Elders' Districts.

The Congregation is divided into fourteen districts. Each district is assigned to one or more Elders. The Elders visit the families in their respective districts, note changes of residence, and acquaint the Minister and Session of cases requiring special attention, such as sickness, &c. *For residence of Elders see preceding page.*

DISTRICT No. I.—Mr. JAMES TASKER.

From Bleury street (not inclusive) to St. Lawrence street (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to Mile End.

DISTRICT No. II.—Mr. C. D. PROCTOR.

From St. Lawrence street (not inclusive) East to Long Point and Longueuil and from the River north to city limits (including Petite Cote).

DISTRICT No. III.—Mr. ROBT. WEIR and Mr. ALEX. MCFEE.

From Bleury street (not inclusive) to St. Lawrence street (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River and St. Lambert.

DISTRICT No. IV.—Mr. T. A. GIBSON and Mr. JOHN TAYLOR.

From Union Avenue (not inclusive) to Bleury street and Park Avenue (inclusive), from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. V.—Mr. COLIN MCARTHUR.

From Beaver Hall (not inclusive) to Bleury street (inclusive) and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River by St. Peter street.

DISTRICT No. VI.—Mr. JOHN L. MORRIS and Mr. P. S. ROSS.

From McGill College Avenue to Union Avenue (including both) and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. VII.—Mr. G. M. KINGHORN.

From University and Hanover streets (not inclusive) to Beaver Hall Square (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River by McGill street.

DISTRICT No. VIII.—Mr. ALEX. MACPHERSON.

From McGill College Avenue to Mountain street (not including either) and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. IX.—Mr. JAMES A. CANTLIE.

From Metcalfe street (not inclusive) to St. Genevieve street (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street to the River by Duke street (including both).

DISTRICT No. X.—Mr. JAMES CROIL and Mr. ALEX. MITCHELL.

From Mountain street (inclusive) to St. Mark street (not inclusive) and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. XI.—Mr. WILLIAM REID.

From Mountain street (not inclusive) to end of Dorchester Avenue, and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to Dorchester street (inclusive).

DISTRICT No. XII.—REV. DR. J. CLARKE MURRAY.

From St. Mark street (inclusive) to Cote St. Antoine, and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to Cote des Neiges.

DISTRICT No. XIII.—Mr. WILLIAM WALKER.

From Mountain street (inclusive) to Metcalfe and Cathedral streets (inclusive) and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River by Ann street.

DISTRICT No. XIV.—Mr. JOHN LARMONTH.

From Mountain and McCord streets (not inclusive) to farthest West, and from Dorchester street (not inclusive) to the River and Lower Lachine Road.

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PUBLIC WORSHIP on the Lord's Day, at Eleven A.M., and Seven P.M.

WEEKLY SERVICE, Wednesday Evening, at a quarter past Eight o'clock.

THE SABBATH-SCHOOL meets every Sabbath at Three P.M.—except in the months of July and August, when the School is closed.

THE MINISTER'S BIBLE CLASS for Boys, meets every Sunday afternoon at Three o'clock

YOUNG WOMEN'S CLASS, meets every Wednesday evening at half-past Seven o'clock.

THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER is usually administered on the last Sundays of January, May and October.

ORDINARY MEETINGS of the Kirk-Session are held on the first Sabbath of each month, immediately after the Morning Service.

THE MISSIONARY AND BENEVOLENT SCHEMES of the Church are under the management of a Committee, consisting of the Minister, three members of the Kirk-Session, three members of the Board of Trustees, and four members of the Congregation, appointed at the Annual Meeting.

The fund for the support of a missionary in India, undertaken by the congregation three years ago, is now under the management of Mr. ALEX. F. RIDDELL, to whom contributions for this purpose should be sent ; *Address No. 22 St. John Street.*

THE ANNUAL MEETING of the Congregation for the transaction of business is held in the School-room of the Church, on the second Monday of January in each year.

THE YOUNG MEN'S ASSOCIATION meets in the School-room every Sabbath Morning at a quarter past Ten o'clock, and on alternate Monday Evenings at Eight o'clock during the winter months.

THE DORCAS SOCIETY and LADIES' AID ASSOCIATION meet at half-past Two o'clock on Tuesday afternoons during the winter months.

APPLICATIONS FOR SITTINGS may be made to Mr. ALEXANDER EWAN, the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, or to the Sexton, 77 Monique St. near the Church.

