making the Masonic feature of this gathering such as will be an honor to American freemasonry. Our meeting, if it shall be held at Chicago, might be made the nucleus of a world's congress of Scottish Masons for fraternal and social intercourse, for receiving and communicating information, for making acquaintances between brethren at a great distance from each other, and by friendly intercourse and exchange of fraternal courtesies, strengthen and make closer the bonds of brotherhood between Scottish Rite Masons of the different nations. We would gladly welcome to our Supreme Council the members of any or all of the other Supreme Councils with which we are in correspondence. The value of such a gathering of Scottish Rite Masons from all parts of the world can scarcely be over-

A Special Committee of the Supreme Council approved of the idea, and the Supreme Council will hold its next annual session in Chicago on the third Tuesday in September. The Supreme Council of the Northern

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MAS W. resident Jurisdiction consists of fifty Active, two Emeriti and two Past Active members. The dean of the body is Ill. Bro. David Sickels, whose active membership dates back to 1849.

UNITED STATES.—Southern Jurisdiction.

The Biennial Session of this Supreme Council was held in October, 1892, a few days before the meeting of the Supreme Council for Canada. The official record of its proceedings has not yet appeared. Ill.'. Bro.'. J. C. BATCHELOR was elected Sovereign Grand Commander to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Ill.'. Bro.'. PIKE. A great deal of the legislation was apparently of the most important character looking to the future, but in the absence of the official record definite reference is not advisable. Ill.'.Bro.'.FRED. WEBBER remains Secretary-General of the Council.

ENGLAND.

His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, 33°, is Grand Patron of the Supreme Council for England, and the Duke of Connaught, 33°, is an honorary member. The M. P. Sovereign Grand Commander is the Earl of Lathom. The vacancy in the office of Grand Chancellor, caused by the death of the lamented Bro.: Shadwell H. Clerke, is filled by the appointment of the Earl of Limerick, formerly the Grand Prior, to the position. Ill.: Bro.: the Rev. John Studholme Brownigg becomes the ninth member of the Supreme Council in place of Bro.'. CLERKE. In addition to the nine Active members and the two Princes of the Blood Royal, there are eight Inspector-Generals of Districts in England and five in the Colonies, nine unattached members and three retired members, making in all thirty-six members of the thirty third degree in the English register. There are forty-five members of the thirty-second degree active, thirteen "supernumery" and two honorary. Of the thirty-first degree there are ninety active members and thirty-one supernumeraries. There are upon the roll one hundred and eight Rose Croix Chapters in active operation. This Supreme Council has an invested fund of nearly £13,000 sterling. Its charitable donations since its organization in 1857 foot up to £4,500 and all its business affairs are managed in the most satisfactory manner. It is in alliance with twentythree Supreme Councils.

IRELAND.

The Grand Secretary has noticed with deep regret in the secular press announcement of the death of Ill.. Bro.. John Fitzhenry Townshend, M.P., Sovereign Grand Commander of the Supreme Council for Ireland, and an honorary member of the Supreme Council for Canada. For many years Ill.. Bro.. Townshend has been the illuminating spirit of the Rite in Ireland, and his well worn years, his honorable life, his judicial mind and clear intellect. won for him admiration from all who knew him.

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SCOTLAND.

