



NOVEL COLLAPSIBLE TOWER

For life-saving and fire-fighting purposes, a Salem, Mass, inventor has designed a collapsible tower which may be extended to a height of 100 ft, in approximately one minute, says the November Popular Mechanics Magazine in an illustrated article. Its plan of construction is not greatly unlike that of some of the folding observation structures employed in the field by European armies. At the top it supports a working platform for the fire fighters, on one end of which is fixed a short extension ladder which may be adjusted to various

Fixed in the middle of the shaft is a basket elevator that is intended to be used for lowering persons rescued from burning buildings. Two leads of fire hose secured to the "fighting top" are carried up with the tower as it is raised. The device is intended to be mounted on a motor truck and operated by the machine's power plant. When collapsed it fills the space back of the driver's seat.

Just a few lines in answer to your letter of the 17th inst (and also to thank you kindly for the G. P. C. and handkerchief, which, by the way, came in quite handy. Well I suppose you have read in the St. John papers the splendid account of the fighting 26th gave of themselves during their six days in the trenches and I must honestly say that we have no shirkers or no cold-feet boys. We lost quite a few in the attack but we had the Germans on the run and mowed down about 800. We had a letter of congratulation from our brigadier and also from our corps commander, complimenting us on ear gallant stand, which was the means of capturing some of the ememy's trenches further along the line. We came out of the trenches on October 15, two days after the attack, for a few days rest, and we are ready was worth listening to.

I lost one of my boys, Lance. Corporal J. Stevens, one of the best N. Co's in my platoon. But we cannot expect to fight without losing some of our comrades, and at the same time all that we have lost are heroes, and their names and deeds will never be forgotten by our surviving comrades. Well, you know that I cannot say much in my letters, as they are censored, but at the same time "C' Company 26th Battl sends their best wishes to you, hoping this will find you in the best of health.