MEMBERS changing their residence are requested to notify the Minister or the Elder of the District in which they reside.

CASES OF SICKNESS should be made known to the Elder of the District and reported by him to the Minister with as little delay as possible.

THE MINISTER is at home during the winter months every Thursday Evening when the young men of the Congregation are invited to come and see him.

Missionary and Benevolent Funds.

The following are the chief purposes for which the General Assembly invites all the congregations to contribute annually :—

I. Home Missions. The support of religious ordinances to settlers in the new districts of the country, such as Muskoka, Algoma, Parry Sound, Manitoba, the North-West Territories, and British Columbia, as well as in the more remote and scattered districts of the older Provinces. The amount required for the whole Church for the current year is \$60,000. In the Western Section of the Church, for which our contributions are asked, there are upwards of 200 mission fields and 714 preaching stations ; and 7,900 families receive religious instruction. The amount contributed by these mission stations themselves last year was \$40,000.

II. Augmentation of Stipends. Upon the principle that the strong should help the weak, this fund was instituted a few years ago by the General Assembly, with a view to supplementing inadequate stipends in some of the smaller congregations, the desire of the Assembly being that none of the ministers should receive less than \$750 a year with a manse. To accomplish this the amount required for the current year, East and West, is \$42,000. The number of congregations in the western section requiring to be aided in this way is 142.

III. Foreign Missions. The Presbyterian Church in Canada has a staff of 28 ordained missionaries engaged in preaching the Gospel to the heathen, besides a number of other labourers, among whom are several Canadian ladies. The missions are — [1] To the Indians in the North-west ; [2] The mission to Formosa, China, which has been so wonderfully prosperous through the instrumentality of Dr. G. L. Mackay and his associates ; [3] The mission to Central India, in which there are now 5 ordained missionaries employed ; [4] in the New Hebrides ; [5] in Trinidad ; [6] in Demerara. The amount required this year for all these missions is about \$72,000. The number of native communicants in the different fields is upwards of 3,000 ; the number of teachers and native helpers 175, making with the ministers and their wives, a total effective force of about 215 labourers in the mission work to the heathen.

IV. French Evangelization. The number of French Roman Catholics in the Dominion is estimated to be 1,300,000. The Board of French Evangelization expends \$35,000 annually in its efforts to bring these our fellow-countrymen under the influence of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The number of fields occupied is 33 ; preaching stations, 78 ; ordained missionaries, 22 ; unordained, 42 ; schools, 26 ; teachers, 30 ; pupils, 804. The Pointe-aux-Trembles schools are maintained with increasing success and usefulness, the attendance at present being 120.

V. The College Fund. Provision is made through this fund for supporting the revenues of Queen's College, Kingston ; Presbyterian College, Montreal ; Knox College, Toronto ; Morrin College, Quebec ; and Manitoba College, Winnipeg. The amount required for the current year is \$14,500. The General Assembly in June last, *Resolved* — "That it be optional with congregations to contribute to the Common College Fund, or to it and such one or more of the Colleges as they may desire specially to benefit by their liberality."

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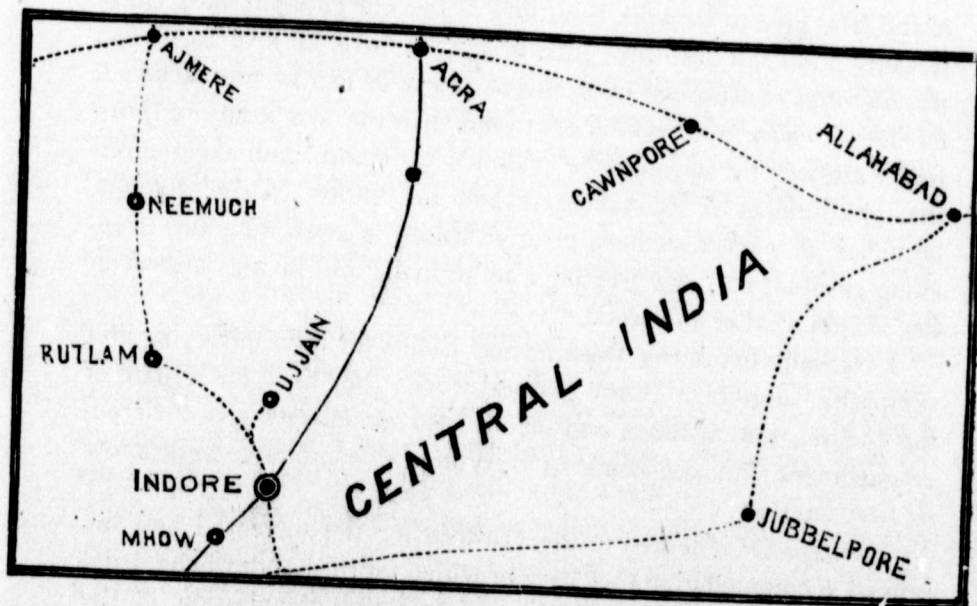


