CROPS AND LIVE STOCK BULLETIN

Ottawa Reports Excellent Showing For Present Year as Compared With Last

Ottawa, Sept. 18.—A bulletin issued today by the Census and Statistics office of the Department of Trade and Commerce reports the condition of crops and live stock at the end of August and gives preliminary estimates of the yield of spring wheat, rye, oats and barley as compared from the reports of correspondents upon the appearance of these crops.

APPLE GROWERS OF WESTERN STATES WILL ORGANIZE

Aim at Improvements in Production and Marketing of Crop—Special Agent to Uplift the Industry

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 18.—With a view to organizing all apple shipping associations, independent shippers and growers of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana into a big protective organization similar to the Citrus Protective League of California, a meeting of several hundred of those concerned will be held in Spokane Thursday, November 20, in connection with the National Apple show.

So-called fruit politics and all matters affecting marketing methods will be eliminated at this conference, which will deal with matters in which all northwestern fruit growers and shippers have a common interest, such as transportation, legislation, standardization of grading, packing and packing, and questions of control and elimination of fruit pests and diseases.

The determination to hold the conference was reached at a meeting of representative shippers and organization men, called by R. H. Pennington, president of the International Apple Shippers' association. J. H. Robbins, general manager of the North Pacific Distributors, a large co-operative marketing agency having headquarters in Spokane, was chairman of the committee arranging the conference, states.
