

Annual Meeting.

St. Andrew's Hall, Kingston, Jan. 13th & 20th, 1892.

The Annual Meeting of the congregation was held at 7.30.

The Rev. Mr. Mackie was in the Chair, and opened the meeting with prayer.

Mr. Wm. Gill was appointed Secretary.

The minutes of the last annual meeting and of the meeting held on 24th June, were read and confirmed.

The following Reports were read:-

The Session Report, by Mr. Mackie; the Managers' Report, by Mr. Craig; the Supplementary Revenue Report, by Mr. Dobbs; the Building Fund Report, by Mr. D. Fraser; the Women's Home Association Report, by Mr. Macdonnell; Report of Special Committee appointed 6th May, 1891, by Principal Grant; the Sabbath School Secretary's Report, by Mr. J. Pollie; the Sabbath School Treasurer's Report, by Mr. W. Gill; the Women's Foreign Mission Report, by Mr. J. Lesslie; the Young Men's Guild Report, by Mr. Gill; the Young Women's Guild Report, by Mr. Macdonnell; and the Report of the Juvenile Guild, by Dr. Mowat; all of which were received and adopted with the exception of the report of the Women's Home Association, from the adoption of which Mr. Craig craved leave to dissent, which was agreed to, and the clause in the Supplementary Fund Report relating to Mr. Dobbs' resignation, which he withdrew.

On motion of Dr. Williamson it was resolved:-

That the church accounts be closed on the 31st Dec., and the annual report, together with the estimated expenditure for the ensuing year, be in the hands of the congregation the Sunday before the Annual Meeting.

On motion of Mr. McIntyre it was resolved:-

That in so far as the report adopted by the congregation on the 24th June last concerns the collection on the Anniversary Sunday it be rescinded, and the collections then taken be expended for interest due on mortgage.

Moved by Mr. G. M. Macdonnell, seconded by Principal Grant, That Mrs. Hugh Fraser, Mrs. Cochrane, Mrs. Fowler and Mrs. Mc-Intyre be elected managers in place of the four retiring this year.

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It was moved by Mr. R. Carroll in amendment, seconded by Mr. McIntyre, and unanimously resolved:—

That Messrs. J., Lesslie, J. Hazlett, T. Donnelly and J. W. Clark be appointed managers to replace those retiring.

On motion of Dr Mowat it was resolved :---

That the thanks of the congregation be tendered to the retiring managers. Messrs. A. Ross, R. Carroll, and W. Harrold; and in this connection the congregation desires to place on record the fact that Mr. Carroll has been a member of the Board since July, 1854, nearly forty years.

On motion of Mr. J. Minnes it was resolved:-

That the names of the following gentlemen be placed on the Reception Committee, viz., Messrs. R. Sinclair, J. Pollie, G. Somerville, W. Thompson, A. Brown, F. Taylor, J. Gibson and W. Gibb. Γ

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A proposal from the Board of Managers having reference to the payment of the interest on the indebtedness of the congregation was presented; in connection with which, on motion of Principal Grant the following resolution was passed, viz.:—

That when this meeting adjourns it stand adjourned until the Wednesday after the Anniversary Sunday, and that in the meantime the suggestion of the Board of Managers be referred to the Young Men's and Young Women's Guilds with the request that these Guilds endeavour to bring to that meeting a list of at least 480 subscribers at 5c. each per week.

On motion of Principal Grant it was resolved:-

27

That the Trustees be requested to report not later than the adjourned congregational meeting any plans they may have regarding the "Old Burying Ground," and that Dr. Williamson and Mr. Macdonnell be appointed a Committee to meet the Trustees and see that no final action be taken without the consent of the congregation.

Mr. D. Fraser gave notice of the following motion: In view of the misapprehension regarding the wishes of the Ladies Home Association, at the previous meeting, be it resolved, that the Ladies of that Association be empowered to appoint four of its members as an advisory committee to confer with the Board of Managers from time to time as the Ladies may see fit on the general management of the temporal affairs of the congregation.

In view of the references in all reports to the congregation to the establishment of a saloon or tavern in close proximity to our church, be it resolved, that a committee be appointed to take such steps as may lead to its speedy removal or suppression, and that Messrs. John McIntyre, G. M. Macdonnell, and D. Fraser be the committee to take charge of the matter.

The Benediction was pronounced by Principal Grant and the meeting adjourned to meet on the 17th Feb. Mr.

"Rirk=Session Report.

The Kirk-Session respectfully report to the congregation that during the past year the Sabbath Services and Prayer Meeting were regularly conducted, and the quarterly celebration of the Lord's Supper was duly observed.

The Sacrament of Baptism was administered to 30 children, the ordinance being almost always administered in private houses, which when there is no satisfactory reason for it, is to be regretted.