VI. Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund. From this fund annuities are provided for the Widows and Orphans of Ministers who die in the service of the Church. Each minister contributes from \$8 to \$12 a year to the fund. The annuities to widows vary from \$140 to \$300 per annum.

VII. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund. The number of annuitants at present is fifty-three. The highest annuity paid is only \$220. Liberal contributions are urgently needed to maintain even the present very inadequate scale of payments. Expenditure last year, \$10,230.00

The above are the principal Schemes of the General Assembly, to which all the congregations of the Church are expected to contribute annually. The mode of contributing for them in this congregation, is by means of a schedule sent to all the members and adherents at the beginning of the year, in which they are requested to enter the amounts they desire to contribute for the different purposes named, and to transmit it to the Treasurer. Those who prefer to contribute anonymously are at liberty to do so. As this is the *only* way in which the contributions of St. Paul's congregation are asked for those purposes, it is earnestly hoped that none will decline, but that each will give according to his or her intelligent judgment.

N.B.—In addition, and quite distinct from these, it is to be remembered that this congregation is pledged for the support of a missionary to replace the late Rev. R. C. MURRAY in **Central India** under the auspices of the General Assembly's Committee on Foreign Missions. The amount annually required for this purpose is about \$1,400.



Pastoral Letter

TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF ST. PAUL'S CHURCH.

In prefacing the annual congregational report, I wish to express sincere thankfulness for the peace and prosperity by which the past year has been marked. The attendances at Divine Worship have been large and regular. The contributions in nearly every department have increased, and in all branches of the congregation's life and work there are evidences of vigour and promises of growth and success. The statistics will be found in the various reports, and in so far as these are a guarantee of prosperity, they are very gratifying. There is a tendency, however, in the present day to magnify statistics—to attach an undue meaning and value to them—to make the numbers on a communion roll and the sum of contributions the test of a congregation's welfare. This is neither wise nor well, and amid our divisions and rivalries has sometimes led to the adoption of very undesirable expedients to swell the numbers on the roll and the amounts on the contribution list. Above every other institution a Christian Church should be composed of members who are drawn to it and who give to its work from love. Let our gifts put into God's treasury above all our other gifts, be gifts of love, of love to Christ, not offerings constrained by desire of praise or fear of reproach. A far deeper cause of thankfulness to me than the symptoms of prosperity attested by figures is the evidence again and again experienced that the services of the sanctuary and the efforts of the different branches of work have been greatly blessed in awakening and deepening spiritual life, and creating a more living and loving interest in the Master's cause and work.

I cordially thank the Trustees and Elders for their unvarying and sympathetic support in all my pastoral work; they have the welfare of the congregation at heart, and readily and generously give their encouragement and assistance to everything that promises to promote its best interests.

I am greatly indebted to the Trustees for the increased and improved accommodation they have provided for the Sunday School and Bible Classes, and other work, enabling the organization of the Church to be conducted alike with greater comfort and greater efficiency.

The Trustees have adopted the "envelope" system of weekly offerings as the best adapted to meet the needs of the congregation, and I trust all the members and adherents will see it to be their duty to acquiesce in this decision and heartily aid the Trustees in the management of the affairs of the Church, over which they have been asked to preside, and towards which they make a considerable sacrifice of valuable time.

With regard to the support accorded to the Missionary and Benevolent schemes there is great room for improvement—the sum contributed has been fairly large, but the number of contributors is disappointingly small. A large number of the members and adherents bear no share in this Christian duty and privilege. I say this with sorrow. Inability to give cannot be pleaded as the explanation. There are very few in the congregation who can honestly say "I can give nothing to the cause of Christ at home or abroad." Remember it is not I, it is not the committee, it is not the Church, it is Christ Himself who is asking your support for His own work; and your refusal is a refusal to Him.

