Lord Sandhurst—The Tragedy of Gabriele d'Annunzio's Life—Women's Fortunes Wrecked, His Family Neglected

Lord Sandhurst, who has been appointed by King George as the chief of the set of court officials to attend upon President Taft's special representative at the coronation, John Hays Hammond, was formerly governor of Bombay and served both Queen Victoria and King Edward in the capacity of lord in waiting.

His first wife, who died about five years ago, was a sister of Lord Spencer, and since then he married the widow of Armine Woodhouse, brother of the Earl of Kimberley. She is the only daughter of the late Matthew Arnold, and cousin, therefore, of Mrs. Frederick Whitebridge of New York, and of Mrs. Humphrey Ward.

Her marriage to Lord Sandhurst had to be postponed for several weeks, owing to a severe toxic accident on the very eve of the day appointed for her wedding. Her face was badly cut.

Lord Sandhurst is the second peer of his name. His father was raised to the House of Lords for his services in connection with the Indian Mutiny, and afterwards as commander-in-chief in India. The family name is Mansfield, and he is the eldest brother, the Hon. John Mansfield, a member of the bar.

The man's moral reputation, in one word, is so infamous as to completely nullify all efforts coming from his literary efforts.

One of the most disgraceful episodes of his disgraceful life was recalled the other day, when among the contents of La Capponette, his villa at Florence, there were found a number of letters written by the great Munich artist Lenbach, portraying Eleanor Duse. It may be remembered that Duse was a superb actress, and a playright, lastly somewhat longer than the others, possibly on account of its notoriety which it brought to him, for he is consumed with vanity and egotism, like so many geniuses.

**SUDDEN DEATH OF DR.
GEORGE A. HETHERINGTON**

The community was shocked yesterday by the sudden death of Dr. George A. Hetherington, I. M., which occurred about 3 o'clock at his home in Sydney street, after only a few hours' illness. Death, it was said, was due to kidney trouble. On Tuesday evening Dr. Hetherington fell down the elevator shaft in the Opera House building, but his physicians, Drs. Christie and Case, said that this was not responsible for his death.

The doctor was born in Johnston, Queens county, in 1831, and after receiving his early education there and in the Normal school, he taught school for a while. He later studied at the Baptist Seminary in Fredericton, and in the medical department of Michigan University, as well as in the Cincinnati College of Medicine and Surgery, from which he was graduated as doctor of medicine in 1875. He then practised medicine for five years in this province. Then he went to Scotland, spending some time in the Royal Infirmary in Edinburgh. After some time spent as resident instructor in the maternity department of the Rotunda Hospital for Women, he returned to New Brunswick and soon was recognized as a leading physician. For eight years he held the office of Superintendent of the Provincial Hospital.

Dr. Hetherington took a deep interest in civic affairs and was also prominently connected with many of the leading societies of the city. He was a member of the British Medical Society, a Life Fellow of the British Gynaecological Society, a member of the New Brunswick College of Physicians and Surgeons, and of the St. John Medical Society, and besides having served a number of years on the public school board of St. John. He held the appointment of coroner in the city and county, also commissioner of the General Public Hospital, and lecturer to the school for nurses. In 1883 he was appointed surgeon to the St. John Firemen's Mutual Relief Association.

He was past chancellor in Knights of Pythias; past supreme vice-regent, I. O. O. F., and past high physician of the same order; also thirty-second degree Mason and noble of Mystic Shrine. Notwithstanding the demand upon his time, he held for many years a commission and took an interest in the 62nd St. John Firemen. In 1871 he attended the military school, Fredericton, and was awarded a second class certificate.

Dr. Hetherington traveled extensively on both sides of the Atlantic, prosecuting his studies as he went, in Canada, United States, in Great Britain and Ireland, and in Germany. About two years ago he received an honorary degree in medicine from the University of the State of New York. He was married Sept. 5, 1876, to Miss Sibyl Melville, of Sussex (N. B.), and had by her one daughter. Both wife and daughter died several years ago.

He is survived by two brothers, Robert and Dr. Ebery M., of Kansas City, and one sister, Mrs. Averon Jones, of Kings county. Doctors J. E. and G. E. Hetherington, of Codr's, Kings county, are cousins.

He was a member of the City Baptist church. His funeral will take place tomorrow morning and interment will be made at Sussex.

On Tuesday evening Dr. Hetherington and Colonel Blaine were passing along the north side of King square, and seeing H. L. Spencer and a Telegraph man sitting in the office of the Ottawa hotel, entered to have a word with the venerable post. While he and Colonel Blaine, who are of about the same age, were exchanging reminiscences, Dr. Hetherington, speaking to the Telegraph man, recalled the fact that Mr. Spencer was the first man he knew when he first came to St. John, and he had only the day before taken the post down

The Evening Chit-Chat

I HAVE been rebuked.
My offense is using the expression "middle class," several times in a recent article.

My censor tells me that he is surprised that such a democratic person as I have seemed to be, should speak so much of "classes." He reminds me that according to a certain very good authority all people are born-free and equal, and that the possession or lack of money does not make one man better or worse than another and that there is no such thing as a class.

I accept the rebuke.

But I do not entirely agree with the gentleman.

I admit I was at fault in the article cited, because when I referred to the middle class, I did mean those with a moderate amount of the world's goods, and in so doing I went back on my own conviction that class is not founded on money.

But I very heartily disagree with the gentleman when he says there is no such thing as a class.

There most certainly is such a thing.

The most radical, the most democratic, the most socialist, or anarchistic person, living must admit that there are persons to whom he looks up, and other persons to whom he instinctively feels himself superior.

I am sure my censor himself, if he would be entirely honest, would admit having felt that same way.

In looking up he admits the existence of a higher class. In looking down he concedes a lower.