There are nine active members in the Supreme Council for Scotland, presided over by Ill. Bro. Sir Michael R. Shaw Stewart, Sov. Grand Commander; Ill.: Bro.: LINDSAY MACKERSY is Grand Secretary-Members lately added to the Supreme Council are Lord Saltoun and the Marquis of Breadalbane. In addition to the active members there are upon the roll four honorary members who were formerly active, and there are ten other members of the thirty-third degree, one of whom is in India, one in China, four are in New Zealand, one is in the West Indies, one at Capetown, Africa, and three at Queensland. There are twenty-three members of the thirty-second degree, and twenty-five of the thirty-first degree; twelve Rose Croix Chapters and six Consistories of the thirtieth degree constitute the subordinates of the Supreme Council, the majority of which are in the Colonies. The Supreme Council, in fitting terms, deplores the loss it has sustained by the death of Ill.: Bro.: Sir Henry Morland, 33°, its Sovereign Grand Inspector-General in India. "It is impossible," it declares, "to adequately express the services rendered to this Council by their departed brother. For many years he presided over the bodies holding of this Council in India with distinguished ability and zeal. But what he will be even more particularly remembered for, is the active part he took in removing misunderstandings which had caused a difference between this Council and the Supreme Council of England. To his exertions are mainly due the happy removal of difficulties and the present cordial relations between the two Councils. In order to fill the place in India made vacant by the death of Bro.: MORLAND, the Supreme Council resolved to apply to the Supreme Council for England for permission to affiliate Ill.: Bro.: James William Smith, Bombay, an English thirty-first, and to confer upon him the 32° and $33^{\circ}. \;\;$ The Supreme Council for England courteously gave the permission. At the sitting of the Supreme Council of 28th January, 1892, it is stated that "the Grand Secretary read communications from the Supreme Council of England as to the propriety of allowing sister Councils to advance to higher degrees brethren belonging to the jurisdiction of other Councils. The Supreme Council were unanimously of opinion that in no case should this be done except with the sanction of the Council to which such brethren owed obedience previously obtained. The Supreme Council did not think that in no case should such consent be given, as circumstances might arise which rendered it desirable—as, for example, in the case of a brother coming to reside permanently within the jurisdiction of a Supreme Council other than that of his obedience—but they considered that for the sake of the dignity of the Order, and for its good government, such sanction should be charily given, and only in exceptional circumstances. The Supreme Council had occasion to consider a similar question attentively some years ago. A member of one of their higher degrees asked

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permission to take the 33° from the Supreme Council of a foreign country -a country which the Supreme Council believed the brother referred to had never visited, and in which he had no intention of residing. Of course the sanction was refused and very properly so. At the sitting of the Supreme Council on 19th April, 1892, it "was honored with a visit from the Supreme Council of England," represented by the Ill.: Lieutenant Grand Commander and three other members, and the "two Supreme Councils conferred as to matters affecting the welfare of the Order, and a joint course of action was agreed upon." The Supreme Council withdrew from association with the body at Alexandria, of which Bro. Oddi was Grand Secretary, and recognized that at Cairo, of which Ill. . Bro. . Figari is Sov. Grand Commander as the Supreme Council for Egypt. It also recognized and resolved to exchange representatives with the Supreme Council for Central America, whose See is at Guatemala. Deaths of members of the thirty-third degree recorded between 7th May, 1891, and 2nd May, 1892, are Sir Henry Morland, India, and Louis COURT and JOHN BAYLEE, New Zealand.

FRANCE.

The Supreme Council for France is gradually overcoming the difficulties which arose out of loose financial conditions in the past. It is also insisting that brethren of the high grades, who as such have seats in the Grand Lodge Central, shall fairly discharge their obligations to the treasury of the Rite or they are relieved from their representative functions. Many of the official statements show that a majority of the subordinate bodies, lodges, chapters, areopages, are not prompt in making their returns, a condition of things bad for the bodies themselves, unjust to initiates, and unfair to the governing body. This, however, is being overcome. Otherwise there is great activity among the different branches of the Rite in France, not merely in the dedication of halls, the observance of masonic festivals, but in the discussion of many questions of a social and even economic kind, which are not regarded as proper subjects for consideration in our subordinate bodies. On 5th April, 1892, the Supreme Council held an agape, which was participated in by members of the 32° and 31°. The proceedings were directed by the Ill.. Lieutenant Grand Commander, Bro.: GONUARD, a most effective and faithful mason, and the Sovereign Grand Commander, who invited him to preside, sat upon his right. Formal welcome was given to brethren who had been recently admitted to the higher degree, after which the Grand Orator delivered a brilliant address, which won for him warm applause. The table ceremony was then carried out, following the ritual of the 31°, and the usual libations followed to the officers of the Supreme Council, the whole under the direction of Lieutenant Grand Commander. An interesting event of the evening was the presentation by the Ill.: Bro. Grand Chancellor RAYMOND to each of the guests of the evening of a portrait of the well-beloved Chief of the Obedience, Ill.'. Bro.'.

