**Cotton Letter.**  
New York, Oct. 7.—It is possible that the heavy rains reported at some points in the central belt yesterday morning may have been but a little open cotton, and that in other sections the grade of cotton has been lowered by the storm. It is not yet known whether the storm has any change in estimate, of the ultimate crop and it may be possible that if we have an extremely late frost, the rains will ultimately prove a benefit. At any rate we should not care to base fresh purchases on the storm news, but rather on the view of the crop outlook as the mathematical indication from the October bureau which we have stated before, worked out a crop of about 2,000,000 bales or slightly over. The settlement of the Lancashire labor troubles is a favorable feature. Reports as to volume of spot business vary largely. Some state a good business, others say that there is little business at the time and that supplies are accumulating in the interior.

The Royal George, so the passenger states, now lies in Avonmouth harbor with a heavy list to port.

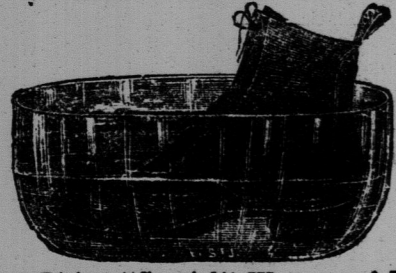

LARGEST DRY DOCK Work at Belfast Will Cost \$1,750,000—Interesting Tests

Interesting tests are being carried out at the new graving dock under construction at Belfast. The dock will have a larger area than any other dry dock in the world, though in length there are some that exceed it. Its normal length is 330 feet, but the removal of a caisson gate can give an additional length of 30 to 12 feet. The entrance has a clear width of 90 feet and the floor level of the dock is 100 ft., while the distance between the coping is 128 feet. 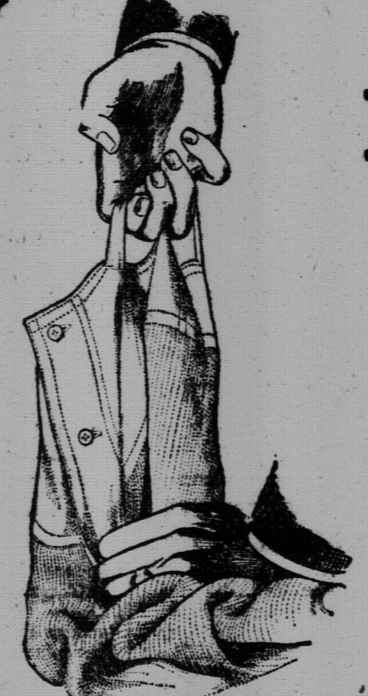
