





Daily Hints For the Cook

CHERRY SHORT CAKE. Two cups flour, one teaspoon baking powder, one teaspoon salt, one table spoon cornstarch, one fourth cup sugar and one half cup shortening. Make into a soft dough with milk. Divide in two parts, roll each into a round. Butter one and place the other on tap and bake. When done split the cakes as well as taking them apart and make four layers, using for the filling ripe cheries or strawberries that have been crushed with a generous amount of sugar some time before.

Let 4 tablespoon of butter get hot in pan (I use a double boiler), then add 1 tablespoonful flour and stir smooth, then add 1 cup of milk, and let it get hot. Now stir in 3 beaten eggs, 1-2 cup of granulated sugar, 1 tablespoonful of mustard and a dash of pepper, add 1 cup, of vinegar and stir unit as thick as custard or about 5 minutes. When done put in jar. It will keep a long time, is always ready for use, and is very nice. Use 1-2 pint measuring cup.



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