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Proal, who was deeply affected by the evidences of good feeling displayed towards him. It cannot be ascertained from the "Memorandum" published by the Supreme Council of France what are the number of its subordinate bodies or of the Masons of its obedience. In every other respects the publication is one of great interest.

DOMINICA.

In these notes last year the Secretary-General noted dissensions which have arisen in the Republic of Dominica over the promulgation of a new constitution for the Rite. Unhappily these dissensions have divided the brethren there, and there are two bodies each claiming to be a Supreme Council. Each has its organ, and each is issuing documents Since the organization of the Supreme Council we have known only the Supreme Council in Dominica over which Ill.: Bro. Jacinto de Castro presides, and he is an honorary member of our Council. A communication from him dated St. Domingo, Nov. 12th, 1892, and countersigned by $\mbox{ Frederico Ramirez}$ as Lt. Grand Commander, N. Henriquez, Grand Minister of State, and Eugenio de Marchono, Grand Secretary-General, announces that Pedro A. Delgado, lately Lt. Grand Commander, Santiago Geraldino, ex-Grand Standard Bearer, Rafael Alardo, ex-Grand Treasurer of the Supreme Council, and Frederic Girandi, late active member, have been declared irregular, they having separated from the Supreme Council of the National Freemasonry. It appears that Martin Rodriguez, who had possession of the archives, probably as successor to the late Secretary-General, Bro. $\dot{}$. Lucas Gibbes, has placed them in control of the opposing group, of which hehas become Secretary, the Bro. Delgado being the head. The Supreme Council for Canada cannot do anything more for the present than to maintain its existing relations with the body over which Bro.: Jacinto There is no evidence whatever before it that his Council has in any way exceeded its lawful powers. The schism is, however, deeply to be regretted. Masonic conditions in that Republic demand of the brethren the most complete harmony and the best of good feeling, instead of which there is presented to the world a very un-

PERU.

The vacancy in the office of Sovereign Grand Commander of the Supreme Council for Peru, caused by the death of Ill.: Bro.: Francisca ZAVIER MARIATEGUI, is filled by the election of Ill.'. Bro.'. MANUEL Beingebalo to the position. This Supreme Council has withdrawn all connection with the Egyptian organization at Alexandria, and has entered into relations with the Supreme Council at Cairo.

BRAZIL.

The Grand Orient, Brazil, publishes a monthly bulletin, which is the Grand Orient and of the Supreme Council, reports of meetings of

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subordinate bodies, and disquisitions and essays upon many subjects of interest to the Freemasons of Brazil. A new Masonic constitution was promulgated in Brazil about two years ago. In a sense the Masonic government in that country is a federation, in which the "Modern Rite" is represented as well as the Scottish Rite, and there is a system of State Grand Lodges. The Grand Orient appears to have control over the whole federation of Freemasonry, and it contains among its members representatives of the 7°, the highest degree of the Modern Rite, as well as active thirty-third degree members of the Scottish Rite. The Scottish Rite, so far as its internal affairs are concerned, is independent, but for the federation purposes the Grand Orient is the supreme power. Apparently the head of the Supreme Council becomes the Grand Master of the Order. For the past year or more the duties of both offices are discharged by Ill.'. Bro.'. Antonio Joaquin de Maedo Soares, who, as Grand Master adjunct and Lieutenant Grand Commander, acts as head of the craft since the resignation (soon after followed by his death) of General Manuel D. La Fonseca, who found that the duties of his position as President of the Republic imposed upon him so much labor that he could not satisfactorily discharge the duties of both offices.

