



ARGENTINE BEEF SELLS FOR FOUR CENTS LESS First Consignment to New York of 100 Tons All Sold-Consumers Get the Benefit

New York, Sept. 19—The consignment of 100 tons of Argentine beef, which ar-rived here Monday, the first big ship-ment ever brought to the United tSates, has all been disposed of. Part of it was sold to dealers in this city and found its way into retail trade. When sold as Argentine beef, the consumer got the benefit of a four cent reduction on the pound.

The merchants of this town will tell you that their advertising in daily newspapers like The Tele-graph and Times bring direct re-turns day by day. pound. What the original consignees got for it is held secret, but the retail trade gave eleven and a half cents a pound for the quarters. Here are some of the prices at which the meat was sold: Porter house and sirloin steaks, 18 cents a pound; prime rib-roasts, 16 cents; round of beef, 18 cents, chuck Newspaper advertising is an in-timate daily part of the people's lives. It reaches them when they are in the mood for buying.