Prominent among the names that are absent from the Missionary contribution list are the young men in the congregation who are earning their own livelihood, whether living in lodgings or still under the parental roof. I appeal to them to think of their yearly expenditure, of the things that claim and get their money, and ask themselves if they cannot spare something; or rather if they will not exercise a little self-denial that they may have something to give to Christ's work. It is surely a bad beginning of life to leave God and God's claims out of the calculations of your income and expenditure.

Another feature of the congregational life where there is still great room for improvement is the Wednesday Evening Service. This one weekly service is designed by the Church as a break in the midst of engrossing duties and harassing cares and enticing pleasures of the week, and is felt by many to be a great boon and blessing. Would it not be so to all, if regularly and properly used? Do those who neglect it need it least? All our Churches in the city have set apart an hour on Wednesday evening for worship; is it not the duty of all to abstain from accepting or making social engagements that shall interfere with this? Are any justified in damping and discouraging the hearts of their ministers and fellow-members by their absence? I ask you, each one of you, seriously and prayerfully to consider this.

The Bible Classes have been well attended. The preparation for

these has been a real pleasure to me, and I trust they have not been without profit to the members.

I would like to know the young men of the congregation still better than I do, and it would be a privilege and a joy to me to be of any service to them. I find it most unsatisfactory to visit them either at their lodgings or in their places of business, with the risk of missing them or finding them engaged, and I ask them, if it is at all convenient, to come and see me on the Thursday evenings.

Amid much that has been cheering, there have been saddening experiences during the past year. Trial and trouble of various kinds have visited hearts and homes amongst us; business cares and domestic afflictions, awakening our sympathy and sorrow and calling forth our earnest prayers. Death too, has not spared our congregation, taking away, amongst others, Mr. R. A. RAMSAY, one of the Trustees, whose loss was deeply felt not only by our own congregation, but by the whole community; the death of his wife, so soon after, deepened our sadness and drew the hearts of many in full sympathy to the orphaned children and the sorrowing relatives.

Not long ago I intimated to you the sad and sudden death of the wife of our young missionary Mr. Murray, in India and, as I write, the deeply affecting news has reached me that God has taken away Mr. MURRAY from his work in the world—one in heart and one in the Master's work, he and his dear wife have not long been divided in death—they are both at home with God. I have a letter from him, received in all probability after God had called him away, intimating that all doubts as to carrying on his work single-handed had passed away, and that he was going into Ujjain full of hope and zeal to preach Christ to the heathen—"Man proposes, God disposes." It was not to be; God's purpose with him here was accomplished. It is a somewhat sad beginning to our mission; it will not decrease our faith, however, but deepen our love for those who take their life in their hand and leave home and friends for Christ's sake. I hope very soon to be able to tell you that another has gone to take Mr. Murray's place and carry on his work.

Last year I had to report a deficit for this mission, this year I have to report a surplus. The income for the year is

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Mr. A. F. Riddell has kindly consented to take the management of this fund in future. The subscription list and the surplus will be put into his hands, and he will receive the contributions for this year. I feel quite sure that this good work which we have begun will be heartily continued.

I acknowledge with thanks the receipt of \$265 for special cases of deserving poverty.

With an earnest prayer that the new year which we have begun may be a year of greater self-denial and self-devotion in the work of Christ with all of us ; a year of growth in grace and in the knowledge and love of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, I commend us to the love of God and the guidance of His Holy Spirit.

Report of the Kirk-Session.

1887.

Another year has come and gone, and although it may not have been in any special sense a very eventful one, it has left marks on the congregation to which we do well to take heed. As in former years, we have to lament the removal by death of beloved friends and associates. Some of our most active and useful members and office-bearers, while they were yet in the midst of their days, as we supposed, have been taken from us and called to higher service. Many of our friends have been visited with affliction ; some with protracted sickness—wearisome days and nights being appointed to them—or with troubles and anxieties of other kinds that have called forth our heartfelt sympathies. A considerable number have ceased their connection with St. Paul's Church by removing from Montreal to other places of residence. We follow them wherever they have gone, with earnest prayers for their continued well-being. Their places in the house of God and in the work of the Church here are occupied by others, to whom we cordially extend the hand of Christian fellowship. Changes like these, common as they

are in the experience of every Church, admonish us all—the younger members of the congregation as well as those more advanced in years—to “seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness,” to be more alive to the importance of personal consecration, and more ready to do good to others as we have opportunity, remembering that “the night cometh when no man can work.”