OTHER SUPREME COUNCILS.

Nothing of special note in the proceedings of other Supreme Councils has come under the observation of the Secretary-General. As a whole the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite is making good progress, and many difficult matters which have presented themselves to its adherents, arising out of its particular form of government are being satisfactorily solved. The Secretary-General reports that he has not in the past year received the bulletin of the Supreme Council of Belgium, which always presents a most excellent compendium of the proceedings of the Rite in other lands.

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For the information of members of the Rite in other parts of Canada it may be of interest to state that the brethren in St. John, N. B., have lately finished a suite of apartments for the exclusive use of the Rite in that city. An unfinished portion of the Freemasons' Hall was taken, and a local paper says : " A considerable amount of work has been done in the building to bring in these upper rooms. been completed and the hallway plastered and finished. On the side of The main stairway has the building near Trinity Church is a room 34 feet by 22 feet 3 inches in breadth, lighted with a combined fixture for gas and electricity; it is richly carpeted, and has a broad approach and several ante-rooms similarly carpeted. These will be used in connection with a part of the "work" of the Lodge of Perfection. On the other side of the main hallway is the Rose Croix room, 41 feet long by 21 feet broad. This room and its adjacent rooms are also handsomely carpeted. It is lighted with two electroliers, and it has several curious and labyrinthine chambers. Members of the Rite here say that these apartments are superior to any similarly fitted apartments in Canada—except those at Hamilton, which they at least equal.

TRIBUTE TO THE MEMORY OF DEPARTED BRETHREN,

Offered at the Thirteenth Annual Reunion of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, held at Hamilton, Ont., on the Evening of the 20th of January, 1893.

Ill.: Bro.: Hugh Murray, 33°. Commander-in-Chief of Moore Consistory, in the chair.

After the removal of the cloth, the Chairman drew attention to the fact that it had been for some time the custom, at the annual banquets of the A. and A. S. R., to recall the memories of those brethren who can never be with us here again, and called upon Ill.'. Bro.'. W. H. BALLARD, 33°, to propose the toast to our departed brethren, which he did as follows:

ILLUSTRIOUS CHAIRMAN,—The sad duty which fell to my lot a year ago of calling up some memories of the departed, of lifting the lid of the casket and taking another last look at the fading features of the dead, has again devolved upon me, and I have accepted the trust with the consciousness of a grave responsibility, a responsibility immeasurably increased by the large number and by the high standing in the Rite of the brethren who have been called upon to obey the final summons since our pleasant meeting here a short twelve-month since.

To contemplate the loss of any brother of an order whose members

are bound together, as those of the Scottish Rite are bound together, by such self-imposed responsibility of discharging efficiently the higher moral and social duties, is sad enough however slight our personal acquaintance with him may have been. But when he has been a cherished friend; when the closest intimacy has existed between us; when we have shared with him his hopes, his ambitions, his successes; his disappointments, his losses and his griefs, it may seem like a solemn mockery to attempt to give fitting expression in words to a sorrow that may lie too deep even for tears.

And yet something more than mere passing mention is due to those illustrious names, some of which have for years shone forth in golden letters on the honor roll of the Scottish Rite,—names whose possessors have been honored with high and responsible offices by their brethren—names endeared to most of us by recollections of which "only the sunny hours are numbered." for it is ever true that

"Food memory sifts from the past its pain, And suffers the pleasure alone to remain."

