



THE WAR NEWS

The European situation has undergone a marked change during the last week. Italy, with a strong army and navy, is not only into the war on the side of the Allies, but she is reported to be pledged not to make a separate peace. There is now a stronger probability than before that Roumania will also declare war against Austria, and such action on her part would be of immense value to the cause of the Allies because of her strategic position, and because she has nearly half a million seasoned troops who are among the hardest fighters in Europe.

In the west the French have gained what they claim is a very important advantage, while the British have also

advantage, while the British have also met with some further successes; while all the counter attacks by the Germans Judge Russell of Halifax, in a review

In the meantime the British forces are continue there are the state of well-trained men at the front.

At the Dardanelles the Allies continue to press steadily against the enemy, repulsing all attacks and gradually gains ing a stronger foothold. It is recognised that they have enormous difficulties to overcome, but they have met with no serious reverse and continue their aggressive movement with ever-increasing force.

From the Russian armies comes news that the Austro-German advance in the centre, which pressed the Russians back and exused them to abandon much have been checked, and that the Russians have begun a new offensive movement have begun and hav

united with but one great purpose—the prosecution of the war to a successful issue. The leaders of both parties agree that there is to be no partisanship, but only patriotism, until the task is accomplished. Happily also, the Italian people, who were lately divided into two camps holding very conflicting views, have sunk their differences, and a united Italy stands behind the king and his cabinet.

Each day brings its contribution to the story of German savagery. One of the latest is that the Prussians deliberately fired upon and killed a large number of Bavarian soldiers who were about to surrender to the British. The story is doubtless true. Apparently there is no consideration, either of kindred or humanity, that can appeal to these butchers.



Recruiting officers will be found at all the principal points of New Brunswick. Men will on application be submitted to a preliminary medical examination and will be furnished at once with transportation to Sussex, where the 55th Regiment is now in camp. On reaching Sussex they will undergo the final medical examination and will if satisfactory be placed immediately upon the pay roll.

The conditions are as follows:

#### THE VOLUNTEERS

THE PERIOD OF ENLISTMENT is for the duration of the war and for six months after termination if required.

THE RATE OF PAY is \$1.10 per day and found for seven days a week, equal to \$33 per month.

IF DISABLED, the soldier will receive a pension at such rates as may be fixed by the Government.

IF WOUNDED OR ILL, the soldier will be well cared for and sent back to his home at the proper time.

#### THEIR FAMILIES

SOLDIERS MAY ASSIGN any portion of their regular pay to wives or others, and such sums will be paid regularly to the persons

WIVES OF VOLUNTEERS will receive twenty dollars per month separation allowance from the Canadian Government over and above the soldiers pay.

THE PATRIOTIC FUND will supplement this with an additional allowance as described

SHOULD ANY OF THE SOLDIERS BE KILLED their wives and children will become wards of the Canadian Government, and generous provision will be made for them.

The National Patriotic Fund Committee has decided on a basis of distribution of funds among the wives and children, and other dependents of volunteers. It is estimated that a wife on her own account requires Thirty Dollars Per Month for her maintenance. The Canadian Government provides Twenty Dollars per month of this amount and the Patriotic Fund the remaining Ten Dollars, if required. Children between ten and fifteen years of age are allowed twenty-five cents per day; from five to ten years of age, fifteen cents per day; and under five years of age, ten cents per day. Thus a wife and three children of the ages of three, seven and twelve, may receive a total monthly allowance of Forty-five Dollars, of which Twenty Dollars is payable by the Canadian Government and Twenty-five Dollars by the Patriotic Fund. This is of course in addition to the Thirty-three Dollars per month paid to the soldier, and which may be assigned by him to his family.

Besides the above, provision is made for a compassionate allowance for temporary extraordinary need, such as accident, sickness, etc. In short, the whole purpose of the Patriotic Fund is so to supplement the Government allowance as to provide all reasonable comfort for the families of men on service. Such provision, in each individual case, is subject to the report of local committees, who shall consider all the circumstances of families affected, with respect to the earnings of members of such families, amounts received from former employer of

Every reasonable provision is thus made for dependent relatives, and volunteers need have no anxiety regarding the welfare of those left behind.
