with England will continue to be This was almost the last remark made by Tewlik Rushdi Bay, Turkish foreign minister, before boarding his train last night to return to Angora.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 17 .--Upon receipt of the League of Nations decision in the Turk-British dispute over Mosul, the Turkish cabinet at Angora was immediately called into session by President Mustapha Kemal Pasha.

LONDON, Dec. 17.—A most hopeful view taken here regarding the situation growing out of the endorsement by the League of Nations, of Great Britain's position respecting the Mosul boundary in the kingdom of Irak, is that opportunity is now to be given negotiators to attempt to arrange friendly understanding between Turkey and Great Britain.

Hostilities between Türkey and Great Britain over the latter having secured the mandate for the rich oil and agriculture region, are not considered probable, either in London or in League of Nations circles in Geneva.

In some quarters in London, the government's attitude toward Turkey is said to embrace a desire to see Turkey live and not be stifled or paralyzed.

It is reported that reassuring communications regarding Mosul already have passed between London and Angora, and it is expected that Premier Baldwin will make a statement to parliament on the situation at an early date. 



adopt a rigid and uncompromising attitude. Great Britain desired to live on terms of peace with Turkey and would gladly lend itself to conversations to determine whether it would be possible to improve the relations between the two countries.

The third declaration came in a documentary form from the Turks who refused an invitation to attend the meeting. It was a vigorous protest against the Council's action, as well as a warning that Turkey absolutely refused to abandon its sovereignty over Mosul until "You give your assent that our rights in totality in Mosul remain intact."

The Council's decision is contingent on Great Britain's acceptance of a 25-year mandate over Irak, which includes Mosul, within six months. This Great Britain has promised to do.

U. S. Branch Factories Route Traffic Via American Ports

HAMILTON—By Mail—In Ontario centres one hears a great deal more about New York than any other port as a competitor with Canadian ports. There are some American branch factories, much of whose routing of traffiic is done from United States headquarters, and in some cases a good deal of it is sent through American ports. Then there are Canadian concerns which have to use New York to get satisfactory steamship service to certain ports. There are perhaps a very few who use New York through force of habit, or from a belief that service through our ports would not be satisfactory. Moreover, the agents of American railways are active and constantly after business. Thus, considerable Canadian business goes and comes, but principally goes, through New York.

I HAVE FOUND firms in this and other cities doing some business through New York or Portland who are very outspoken in their belief that Canada must mend matters and control more of her own trade. They say it is poor economy in the long run to neglect our own ports and send traffic away from our own railways, but no relief is at present in sight. As one man put the case, it is important to keep industries going and people employed making goods for export, even if competition at present compels some use of United States ports. The problem is a serious one, and its complicated nature can only be understood by talking with exporters and learning their difficulties. In the export business they have been competitors in other countries, and both rates and delivery become matters of great importance. I have yet to find a man who actually used foreign ports by preference.

OTTAWA, Dec. 16-A remarkable ncrease in the sales of Canadian cattle to the United Kingdom during the tle to the United Kingdom during the present year and "a further expansion of trade through this important outlet," mark an encouraging statement on the 1925 business issued today by the Federal Department of Agriculture.

Up to December 10 a total of 103,500 head of cattle, or over 10 per cent. of Canada's public sale of commercial cattle, were shipped to the United Kingdom, as compared with 78,600 and 55,400 head for the same periods in 1924 and 1923 respectively.

169 BOAT LOADS.

Records of the Dominion Livestock branch show that up to December 10 a total of 169 boat loads of Canadian cattle were shipped from the various Canadian Atlantic ports and 17 boat loads by Boston and Portland Eastern Canadian ports have all received their share. Montreal handled 55,000 head; Saint John 24,000; Quebec 6,700, and Halifax 6,400. In addition 4.500 head went through Boston, and 6,900 through Portland.

When the grounding was realized, both rushed down stairs to ascertain further what had occurred, and they were both astonished to find out where the ship was. Some time after that the disappearance of Pilot La Chance was noticed.

MID-SEASON form was shown by Charlie Gorman, world's 440 indoor and outdoor champion, before a crowd of nearly 400 people at The Times-Star Stocking Fund races last evening on Hilton Belyea's rink, West Saint John, when the Canadian skating ace captured first place in all three events, the 220, 880 and mile. It was the first meet of the year and a sum of 887.83 was realized for the fund through the co-operation of the skaters, Mr. Belyea and the Carleton Cornet Band which donated its services free for the night. The final events on the card will be run off next Monday night when the 440, Gorman's favorite distance, and the three mile will be skated. The ice was not favorable to fast time but despite this Gorman stepped the 220 in 20 seconds flat twice during the night. The morning saw a splendid sheet of ice ready for the skaters but an exceptionally high tide flooded the entire area in the afternoon and Mr. Belyea and a corps of assistants had to work like beavers to get it into shape for the evening. As a consequence, the surface was sluggish. The skating fans were not allowed on until the two heats of the 220 had been pulled off. In the first heat, Gorman won with Ed Snodgrass second while in the second heat Willie Logan, Maritime and Provincial champion, was first with Bernard O'Connor second. When it came to the final, Gorman grabbed off the lead and was never headed, Logan chasing him right to the tape. O'Connor was third, Ed Snodgrass falling in the home

In the 880, a fairly fast clip was set all the way by the skaters, Gorman again taking the lead near the end with Logan right behind. The form displayed by young Logan augurs well for his success in the big meets to come. Ed Snodgrass, who has only been on skates a few times this year, showed up in third place. The time was 1 min. 25 and 2-5 seconds.

It was in the mile, however, that Gorman showed a flash of his real form just at present. The boys took their time on this race when with one lap to go, the brilliant Canadian ace leaped to the front with a marvellous burst of speed that opened a gap between him and the entire pack. Willie Logan set out in hot pursuit, but Gorman glided over the line standing up, a winner by an impressive margin. Logan was second. O'Connor staged a beautiful duel with Ed Snodgrass for third place and it was the concensus of opinion that both finished in a tie. The time was 3 mins., 5 and 3-10 seconds.





Thinks Despatch U.S. Effort to Regain Fishermen's Privileges

Officials of the Department of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa, are somewhat mystified by a despatch which appeared recently in at least one Canadian newspaper and which was evidently authorized by high officials of the United States Government and came from Washington, says a special despatch to The Telegraph-Journal.

It was to the effect that the government there was awaiting a reply from the Dominion Government to a request for its attitude toward a change in the conditions imposed upon United States fishermen calling at Canadian ocean ports. It is interpreted in Ottawa as a move toward a restoration of the so called modus vivendi. Alexander Johnston, Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries, states that so far no communication has been received from Washington on this matter.


