TEACHERS ADD ABOUT 15 P. C. TO SCHEDULE

Salaries for the Year of 1921-1922

Early Run of Ice in St. John River Looked For, Maybe Within Week—Fire in Devon—News of Fredericton.

(Canadian Press.)

Fredericton, March 26—The N. B. Teachers' Association executive has adopted a new schedule of salaries for 1921-22 which will average about 15 per cent more than the schedule in effect at present.

The membership of the association consists of 800 teachers. A report presented by A. S. McParlane, secretary, showed that during the last year 260 teachers had joined the association, of whom 168 were second and third class. The total number of teachers in the province is in the vicinity of 2,000.

Fredericton, N. B., March 26—The attempt on the part of sawmill operators in this vicinity again to place their plants on the ten-hour-day basis will, it is said, be resisted. The shaker leaders' union already has announced that it will resist the restoration of the ten-hour day, and the Fredericton branch of the Farmers' Co-operative Limited, which is considered at a special meeting of directors on Tuesday. He has been asked to reconsider his resignation.

The dry goods and boot and shoe store of Cecil K. Bailey, Union street, Devon, was destroyed by fire at one o'clock this morning. The firemen prevented the flames from spreading to neighboring buildings. The stock was destroyed. It was partially insured.

N. S. TEACHERS COMPLETING ORGANIZATION

Truro, N. S., March 26—A representative gathering of the school teachers of Nova Scotia here yesterday met the executive of the Nova Scotia Teachers' Union and made definite plans for completion of the organization of teachers throughout the province.

It was decided to approach the provincial government as a body to ask for changes in several matters of educational importance.

The teachers particularly deplored the fact that rural schools of the province were being flooded by teachers holding low-grade or permissive licenses.

SPECIAL TRIP OF MAGGIE MILLER

The ferry steamer Maggie Miller made a special trip to Summerville this morning to accommodate the farmers living along that side of the Kennebecasis river. It is said to be the earliest trip ever made by a ferry on that service.

About twenty-five residents from Summerville to White Head and Bayswater availed themselves of the opportunity and brought a considerable quantity of eggs and butter to the city. They sold their eggs for forty cents by the lot, and forty-five retail, and the butter from fifty to fifty-eight cents a pound. The ferry will not go on regularly for another week or ten days, as more repairs are needed. Owing to the ice around the boats at Millidgeville, the ferry brought the passengers to Indiantown.

PUTS BLAME ON EX-PRESIDENT

Charges Against Wilson in Lansing's Book "Secret Diplomacy," Delay in Peace-Making, Shantung Settlement and Other Alleged Mistakes. New York, March 26—Woodrow Wilson is charged with the blame for the "secret diplomacy" at Paris, for the long delay in making peace, for the Shantung settlement, and for many other alleged mistakes in the treaty, in a long swailed book by Robert Lansing, former secretary of state. This contribution to the battle of books raging about the personality of the former president and about the Paris peace negotiations will be placed on sale today. Mr. Lansing appeals to the public to judge between himself and Mr. Wilson. Though written to justify Mr. Lansing, almost every word of the book relates to Mr. Wilson. It is a study of the uniquely interesting character of the ex-president observed in action at close range through the spectacles of his secretary of state. In spite of the apparent purpose to construe all doubtful points in his favor, Mr. Wilson is pictured in every chapter as committing a blunder, abandoning a principle, displaying a curious ignorance of the limits of his powers, falling into an obvious trap, or surrendering weakly before a bluff. Mr. Wilson is represented as being untried by his very high intelligence and sagacious and astute men, who sought to use him for their own ends. Referring to the Shantung matter, Mr. Lansing, in one of his rare lapses from polite language, says the ex-president was made "a cat's paw."

SEIZE BIG STILL ON NORTH SHORE

Crossman Fined \$408.50—Barrels of Brew Destroyed and Loads Taken Out. (Special to The Times.) Chatham, N. B., March 26—The largest still ever operated in this province was seized yesterday morning by Inspector Quarterman, Gammon and Stewart. It was situated about thirty-three miles north of Newcastle near Harv's Camp just over the Gloucester line. Inspector Quarterman had obtained knowledge that the still had been brought here from Millville some time ago and he investigated quietly with the result that he was able to locate its home brew from a man named Grossman. After a consultation with Chief Hawthorne and Inspectors Gammon and Stewart drove thirty-three miles to the scene and found an elaborate still in full operation, and placed a man named Grossman under arrest. They destroyed the still and seized 170 barrels of brew and hauled out two loads with teams. Grossman was taken before Magistrate Lawlor and pleaded guilty and fined \$408.50. Inspector Stewart has also seized a quantity of liquor supposed to be home brew from a man named Ebenezer Negus. This he is now having analyzed.