The ordinary work of the congregation has been so fully adverted to by the Minister in his pastoral letter, by the Board of Trustees in their cheerful annual report, in the statement of the Committee entrusted with the management of the missionary and benevolent schemes of the Church, by the Superintendents of the Sunday Schools, and by the managers of the Young Men's Association, and the Ladies' Dorcas and Aid Society, that there is little left for the Kirk Session to add beyond acknowledging their gratitude to the Giver of all good, for so many tokens of divine favour, and expressing their hope that the year on which we have entered may be still more fruitful in the work of the Lord.

The Sabbath services have been well attended ; indeed the Church is now found to be too small to accommodate all who are desirous of worshipping with us. Perhaps so much cannot be truthfully said of the attendance at the weekly prayer-meeting, in which there is yet room for a larger number than usually attend. Without dwelling on this feature of our Church life, a feature which is not confined to St. Paul's Church, but is the frequent subject of complaint in other congregations also, it may not be out of place to invite the attention of all who have it in their power to attend these evening meetings to the advantage which they offer as seasons of mutual edification, as well as for affording encouragement to the pastor in his preparations for them.

Along with the faithful discharge of his many other public duties, Mr. Barclay has, as usual, found time to visit every family connected with the congregation during the past year. If any individuals were not called upon it was only because their places of residence were not known at the time. In the list of heads of families appended to this report, the Kirk-Session have done their best to provide a complete directory of the congregation, but so frequent are the changes, it is not easy to attain absolute accuracy, and it will be esteemed a favour that any mistakes in that list be reported, as soon as may be convenient, to the Minister or to the District Elder.

The number of communicants on the roll at the end of Decem-

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ber was six hundred and twenty-four, a net increase for the year of thirty-four. There were present at the communion in January, four hundred and seventy; in May, four hundred and fifty-eight, and in October, four hundred and seventy-two; at one or other communion service, five hundred and sixty-two.

The visit of the Rev. Dr. Jenkins and Mrs. Jenkins, to which the congregation had been looking forward for a length of time with much interest, took place last autumn. What added importance to the occasion was that our venerable ex-pastor preached his Jubilee sermon in St. Paul's Church, on Sabbath the 7th of August—Dr. Jenkins having been ordained to the ministry on the 6th of August, 1837. The Kirk-Session availing themselves of this opportunity, cordially adopted a resolution congratulating Dr. Jenkins on having reached the fiftieth year of his ministry, which was engrossed in the minutes. An illuminated copy, signed by the Elders, was forwarded to Dr. Jenkins. The extract minute reads as follows :—

WITHIN St. Paul's Church, Montreal, Sabbath, the second day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty-seven years, the Kirk-Session met and was constituted by the Moderator, the Rev. JAMES BARCLAY, M.A.

Inter Alia.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted and ordered to be entered in the minutes, with instructions that a copy of the same, signed by the members of the Kirk-Session, be transmitted to Reverend JOHN JENKINS, D.D., LL.D., the Pastor *Emeritus* of the Church :—

The members of St. Paul's Kirk-Session wish to preserve in their minutes a record of Dr. JENKINS' visit to Montreal, in the summer of this year—the Jubilee year of his ministry in the Church of Christ.

It was a joy to his old congregation to see him again, and to hear the rich clear voice to which they had so often listened with pleasure and profit.

The Kirk-Session congratulate Dr. JENKINS on his continued health and vigour, and cheerfully take this renewed opportunity of recording their

gratitude for his long and faithful ministry, many of the fruits of which the congregation is still enjoying, and of heartily wishing him many years yet of well-earned rest.

And they earnestly hope and pray that He who has brought him to this Day of Jubilee may still strengthen and comfort him and bless such further service as he may be able in the good Providence of God to render to the Church of Christ.

Along with this expression of continued respect and esteem for their late Pastor, the Kirk-Session desire to convey to Mrs. JENKINS a sense of their grateful recollection and appreciation of her self-denying efforts, to promote the best interests of the congregation.