19 Marriages, principally between strangers, have been registered in the Church Records.

During the year 30 communicants have been added to the Roll; 19 on profession of faith, 8 of whom came from the Sabbath School; 10 by certificate; and 1 being restored.

Death and migration, especially the latter have, however, left many blanks in the Communion Roll. Mrs. Dr. Fenwick, Miss Mary Mackenzie, Mrs. Robert Walker, Miss Douglas and Mrs. McFadden were removed by death; 17 have gone to the United States and 7 elsewhere in Canada.

The Session record their regret that at the close of the year a Tavern was opened immediately in front of the church, which is a building specially protected from proximity to the liquor traffic by the Law of the land, and they confidently expect that the congregation will not only express their disapproval of a license to sell intoxicating liquors being used in these premises, but that they, in the interests of true religion and morality, as also the peace, respectability and amenity of the neighbourhood will devise some means whereby the tavern will be speedily closed.

The Session desire to place on record their appreciation of the services rendered by the Choir.

Report of the Board of Managers.

ST. ANDREW'S HALL, 13TH JAN., 1892. The Managers beg to submit herewith the Annual Financial Statement of ordinary Revenue and Expenditure for year ending 31st Dec., 1891, and for convenience a comparative Abstract of Revenue for years 1890 and 1891 is here noted:

It is to be regretted that the sum asked for in the last report has not been contributed, viz. \$4989.00, as your committee would then have been able to pay the interest for one year, now due upon the loan for building account. With the revenue received all the current expenses of the year have been covered, and \$140.00 have been paid on account of last year's interest, but the interest for the year just closing still remains to be provided for.

It is a fact perhaps worth noting here that in the matter of expenditure your committee control less than ten per centum of the whole amount, the sum for 1891 being \$363.98, exclusive of light and fuel, all other expenses being fixed by the congregation, it is impossible, therefore, for your committee to effect any reduction in order to provide for interest. The matter of interest however must be dealt with and will no doubt be referred to in the Building Fund Report.

In our last report we referred to the beauty of our Church Building, an opinion that has been freely endorsed by visitors during the past year from all parts of America. We are sorry, therefore, to say in this report that its external attractions have been somewhat marred by the establishment of a public saloon on the opposite corner, in close proximity to the church, and express the hope that all necessary steps will be taken to remove this blot to a place outside the limit prescribed by law, at the earliest possible moment.

The retiring managers are Messrs. W. Harold, R. Carroll, Alex. Ross, and J. W. Clark, and the retiring ushers are J. Pollie, G. Summerville, W. Thompson, A. Brown, R. Sinclair, and K. Ireland, also W. R. Taylor and A. Robinson who have left the bounds.

It must be distinctly understood however that this fund must in no way, directly or indirectly, interfere with any other scheme now in force.

The Association begs to report that during the year 1891 they have been steadily and quietly carrying on all the work that fails to them.

The poor, the care of whom is entrusted to them, have been regularly and frequently visited; and not only have all their necessary wants been supplied but every needed comfort has been readily provided. The funds devoted to this purpose are the collections made at the quarterly communions. Unfortunately during the year the weather at two of the communion seasons was so inclement that the attendances were comparatively small, and the collections were a good deal below the usual amount. It was only by special management that all the claims were met, and no debt occurred. A detailed statement of the fund is appended to this report. 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As the for purel deficience ing the m think that sented on in approximembers agers, or The city is divided into 26 districts which are visited every month by members of the Association. 225 copies of the Presbyterian Record, with St. Andrew's Church Notes, are distributed monthly; also a large number of the Leaflets prepared by the Women's Foreign Mission Society. There are still some families that do not read the Record, but it is hoped that these will become subscribers during the present year, for the accompanying Notes are the principal, almost the only channel of congregational news which every family and adherent ought to know.

The Association has also as part of its work the collecting of all contributions for the Home and Foreign Missions and the other schemes appointed by the General Assembly—seven in all. Their aim is to raise for these \$1000 per annum; and though they hardly expect to reach that sum just yet, they will be much disappointed should the collection fall short of that for the previous year, namely, \$845.23, including the amount raised by the Women's Foreign Mission Society. They are of opinion that if their list of subscriptions published in the annual congregational report, were leisurely read and reflected upon, there would be great changes in the report for next year. Small contributions, many so small as to be scarcely divisible among seven schemes, has been for many years the striking feature of this list.