Washington, March 26—Lieutenant-Colonel J. J. Morrow, army engineer corps, undertook to have been selected by President Harding as governor of the Panama Canal zone to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Colonel Chester Harding. Colonel Morrow is now acting governor of the zone.

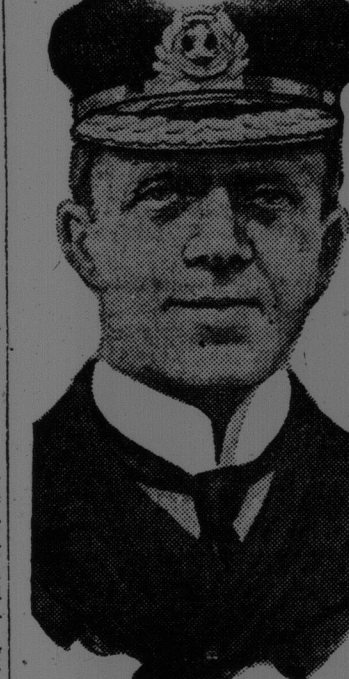
JAP WARSHIPS TO DEFEND FISHERIES

HOCKEY CRITICS CHANGE OPINION

Concede Ottawa Senators Have Chance to Win Championship—Cleghorn and Neighbor Play Star Game. Ottawa, March 26—In a special to the Ottawa Citizen from Vancouver, T. P. Gorman says of Thursday night's Stanley Cup game: Vancouver critics have changed their opinion with regard to the Ottawa hockey club and the world's championship series. The match took place under the six-man system with all the eastern rules in effect. Their victory was a clean one. Coming from behind in the face of a two-goal lead, Ottawa in the second period, and then won out in the third after one of the most spectacular contests ever witnessed on the coast. While Neighbor stood out as the most brilliant player on the ice, his poke check working havoc with the Vancouver attack and he himself going in until he was ready to drop, the real hero of the sensational struggle was not the flashy Neighbor. It wasn't Darragh, whose name and shot put Ottawa on even terms in the second period, nor was it Broadbent, who notched the winning goal. It was big Surague Cleghorn. Ottawa took a chance in starting Cleghorn on the line and shifting Boucher to the line and in the first five minutes it looked as though the management had made a blunder, but Cleghorn quickly regained his old-time form and thereafter he was the most useful man on the ice. He stepped into the Vancouver forwards time after time, sent MacKay, Adams and others sprawling with heavy body checks and intercepted pass after pass when goals seemed certain. Cleghorn carried the puck down for Vancouver's first goal in the opening period and it was he who brought it through the little village where they tally the decisive one. Vancouver fans gave the big Ottawa star a rough passage and kept shouting to the referee to put Cleghorn off. Jack Adams on one occasion skated over to Frank Patrick and shouted: "If Cleghorn does not stop his high checking I'll stop it for him." But Sprague stood out fearless in the face of a terrific panning and was one of the freshest men on the ice at the finish. He went the full hour excepting for a three-minute rest in the first and was undoubtedly Ottawa's trump card. Lehman saved Vancouver time after time, while Cook, MacKay and Adams were also effective. Neighbor refused to be delayed and on the night's play he certainly had a decisive margin over the celebrated centre man of the Pacific coast champions.

ST. LAWRENCE IS THROWING OFF ITS ICE COAT

Montreal, March 26—The St. Lawrence river, between Three Rivers and Lake St. Peter, was cleared of ice yesterday, and this morning the ice in Lake St. Peter, which forms the principal barrier to river navigation below Montreal was reported to be moving. The channel is now clear from Montreal to Longue Point. For some days the river has been open from Three Rivers to the Gulf, but the opening of navigation may be delayed by ice conditions in the lower gulf. According to reports the mild winter has set free an unusual number of small bergs, which have drifted into the gulf. Latest advices, however, are that the gulf ice has been melting eastward, and that sealing vessels which were caught in the ice a few days ago, report better prospects of an early clearing of the gulf.