A few weeks after our last re-union, a beloved brother of our Rite, one whose memory will long live in the hearts of his friends, was summoned away and Ill.: Bro.: EDWARD MITCHELL, 33°, passed to his rest. It is almost impossible to give adequate expression to the sense of the loss we have sustained in the removal of one who has been so long held in the highest regard among Freemasons. Best loved by those who knew him most intimately he won the esteem and affection of all. The many excellences of his character were such as to secure to him the personal attachment of his friends to a degree rarely witnessed. Ever most solicitous himself, to have engraved on the hearts of the living, kindly memories of the dead, he would ask from his brethren no better monument than that his memory should be fondly cherished among them. His own wish would be, and I cannot do better than quote the words used by himself—it seems but yesterday—when he so feelingly discharged the duty which I have undertaken to-night. His own wish would be "that we should recall to our minds, either the kind word, the pleasant glance, the cheerful smile, the brotherly grasp, the loving counsel and advice, or the generous actions; and that we should keep his memory fresh and green in our hearts."

Let it be our duty—nay, rather our privilege, my brethren—to raise to his memory this monument of fond recollection so worthily deserved by his virtues so easily gathered from the generous wealth of affection which the genial sunshire of his companionship has caused to spring up among us.

A week later death, with relentless hand, struck down another member of our Order, and Ill.. Bro.. Charles Robertson, 30°, was called from his labors.

"He was my friend, faithful and just to me."

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told ve otherw friends Kind, courteous and scholarly, it was a rare privilege to know him and to be able to greet him as a brother.

Retiring in disposition, he shrank from the mean ambition which courts the transient brilliancy of an ephemeral reputation, preferring rather that his memory should be enshrined in the hearts of his friends, like a precious stone whose lustre dims not with advancing years.

He looked to the present duty and the most honorable and efficient method of discharging it rather than to the good name that is ever sure to attach to the memory of him who performs well and faithfully the work he finds ready at his hand.

Whether we regard his conscientious unswerving devotion to his duty; the patient, manly fortitude with which he bore the sufferings of his last illness; the Christian resignation with which he laid aside the prospective pleasures and successes of this life; or the implicit faith which gave him the confident hope

"That he would meet his Pilot face to face When he had crost the bar."

we may read a lesson which it befits us all to lay to heart, and which we shall do well not wholly to disregard.

"Meekly he gave his being up and went To share the holy rest that waits a life well spent."

Following these in quick succession came a third. Truly it was felt— $\,$

"The air was full of farewells to the dying And mourning for the dead."

when two weeks later another name—one which will long be held in grateful remembrance—was added to the ever lengthening roll of the dead, and we were called upon to mourn the loss of Ill. Bro. David McLellan, 33°. A man of sterling integrity and uprightness, he always possessed the confidence of those associated with him, and was invariably entrusted with offices of the highest responsibility. Enthusiastic in all that he undertook, but most so in performing an act of kindness or a charitable deed, he recognized fully and performed honestly his Masonic duty, of pouring relief and consolation into the hearts of the afflicted, the distressed and the destitute.

He held a good name to be of more value than worldly possessions, and left behind him an honored reputation whose brightness the breath of calumny can never dim.

Possessed of almost exhaustless energy he took upon himself an amount of work which few men would have dared to undertake. This told very heavily upon him and helped to cut short a life which might otherwise have been spared for years and been a source of joy to many friends crushed by grief at its sudden termination. When we recall the

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"We are glad that he has lived thus long And glad that he has gone to his reward; Nor can we deem that Nature did him wrong Softly to disengage the vital cord."

We may well take a lesson from the lives of these men and resolve that each of us will

"So live that when his summons comes to join The innumerable caravan, which moves To that mysterious realm, where each shall take His chamber in the silent halls of death. He go not, like the quarry slave at night, Scourged to his dungeon, but sustained and soothed By an unfaltering trust, approach his grave Like one who wraps the drapery of his couch About him, and lies down to pleasant dreams."

(Here the roil of departed brethren was read.)

With an assurance that no strand is broken in the cord of brotherly affection that bound our hearts to theirs in life, pledging our homage to their virtues and dropping a tear of sympathy in sorrow for their faults—let us drink a solemn farewell to the silent dead.

The choir then sang "Shall We Gather at the River?"