The Association has almost from its existence been in the habit of raising money for congregational purposes by means of bazaars. This year, the method of direct giving has been tried and the result has been equal to, perhaps greater than, the result of sales. This is gratifying. As one of many advantages which this method has, it reveals the congregation's source of strength, activity, and generosity. The sum of \$700 and over has been collected for the purpose of decreasing the debt on the church, and as contributions are still expected from about eighty ladies, it is anticipated that one thousand dollars, the sum desired, may be reached before the second anniversary of the church. In addition to this, the Association has paid all its accounts up to date and has a considerable balance in the bank in its favour.

As the Association has all along been raising large sums of money for purely congregational purposes, and not infrequently for meeting deficiencies in the annual revenue, and as the sums raised since entering the new church have been specially large, they have grown to think that they might with much advantage to the church be represented on the Board of Management. They therefore are unanimous in approaching the congregation with the request that four of their members be appointed an advisory committee to work with the Managers, or that they be represented on the Board in any way that the

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congregation may consider best. In urging such a petition they have only one end in view, namely to keep the expenditure within the income.

The Association has observed with the greatest sorrow that a tavern has recently been opened in front of the church. They regard it as marring the beauty of the grounds, which at the expense of the congregation have hitherto been a gratification to the citizens, and of the building erected at great cost, which has been pronounced by the Press, one of the principal ornaments of the city, and is generally so regarded. They also view it as peculiarly offensive to the lady members of the congregation who are in the habit of attending the many evening meetings that are held in the Church Hall during the week. They are also of opinion that the law makes special provision for the protection of a place for public worship from such close contact with the liquor traffic. For these reasons, and above all for the sake of the sobriety, morality and true religion of the youth of the neighbourhood, they earnestly ask the congregation to take the matter into their consideration, and to adopt measures for the removal of this offence.

The Young Women's Guild has met regularly during the year on the last Tuesday in each month, and the meetings have generally been well attended. It is customary at these monthly meetings to have reports read from the various sections, showing the work that has been done during the previous four weeks and to take these reports into considerati welfare of

The Dorcas Section has been busily employed during the year in preparing clothing for the poor children, and helping mothers who through sickness and other causes were unable to overtake all the making and mending required in their households. They have also when occasion required, nursed the sick and attended to all the duties of the home. When the immediate wants of the poor were for the time supplied, they have executed orders for work, and devoted the proceeds to the purchasing of materials for the poor, and also of a bed in the Children's Ward in the General Hospital. During 1892, they intend to devote the greater portion of their earnings to the Building Fund, which intention they anticipate will secure for them abundance of work.

The Hospital Section has visited the General Hospital and Asylum during the year. Their visits have as far as possible been weekly and the purpose has been purely religious. The Scriptures have been read, and hymns sung and prayer offered up. In the Asylum there are generally between ten and thirteen patients present, and the hour's service is a real delight to them. Some of the nurses have been very helpful, often presiding at the organ and leading in prayer.

The Blue Cross Section, has had its attention turned to temperance work in the congregation. Prevention rather than cure, has been their care, for the sin and disease of drunkenness have in singularly few cases appeared in the congregation, for which there is cause for much thankfulness, though not for any lack of vigilance. They lament, and the entire Guild unites with them in lamenting, that a drinking saloon has been established close to the church. Regarding it as disreputable and dangerous to youth and specially offensive in its nearness to the church, they would earnestly entreat the congregation to take the matter into their very serious consideration, and dc all that lies in their power to have this temptation to terrible evil quickly removed.

The Visiting Section has had under their special charge all persons, who, by reason of the infirmities of age, or chronic sickness, are unable to attend public worship, such, they have endeavoured to visit regularly, and do what they could to make up in some measure for their deprivation of the ordinances of the sanctuary.

The Social Section has attended to all the gatherings that have been held in the hall, for the purpose of increasing a congregational spirit among the young, and encouraging them to work in some way in connection with the church, and advance its prosperityWhile several changes have occurred, it is recorded with thankfulness that death did not touch the Guild during the year that is now closed.

Earnestly seeking the good of St Andrew's and trying in all these different ways which have been enumerated, to secure it, the Guild respectfully submits this their second Annual Report.

This Association having for its object the training of the children in christian work and liberality, has held its weekly meetings, with a short recess in the hot weather, throughout the entire year.

The attendance at the meetings has been very good, and the work done at them has been principally in connection with the General Hospital The boys have been engaged in making draught-screens, scrap-books and executing orders of various kinds, the proceeds of which have gone to hospital work. Since the opening of the ward many presents have been made to it, among them being a nice time-piece from the lads of Miss Hamilton's Class.

On New Year's Eve the children of the Guild visited the ward, bearing gifts to the little sick inmates. Among these was a touching offering purchased with the savings of one of the most enthusiastic workers among the girls, whom the Good Shepherd carried away in His arms on Dec. 2nd.

All accounts have been paid and the Guild has a balance in its favour.
