

### REPORT.

The Committee of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute, at the close of another year, beg to present a report of their proceedings during that period.

In 1823, the first Mechanics' Institute was established in Great Britain. As these Institutions gradually increased, many predicted that they were destined to decline and die. After an experience of more than 30 years, however, we find, that in proportion as education has advanced, they have become more prosperous; their permanence more firmly secured; and that in the present day, they rank with the great modern agencies, calculated to foster and extend education. Mechanics' Institutes were established with a view to afford means for the attainment of scientific knowledge by the artisan classes, and thereby to promote mechanical inventions; to open up a path for the development of natural ability; and to improve generally the intellectual culture of society. It was justly conceived, that, aided by education, many advantages would result to the community, from "adding to dexterity of hand and ingenuity of head, a knowledge of the scientific principles which are the foundation of every mechanical art."

The improvements and inventions, which are frequently presented for our inspection and admiration, bear pleasing testimony to the utility of these and kindred institutions and lead to the opinion, that the most sanguine hopes entertained of their success, will be realized at no very distant day.

It is a matter of much gratification to your Committee to be able to record the evidences of another successful year in the history of the Institute; successful, at least so far as receiving large accessions to its membership; and a growing disposition to embrace the advantages for mental improvement which it affords.

The increase of members since the last Annual Meeting, cannot fail to be satisfactory, in a high degree, to the friends and supporters of the Institute.

have been occupied at the sum required to finish it being much larger than was anticipated, your Committee were obliged to suspend the works until the necessary funds could be raised. An appeal has recently been made to the members, and the public generally, for additional aid, to finish, at least, as many rooms in the building as may be necessary for the accommodation of the Institute, and serve as offices for rental; the proceeds of the latter to be applied to the payment of interest on the present loan. The appeal has been partially successful; many of the members and citizens, already called upon, having subscribed liberally; and it is the opinion of your committee that when the canvass of the city shall have been made, a sufficient sum will be realized to complete those parts of the building referred to.

In October last, Lord Elgin-late Governor General of Canada-paid a farewell visit to this city previous to his departure for England. During his stay, your Committee took the opportunity of waiting upon his Excellency with an address, acknowledging the support which, during the term of his Excellency's administration, had been generally extended to this Institution, of which he was the patron-referring also to the establishment of a successful and enlightened system of education in the Province, and his Excellency's active sympathy and aid to societies specially calculated to elevate and strengthen mechanical and agricultural industry among us. In replying to the address, his Excellency remarked, that he had "always considered it an imperative duty, whilst engaged in the administration of the affairs of this Province, to promote, to the best of his ability, the education of the people; and had always desired to render especial assistance to Mechanics' Institutes, because they practically illustrated the principle of self-improvement."

Your Committee have to record the removal, by death, during the year, of two members of long standing, the late Mr. William Atkinson, and Mr. Francis Thomas. They were among the early members of the Institute, and continued their connection with it up to the time of their death. For many years they served as members of the General Committee, and from the commencement took a warm interest in its affairs, and, by advice and assistance, did much to affect its permanent interests.

The Finances of the Institute for the past year, as shewn by the Treasurer's Account, exhibit an increase over the previous year of £51 17s.  $2\frac{1}{2}$ d., leaving a balance in hand, after paying current expenses and appropriating £50 to building purposes, of £22 18s. 2d.

For details of General Account and Building Fund, see Statements submitted herewith.

It is the opinion of your Committee, that an advance on the present rates of annual subscriptions is very desirable; and that the members need only to be reminded of the increased cost of lighting and heating, and the other necessary requirements of the Institute, to obtain their hearty concurrence to the proposition. The scale proposed is as follows:—For ordinary members, ten shillings per annum, instead of seven shillings and sixpence; and for junior members, six shillings and threepence, instead of five shillings; and to abolish the entrance fees altogether. It may be observed, that, whilst the sum to each will appear comparatively trifling, it will in the aggregate be of considerable importance to the Institute.

Your Committee respectfully suggest, that the duties connected with, as well as the importance and usefulness of, the Institute, which, for years past, have been steadily increasing, have now arrived at a point to require the entire services of an officer who shall act in the capacity of Secretary and Librarian, and manage the affairs of the Institute, under the direction and control of the General Committee.

Your Committee refer, with pleasure, to the generous disposition manifested by the numerous friends of the Institute. When their sympathies have been appealed to, and their aid required, they have shewn, in a substantial manner, their appreciation of an enterprise in every way worthy of countenance and support. 

### SPECIAL MEETING.

A Special Meeting of the members of the Institute, was held on Saturday evening, May 19th, 1855; the President, G. W. Allan, Esq., in the Chair.

The President stated the object of the meeting, viz., to take into consideration a proposition made by the Provincial Government, to lease the new Hall of the Institute for four years, as Offices for Public Departments.

A memorandum,—forming the basis of agreement,—drawn up by Hon. H. H. Killaly, and approved of by the General Committee of the Institute, was then read by the Secretary, as follows:

"In the event of the new Mechanics' Institute Hall being placed at the disposal of Government, during the time of its being carried on in Toronto (say for four years), the following is understood to be the basis of the arrangement to be entered into between the parties, viz.: The Government to be at liberty to divide and partition the interior to suit the wants of the several departments to be accommodated in it; but, on, or prior to, its being handed up to the Institute, the building is to be completed and left in the state in which it was intended it was to have been for the purposes of the Institute; that the Government shall pay the interest on the debt (£4,600) while they occupy the building; shall discharge the present liabilities of the building, or otherwise arrange with the respective parties for the same; they shall also keep the building insured,-during the time of its being occupied for public purposes,—for the sum of £6,000; and shall pay to the Institute the sum of £100 a-year, to cover the rent, &c., of the temporary accommodation of the Institute during the time the Hall is occupied."

Several members having addressed the meeting in favour of the arrangement, it was

Moved by Mr. J. Duggan, seconded by Mr. T. Sellar, and

Resolved. "That this meeting,—taking into consideration the liberal offer made by the Provincial Government, through the Hon. Mr. Killaly, for the use of the new Mechanics' Institute Hon. Mr. Killaly, for the use of four years,—recommend that the Building, during the period of four years,—recommend that the said offer be accepted, on the conditions mentioned in the memorandum of agreement drawn up by Mr. Killaly, which memorandum was approved of by the General Committee, at a meeting held on Friday, the 18th instant; and that the President and Committee take immediate steps to conclude the same."

The meeting then adjourned.