That is Rumor in Ottawa—
Canadian and British
Money Men Said To Be In
It.
Montreal, March 25.—The Herald's Ottawa correspondent says:
The recent statement by the Hon. Mr. Reid, minister of railways, on the railway situation, is taken here to mean that radical changes are impending which will mean that absolute control of the national system will pass into control of a private syndicate. It is rumored that a syndicate composed of prominent Canadian and British financiers might be induced to take over the operation of the roads, if not their actual possession. Frequent visits of prominent railway men from Montreal have strengthened the rumors that negotiations and developing and that a special session might be called in the fall to consider the plan should arrangements with the suggested syndicate be completed and the financial plans fully matured.

Baltimore, March 26.—Among hundreds of messages of sympathy and condolence at the death of Cardinal Gibbons that continue to pour in from persons of all creeds and rank was an official testimonial from the Baltimore Hebrew congregation. It extended the sympathy of the congregation to the members of the household and to their "Catholic brethren of Baltimore."
A glowing tribute to the cardinal's memory was in a resolution adopted yesterday by the Baltimore Federation of Churches, representing virtually all the Protestant denominations of the city, which said that he merits the praise and esteem of all men "without distinction of creed or sect."
"The Baltimore Federation of Churches," the resolution stated, "desires to express the appreciation of the Protestant churches within its membership for the life and works of our fellow-citizen, James Cardinal Gibbons, and to extend to our fellow-citizens of the Roman Catholic faith the sympathy and condolence of their great bereavement in the death of this pre-eminent leader and churchman."
Julius J. Jussend, French ambassador at Washington, sent the following telegram to Bishop Owen of Montreal in mourning with you a prelate admirable for his sanctity, a citizen admirable for his patriotism, and a model American in whom during the great crisis France found a friend.

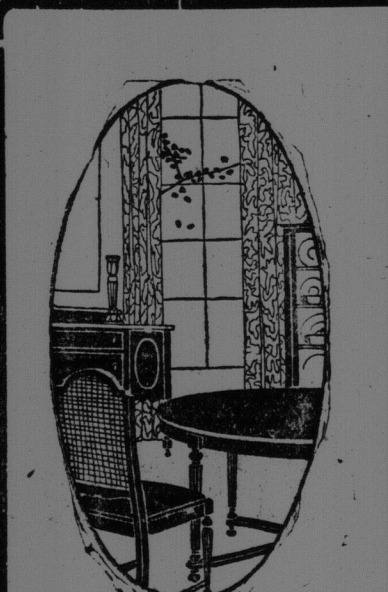

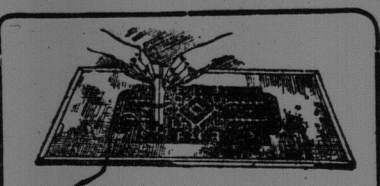

A FORMER ST. JOHN HEALTH CAMPAIGN

It Is of Interest in View of the Coming Provincial Health Week.

In view of the coming Health Week in the province, it is worth while to quote from a St. John paper the following account of a meeting held eleven years ago with the present minister of health in the chair. It is also to be noted that in connection with the campaign a Health Sunday was observed in the churches. Rev. T. Hunter Boyd, the speaker at the meeting of eleven years ago, was in the city this week, and will probably be here again in a few weeks on route back to Glasgow. The report of the meeting is as follows: The speaker's subject being "The Best Health Equipment in the Minimum of Time".
Under the auspices of the St. John Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis a meeting was held last evening in Temple Hall, Main street. Dr. Roberts presided and was supported by Rev. A. J. Duke of St. Peter's and Rev. J. J. McCaskill and Neil McLaughlin. The proceedings opened with an orchestral selection, and the chairman outlined the work of the various associations, dominion, provincial and county, and commended the objects in a forceful manner. Rev. Mr. McCaskill alluded to the magnanimous behavior of the physicians of the province, who were seemingly working to diminish the scope of their own profession.
The secretary of the provincial association, Rev. T. Hunter Boyd, was introduced and gave an address on the meaning of the tuberculosis movement. In order to show the hearty accord with the meeting being held by the Canadian Club, he employed an acrostic motif on St. John, N. B., which might serve as a temporary programme for all workers in the city and county. Note the connection of the initial letters of the following paragraphs:

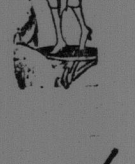

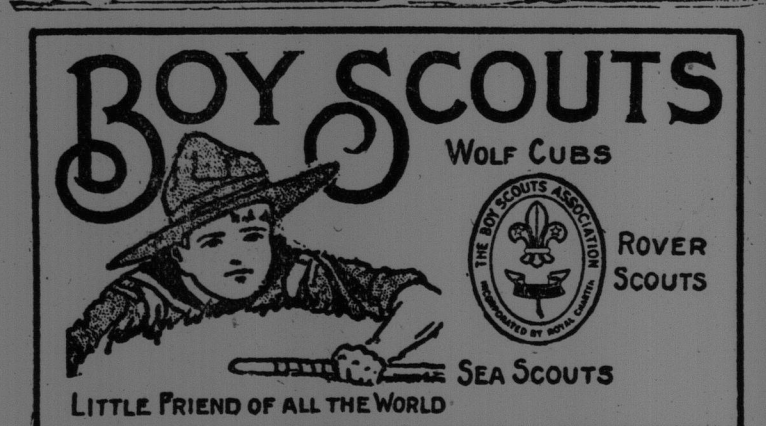

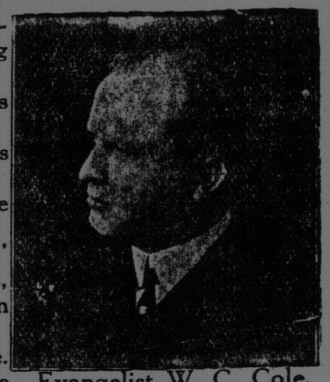

Family Destitute, Mother Needing Surgical Attention, Dorothy Miller, 18 Years Old, Will Make the Sacrifice.

New York, March 24. — A pathetic Easter letter reached the World, obviously written by a girl in deep distress. It reads: "Dear Editor—I have the best mother in the world, and she is so very sick she will die unless she is operated on. And after that she must go to the country. "Now, we are New York people here in Trenton, N. J., without a cent in the world, and my dear mother is to be operated on on the 27th day of March, Easter Sunday, when all the world rejoices and is glad. The railroad situation has left us like this, and I have been thinking all day how we are going to do things.

"We want no charity things coming to our house, as we are above that sort of stuff, so this is what I want your help for. Will you put this 'ad' in your paper, saying that any man who will give my dear mother \$1,000, I, Dorothy, will marry two years from next Oct. 23, when I will be eighteen years old. "I am considered a nice looking girl, five feet five inches tall, and weigh 135 pounds, fair complexion, and even now I am a good housekeeper. The only consideration I impose are that the man I marry must be white, refined, of respectable parentage, high ideals and able to be independent as to salary. "Do not think this is more than my mother would do for me, Mr. Editor, for every mother has done this and more for her children. Will you please let me know how much the ad costs? And do hurry, please, as my time is short and my mother must get well, for we really cannot live without her. I shall be awaiting an answer."

Have Seen "Better Days." The letter was signed "Dorothy Miller, 632 East State street, Trenton." A reporter journeying to that address found the house in the middle of a dingy row. The door was opened by a straight, blonde girl, who restrained with difficulty a vociferous bulldog. She smiled when the errand was explained and led the way inside. "I am Dorothy," she said. The carpetless family living room, if the right truth must be told, did not sustain the youngster's boast that she is yet a very good housekeeper. ECHO OF WAR DAYS IN NEW MARCH INTO GERMANY

A New View of Reasons Why Armistice Was Signed

Court Gossip in London—Judges and Women Jurors—Some Fashions for Men—What They Talk About in Empire Metropolis.

London, March 10—Londoners experienced this week something like a ghostly echo of old times. How long ago now—much longer than it really seems—since we all watched so anxiously and eagerly for the latest newspaper bills and headings with the news from that terrible western front. And now this week, in Piccadilly and the Strand, there come again from that same western front the same rumble of armies on the march, the rattling of the limbers, the clanking of the guns and tanks and the clatter of cavalry in mass on the road.

But this time, thank heaven, the guns were silent and the steel was sheathed, and likely to remain so. How impossible it would have been for those gallant souls, whose last resting places now lie so far behind "the line", five or six years ago, when they were upstanding in their valour, to foresee this new advance across the Rhine. It was at the Rered conference table in St. James' Palace and in Queen Ann's drawing-room that Marshall Foch signed the telegram drafted by his chief of staff, General Weydand, the saviour of Poland from the Red armies, which moved the Allied legions forward in the night across the Rhine.

PROPOSAL FOR FIXED EASTER

his Year Within Five Days
of Earliest Date

Century Since It Was On
March 22 and Will Not
Happen Until 2285.