Dr. Jenkins acknowledged receipt of a copy of this resolution in a letter to Mr. Barclay, dated from Upper Norwood, London, 29th December, 1887, as follows :

DEAR MR. MODERATOR.

Convey to my Brethren, the Elders of St. Paul's, and accept for yourself, the assurance of my gratitude for the kindly words which have lately reached me, on occasion both of the Jubilee of my ministry, and of my late visit to Montreal.

The value of these words is greatly enhanced by the beauty and taste of the illumination by which they are adorned. As a work of art I appreciate the Kirk-Session's thoughtful and generous minute ; but much more as an evidence of the regard in which I am held by my former fellow-labourers in the work and oversight of the congregation.

Mrs. Jenkins desires me to thank the members of the Kirk-Session for their generous reference to her own brief but happy connection with the congregation.

With earnest wishes that the coming year may be a year of great and abiding prosperity both personally and in the congregation.

The Kirk-Session desire, before closing, as well for themselves as in behalf of the entire congregation, to express their thankfulness that the relationship of the pastor and people, which at one time in the course of the year, appeared to be jeopardized by tempting overtures from a distant colony, remain undisturbed. Mr. Barclay's declinature of the call from Melbourne affords good evidence of his esteem for his congregation and of the satisfaction he has in continuing his ministrations among us.

The Annual Meeting.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting of St. Paul's Church, held within the School-room of the Church, on Monday the ninth of January, 1888, at 8 o'clock p.m.

The Rev. James Barclay, M.A. was unanimously elected chairman, and Mr. E. B. Greenshields requested to act as secretary.

The meeting was opened with prayer.

The minutes of last annual meeting, held on the 10th January, 1887, were read and confirmed.

The report of the Trustees and the Treasurer's financial statement having been placed in the pews of the Church on the previous Sunday, were received as read.

Mr. J. C. Watson then moved, seconded by Mr. Alex. Ewan—

That the report of the Trustees be approved and adopted, and that it with the Treasurer's statement, and the minutes of this meeting, be printed for circulation among the members of the congregation. Carried.

Mr. John McDonald read the report of the Committee on the Missionary and Benevolent Schemes of the Church.

The following resolution was moved by Mr. J. A. Cantlie, seconded by Mr. Alex. Macpherson, and carried :—

That the report of the Schedule Committee be received, approved and printed with the other reports for distribution, and that the Committee be thanked on behalf of the congregation for the manner in which it managed the funds contributed during the year, and that

Mr. J. MURRAY SMITH, Mr. R. FORSYTH,

Mr. JOHN McDONALD, and Mr. A. S. EWING

be elected members of the Committee for the current year, and that the thanks of the congregation be hereby tendered to Mr. John McDonald for his efficient performance of the duties of Secretary-Treasurer of the Committee.

The thanks of the congregation were accordingly conveyed by the chairman to Mr. McDonald.

It was thereupon moved by Mr. John McDonald, seconded by Mr. R. Forsyth, and carried :—

That the thanks of the congregation be tendered to the Trustees for their able and satisfactory management of the financial affairs of the Church during the past year.

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The chairman next announced to the meeting that the two Trustees retiring by rotation this year, both eligible for re-election, were Mr. John Hope and Mr. Alex. Ewan, and that in accordance with the By-Laws, the Trustees had elected Mr. James Burnett to the vacant seat at the Board, and that this appointment was submitted to the meeting for confirmation.

Mr. Jas. Tasker moved, seconded by Mr. J. B. McDonald :—

That Messrs. John Hope and Alex. Ewan be re-elected Trustees for the usual term, and that the election of Mr. James Burnett to the vacant seat at the Board be confirmed.

The following motions were thereafter put to the meeting, and carried :—

Moved by Mr. C. D. Proctor, seconded by Mr. C. McArthur :—

That Messrs. John Fair and P. S. Ross be thanked for their services as auditors for the past year, and that they be requested to continue in the office for the present year.

Moved by Mr. Alex. McFee, seconded by Mr. W. A. Doig :—

That the thanks of the congregation are due, and are hereby tendered, to the Organist, for the attentive and able manner in which he has conducted the musical services of the Church, and to the members of the Choir for their valuable assistance.

Mr. J. L. Morris then referred to the very satisfactory nature of the various reports presented to the meeting, and said that this was largely owing to the energetic ministry of the Pastor. He wished to propose the following resolution, moved by himself and seconded by Mr. Kinghorn :—

That in view of the flourishing state of the congregation, which is mainly due to the earnest, able and untiring efforts of the Rev. James Barclay, this meeting does hereby record its appreciation of his work.