But what is this class distinction that we all feel about?

"Well, there are some crude people who make the possession of money their sole criterion."

To them the millionaire, no matter how ignorant, how coarse, how common, how little he may be, is of the upper class.

And the man of poverty, no matter how refined, how well bred and well educated, is to them of the lower class.

But that is only one point of view.

My censor objects to it. I do myself and I know you do.

But what then is our sense of class distinction founded on?

What should we mean when we refer to the "upper class?"

Well that's just what I want you to tell me, my friends.

It is a subject on which I have often thought I had my own ideas, but I'd like to know what yours is. I have one that besides my old friends some of those who have not more than one hundred words, preferably less, so that when I hold the symposium on this subject, I can include many points of view.

ROYAL CARPET COST \$3,500. London, June 15—The carpet to be used in Westminster Abbey on Coronation day in London is said to have cost \$3,500. It is made of Axminster pile of the finest quality. There are 288 stiches in weight twelve ounces. Each square yard weighs twelve ounces. Each square yard has cost \$15 so that the total cost of the carpet is nearly \$3,500.

LIBERALS' VICTORY IN NOVA SCOTIA

Captured 27 of the 38 Seats in the Elections Yesterday—Thirty-Four Years Steady Liberal Rule

Halifax, June 14—The provincial general elections took place today and resulted in a great victory for the Liberal government, who carried twenty-seven of the thirty-eight seats in the province. Halifax elects three Liberals with a majority for the highest man of 1,006 and for the lowest of 765.

Cape Breton elected two Conservatives, whereas that party confidently expected at least four.

A notable feature of the election is the defeat of three members of the government: Hon. Christopher Chisholm, commissioner of works and mines; Hon. B. E. Pearson, in Colechester, and Hon. Dr. LeBlanc, in Yarmouth.

Premier Murray has a large majority in Victoria and his colleague also has a good lead.

The issues were chiefly local. The Liberals in this province will now have five years more to add to their twenty-nine years of rule. The opposition in the last legislature numbered five. They will now have eleven.

Daily Hints For the Cook

Divide in two parts, roll each into a round. Butter one and place the other on top and bake. When done split the cakes as well as taking them apart and make four layers, using for the filling ripe cherries or strawberries that have been crushed with a generous amount of sugar some time before.

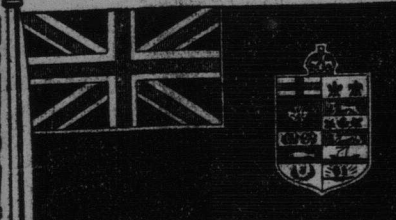
NICE SALAD DRESSING

FULL EQUIPMENT OF REGIMENT ON THE VISIT TO BOSTON

62nd Fusiliers to Leave Barracks at 6:30 Tomorrow Evening and March to Train—The Route and Other News of Trip

Three hundred strong, garbed in their new serge uniforms, and in complete regalia, comprising great-coats, bushies, bayonets, etc., even to kit bag and water bottle, the men of the 62nd regiment of Fusiliers will leave their quarters in the barracks in Lower Cove at 6:30 o'clock tomorrow evening and march via Broad, Prince William and Mill streets to the Union Depot, where they will entrain for Boston.

On Sunday last the men presented a very tidy and soldierly appearance when they were seen in the church parade, and it is expected that when they march in order tomorrow night with both the 62nd brass band and the drum corps playing, the sight will be inspiring.

They are expected to arrive in Boston at 9 a. m. on Saturday, and will at once march to the South Armistead Hotel, fitted quarters have been prepared for their reception, ample provision having been made there both for sleeping and eating.

The officers will go to the Hotel Victoria, about 200 yards from the barracks, and after this the men will march to Charles town, to take part in the celebrations. About 6:15 it is thought they will return to the barracks. "Come to the cook-house door" will sound at 8 a. m. on Sunday and at 8:30 the "fall-in" will be blown for church parade.

At Paragon park in the afternoon the regiment will be the guests of the city of Boston, while the following day, Monday, at noon, the whole regiment will be entertained at luncheon by the Ancient and Honorable Artillery. Then at 4 p. m. the soldier ladies will see good-by to the "Hub" and march to the train for their return trip. They are expected to reach New Brunswick at 7 p. m. on Tuesday.

The programme prepared for the officers of the regiment during their visit looks something like this: On Saturday at 8 a. m. they will breakfast as the guests of the 8th Regiment, on Saturday at noon they will have luncheon as the guests of the city, and in the evening the governor of the state will tender them a dinner. On Monday morning the Boston City Club will have them as their guests, while at noon they will attend the dinner of the A. S. H. Co. with the men.

The officers and men are anticipating the trip with much pleasure and are looking forward to making a name for the regiment in Boston, having an enjoyable stay as well.

The question of church union was discussed and it was unanimously decided to let the matter rest with the sessions and congregations all over the Dominion. All members of churches as well as adherents will have a chance to vote on the subject. A special ballot is to be furnished the churches on these questions mentioned thereon. The first question will be "Are you in favor of church union with the Methodist and Congregational churches?" the second "Are you in favor of the proposed basis?" and the third "Have you any other alterations to offer?" The result of the vote on these questions will be reported at the session, and a resolution was passed disapproving of mixed marriages, and urging that the Presbyterians and Methodists be cautious of the matter until the question was settled by the law courts.

The meeting of eighteen ministers for admittance into the church were received. Most of these were from Presbyterian ministers in the United States. Some were admitted, some rejected, and others sent to college for further training.

Mr. Graham left before the congress was quite over. It was expected that the business would all be transacted by tonight.

Rev. Mr. Graham will remain in the city until Monday 26, when he will leave to take up his new position in the Saskatchewan University.
