

FOUGHT DUEL TO DEATH ASTRIDE OF A CANOE

Fort William, Ont., May 17—(Special)—
As a result of a feud which had its inception in Nipigon, a small town sixty miles east of Fort Williams, W. A. Armstrong and Isadore Bouchard, formerly employed on the projected line of the transcontinental railway, are dead in Helen Lake on the North Shore of Lake Superfor.