This was carried in the most cordial manner.

Mr. Barclay in reply referred to the great pleasure he had in carrying on the work in St. Paul's Church, and thanked the Kirk-Session, Trustees, and the members of the Church, for the cordial support he had received during the year.

There being no further business the meeting was closed with prayer.

Report of the Trustees, 1887.

It is again the pleasing duty of the Trustees of St. Paul's Church to present to the congregation the annual financial report, and in doing so to express their satisfaction at the continued progress that has been made, largely owing to the faithful services of the Pastor of the Church, the REV. JAMES BARCLAY, M.A., of whose energetic work in all the varied interests of the Church, the Trustees wish to express their cordial appreciation.

The attendance during the year at both the Sunday services has been very large, the pews have been all rented, and the members of the Church have every reason to be thankful for the past and hopeful for the future.

It is with no ordinary feeling of regret that the Board expresses its deep sense of the very great loss it has sustained in the death of Mr. R. A. RAMSAY, who for many years acted as its secretary, and was one of its most active and valued members. His services and advice were always available, and ungrudgingly given, and the Trustees feel that they have each lost a personal friend, and the Church one of its warmest adherents.

The Treasurer's statement is submitted with this report. The amount collected from pew rents is \$7698.60 against \$7801.80 last year, a falling off of \$103.20. The members of the Church are particularly requested to pay their pew rents to the treasurer in January. It is not right that the treasurer whose office is of a purely honorary nature, should be put to the very great trouble of sending for the rent of the pews as often as he has had to do in some cases this year. The Trustees feel sure that it is only want of thought on the part of a portion of the congregation, and trust, their attention having been directed to the matter, that it will not be necessary to recur to it again.

The ordinary plate collections for the year were \$4140.45 against \$2659.82 last year. This increase of over fifty per cent. is largely owing to the adoption of the envelope system, recommended in last year's report and is very gratifying. One hundred and sixteen members have regularly contributed in this way, and it is hoped that this number will be largely increased during the present year. Seeing that

so much has been done in the first year by this system, combined with the usual plate collections for those who do not see their way to adopt it, the Trustees are encouraged to ask every member of the congregation to give this matter careful thought, and to contribute as each may think right, so that at the end of this year, the amount given may again show a large increase.

During the year, the caretaker's house has been completed, and its cost, \$4897.20, charged in the current accounts. To provide for this the Trustees have mortgaged the house and the ground it is built on for \$5,000. at five per cent. interest per annum. They hope that the congregation will before long subscribe this amount, and pay the mortgage off. Meantime there was no other course for the Trustees to pursue. The building of this house was a necessity, and had been already long enough delayed, as the congregation decided at the special meeting held in May, 1886.

To make the revenue meet the expenditure, the treasurer has had to draw from the Guarantee Fund \$3,500. It will be noticed that a large item of the expenditure, \$2,447.83, does not come under the head of ordinary expenses. This sum was spent in fitting up the basement, making a new vestry and class-room for the pastor, putting in a new drain, and other repairs and improvements. These have been very much needed, but could not be done until the house for the caretaker was completed. It is very satisfactory that these changes have been made, and that the accommodation so much needed, has been obtained.

The balance carried over this year is \$430.24 against \$197.75 last year, a difference of \$232.49, deducting this and the amount spent in improvements, \$2,447.83, together \$2,680.32, from the amount drawn from the Guarantee Fund, \$3500, and the small amount borrowed in excess of the actual cost of the caretaker's house, \$103.20, in all, \$3,603.20, leaves \$922.88, the exact amount required this year to make the ordinary revenue sufficient for the ordinary expenditure.

The Trustees in accordance with the by-laws have elected Mr. James Burnett to the vacant seat at the Board.

The two Trustees who retire by rotation this year are Messrs. John Hope and Alex. Ewan. They are both eligible for re-election.

We have to regret the resignation during the year of the following teachers:—Miss Helen Gairdner, Miss Fair, Miss Ewan, Miss Barron, Miss Holt, Miss Davidson, Miss Greenshields; and Messrs. Wm. Cameron, W. B. Shaw, and W. Cameron, *Librarians*. These resignations were chiefly owing to increased engagements and absence from the city, and it is gratifying to know that many of them are only temporary.