London, March 25.—(By Canadian Press)—The occurrence this year of Easter Sunday on March 27, within five days of its earliest possible date, has lived the proposal for a fixed Easter, fewer than sixteen Easters will happen between now and the close of this century—an average of one every two years—unless something is done to prevent the erratic wandering of the festival between March 22 and April 25. Under the existing ecclesiastical rule Easter Sunday can fall on any of thirty-five days, and it is a natural assumption at each of these dates recurs once in fifty-five years, or, roughly, three times in a century. But actually that is not so, owing to the essential conditions at Easter must be a Sunday, and that the ecclesiastical full moon (which is not the same as the real moon) upon which

it depends must occur on one of the seven days immediately preceding it. Thus, to have Easter Sunday on its earliest date, March 22, the ecclesiastical moon must also be a Saturday, but so rarely are these conditions satisfied in the same year that it is over a century since Easter fell so early until the year 2285.

Of late years the inconvenience of a movable Easter has induced calendar reformers to propose reforms which will either make Easter a fixed festival or greatly restrict its wanderings. Professor Forster suggested that Easter Sunday should be assigned to the third Sunday after the spring equinox, which would give it a range of eight days, between April 5 and April 12, according to the date and day of the week on which the equinox falls.

Other proposals aim at an Easter absolutely fixed to one date. That of course, would necessitate a radical reform of the whole calendar, under which the same weekday should always fall on the same date. A bill to reform the calendar on these lines was introduced into the House of Commons a few years ago, and in this April 14, which would have always been a Sunday, was scheduled as Easter Day. But the bill never got beyond a first reading.

Members of parliament, business people, lawyers, and schoolboys would all welcome such a change, but the church is strongly opposed to it, and the tradition of the church concerning a movable Easter will not easily be overcome. Any such reform will also have to be universal throughout Christendom, for the moon-controlled Easter is common to all civilized countries; though, owing to the fact that the Greek church still uses the Julian Calendar, there are nearly always two Easter Days every year, one the Gregorian, observed by Roman Catholics and Protestants, and the other the Julian, kept by those countries which are in communion with the Greek church.

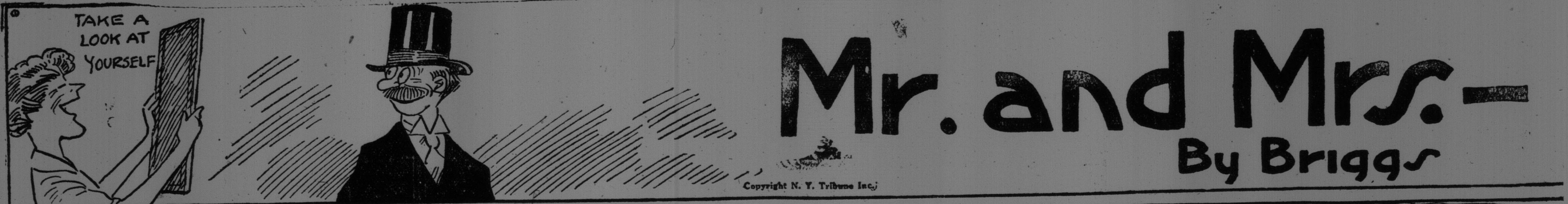

How much longer does Japan think that England is going to continue "beating herself by fighting against her relatives?" 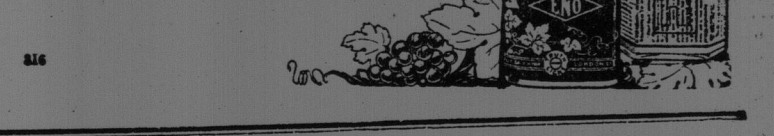

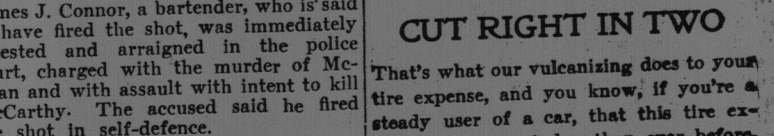

This week Mr. Justice Darling discharged two women jurors without any application from either of the women themselves or any of the parties to the action, being satis-

fed that the evidence which would necessarily have to be given was unsuitable for their ears. In exercising this discretion he was revealing the true spirit of the act, and may have set at rest some of the objections to women serving on juries, which have been based on inadequate acquaintance with the act.