The following new teachers have been added to the roll:—Mrs. Barclay, Mrs. Mattice, Miss Mills, Miss Macdonald, Miss Macpherson.

The number of teachers and officers now on the roll is—male, 14, female, 15, total, 29. The number of Scholars now upon the roll is—male, 138, female, 108, total, 246, showing an increase during the year of 17. The amount contributed by the scholars for missionary purposes during the year is \$260.40.

All interested in the Sabbath-School feel thankful to the Trustees for the improvements made to the school-rooms, and for increased accommodation; Mr. Barclay being thereby enabled to conduct his Young Men's Bible-class in comfort and with a marked increase in attendance. The number attending this class is 32.

Mr. Barclay finding it impossible to conduct his Young Women's Bible-class upon Sunday, as his time was wholly occupied with the regular services, with a Young Men's meeting in the morning, and with his Young Men's afternoon class, was obliged to hold his Young Women's class on Wednesday evening. The attendance from the first has been large, and there are now 44 young women belonging to the class.

The Library is in good order ; 250 new books have been added to the catalogue, and the new room is found to be a great improvement. The Teachers are grateful to the Kirk-Session for appointing monthly visitors from amongst the Elders, to the Sunday-School. Not only by this act upon the part of the Session but also by the presence of the Pastor, the Sunday-School assumes its true position and its exercises are regarded as part of the services of the Church.

A very good work was successfully carried out by the Scholars and Teachers on Christmas eve, when they gathered together in the school-room and entertained over fifty poor children recommended by some of our workers amongst the poor. The hearts of these little ones were also gladdened by the sight of two Christmas-trees beautifully decorated, from which gifts were taken and distributed to them before departing.

It was difficult to say which looked the happier—the givers or the receivers—but doubtless many of our Scholars realized that “it is more blessed to give than to receive.”

We are pleased to state that the year just closed has been the most successful since the School was first started, 21 years ago.

The average attendance was very high, viz : 177 for the year, but this is accounted for from the fact that we have adopted the system of giving credit marks for regularity of attendance, good conduct, bringing Bible, &c. each Sunday, and reciting correctly the verses that are on the International Scheme of Lessons. Our experience has been that Sunday-School children need some such encouragement to stimulate them to the study of the Word of God.

The Teachers meet on Wednesday evening of each week for the study of the following Sunday's lesson. This means of intercourse and interchange of thought has already borne fruit, by the Teachers being more earnest and zealous in presenting the truth to their Scholars.

The number on the roll at the close of the year was—boys, 125; girls, 105; total, 230. Teachers—male, 14; female, 12; total, 26.

The Missionary contributions were \$122.38, notwithstanding the fact that the School was closed for 14 Sundays during the year. This

is an average of almost \$3.25 per Sabbath. Since introducing the envelope system the collections have almost doubled. The Cheerful Workers still continue to contribute the sum of \$50.00 annually to the Pointe-aux-Trembles School. Our Treasurer closed the year with every debt paid, and a good balance to carry forward. The amount towards reducing the mortgage debt remains about the same as the preceding year.

After four successive floods, we found that our building had suffered considerable damage, consequently we decided to have the inside thoroughly painted and renovated. This necessitated an outlay of \$200.00, which we consider was well spent.

The Sunday Evening service is conducted by Mr. Larkin of the Presbyterian College, and an adherent of St. Paul's Church. The forcible and eloquent manner in which he presents the truth has largely tended to increase the attendance at those services. They are self-sustaining. It has been suggested by some residents of the district that Sabbath Morning services might also be carried on with good success. There is no doubt whatever, that ere long the field may be ripe for a regularly organized congregation that will do the work more thoroughly and effectively than it is done at present by your teachers.

At the close of the year our brethren of the Ottawa Methodist Church, who for some years have had a successful morning Sabbath School, found that they were obliged to vacate the premises they occupied, and finding themselves unable to secure a convenient place of meeting, applied to your teachers for the use of the Chapel for two hours each Sabbath morning. This was readily granted them on the understanding that they paid a certain proportion of the running expenses of the Chapel.

We have again to complain of the insufficient accommodation of the Chapel for our largely increasing numbers. Our large room is now filled with classes, and the Infant Class-room of 16 feet by 16 feet is always overcrowded, the attendance varying from 70 to 90 each Sunday.
