



FIFTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT.

1891-92.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

1. The Trustees and Managers of the Toronto House of Industry beg to submit the fifty-fifth Annual Report of the affairs of the Institution in accordance with the Act of Incorporation.

INMATES.

2. Application for admission to the House by the aged and infirm are steadily on the increase, but until the management can obtain the funds for increased and improved accommodation, it will be impossible, from a sanitary point of view, to meet the requirements of the increasing population, and the Board would urge upon their successors the necessity of devising some means to accomplish that desirable object.

OUTDOOR RELIEF.

3. Applications for outdoor relief have not been as numerous during the year just closed as during the previous year, the predicted increase in distress happily not being realised. The number of applications for the year ending 1st April, is 1,913, representing 8,676 persons. The relief granted cost the sum of \$11,228. $^{83}_{-60}$, or \$1.31 per capita.

The previous year the applications numbered 2,033, representing 9,453 persons.

The number relieved the past year represent a fraction over four per cent. of the population. This shows a favourable comparison with our experience in the past year under the pressure of a similar depression in trade. Our records show several years when relief was distributed by this Institution to over ten per cent., and in one instance, to over fifteen per cent. of the inhabitants.

4. It will be readily admitted that with the increase in population, not only a corresponding increase in pauperism may be expected, but in large centres like Toronto intensified.

The Board of Management points with satisfaction to the record, showing that the city grant for outdoor relief, extending over a period of twenty-five years, only doubled, while the increase in population was fourfold.

This affords incontestible proof that the mode of relief adopted by this Institution is most decidedly anti-pauperizing in its effect.

5. The Treasurer's statement shows a large debit balance overdrawn at the bank. The supplementary grant from the city last year was inadequate to meet the requirements of the poor, and in consequence the management had to commence the work of the past season with the burden of a considerable debt from the previous year.

A deputation appointed by the Board represented the condition of our finances to the Mayor and Executive Committee of the City Council, and at the request of his worship the distribution to the outdoor was continued until the estimates for the year were considered, when our request would be granted for the necessary additional grant.

6. The reports of the various standing committees of the House, together with the Superintendent's and Physician's, will be found interesting, supplying as they do detailed information concerning the various departments of our work.

We desire thankfully to acknowledge a grant of 2,000 bushels of coke from the Consumers' Gas Company.

Through the voluntary assistance of several clergymen the religious services for the inmates have been regularly held.

The Management desire to express its entire satisfaction with the able manner in which the Superintendent, Mr. Arthur Laughlen, and Mrs. North, the Matron, have discharged their respective duties during the year.

The duties of Mr. Williamson and his assistant were faithfully discharged.

Appended to the report is a comparative table of the number of persons relieved by the House for the past eighteen years.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE TORONTO HOUSE OF INDUSTRY.

There have been seventeen meetings of this committee during the past year.

The work of the House being much lighter in the summer months than throughout the winter, it was determined to hold only monthly instead of semi-monthly meetings from May until October.

The members of the committee have been diligent in their attendance, and most careful in their supervision of all the expenditure of the Institution. As may be seen by the records of the committee's transactions, a meeting has never failed for want of a quorum. Out of the ten members of the committee no one has failed in his attendance at some meetings, and some members attending at almost every meeting of the committee.

At each meeting all the accounts for expenditure have been submitted, and have been carefully supervised and compared with previous accounts and checked over by the committee before being passed for payment. And the expenses have been kept within the strictest economy, while taking care at the same time to preserve the usefulness of the Institution in doing all the good for our less fortunate fellow-citizens within the power of the House with the means placed at its disposal.

No new matters not already made known to the Directors have come before your committee.

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REPORT OF CASUAL POOR COMMITTEE.

To the Board of the House of Industry:

The total number of men Casuals who were in the Lodge for the years ending 31st March, 1890, '91, '92, was respectively 1,481, 1,247, 1,050; for the same years, the number who were

only in one night was 530, 454, 426, or by percentages 35.7, 36.4, 40.5; which, we think, the Board will consider as an indication of improvement in the work of the committee.

The number of Casuals who were in the Lodge from one to three nights was 713; in this respect there is a gradual improvement from year to year, the proportion of those who remain in longer than three nights constantly becoming less.

The number of nights that the remainder—327, less than a third of the whole number—was in the Lodge ranged from three nights to 125 nights, or comparing the record for the same three years we have 198, 166, 125, respectively, as the number of nights during which any one individual was in the Lodge.

The number who was in the Lodge for at least 100 nights for the same years and in the same order was 14, 24, 12; the change in this feature is but slight.

The average number sheltered each night in the Lodge during the months of December, January, February and March was 60.

Taking the years and the order as before the numbers are respectively 75, 82, 60, or by percentages on total number in Lodge for the years, 5.6½, 5.7, wherein the Board will see but small variation during the three past years.

In addition to the 1,050 men Casuals, there were sheltered in the Lodge last year eighty-two women.

The number of Casuals representing themselves as coming from outside the city was 290, or 271 per cent. of the whole number of men.

During the season 804 cords of wood were cut and split by the men Casuals in the wood yard; for the three past seasons the number of cords cut and split was 404, 729, 804.

Your committee has much pleasure in stating that all the arrangements in connection with the labour-test have been satisfactory this year, more so than during any past year. We can speak in terms of praise of the manner in which the Rogers' Coal Company has performed its part of the contract of supplying uncut wood and of taking the cut wood away from our yard; also of the ability and devotion shewr, by all the servants of the Board who are concerned in this difficult but most necessary part of the Board's work for the city of Toronto.

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It is the settled conviction of your committee that if the House of Industry were without the labour-test, as it was for so many years till within the past three or four years, the average number in the Lodge last winter, instead of being 60, would have been 180 at least.

Until the vagrant is offered some alternative, that even he will recognize as more unpleasant and disagreeable than work, the tramp trouble can never be cured. The so-called social question is here. What is Toronto, Canada, going to do with it? Let us on behalf of Toronto contribute, he it ever so little, towards the solution of the perplexing question.

The expense for maintenance of Wayfarer's Lodge last year was \$1,586.14, and on Capital account there was spent \$381.16—total \$1.967.30.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON VISITATION AND OUTDOOR RELIEF.

The number of families relieved since April of last year has been 1,913, which is about 120 less than the corresponding period of 1890-91.

The total number of persons receiving assistance from this Institution during the year, including 1,133 Casuals, is 8,676, which is 777 less than last year.

It is a matter of satisfaction to all who are seeking to improve the condition of the poor, to know that distress and poverty are not on the increase in the city.

In addition to the House as a central depôt for the distribu-Lion of bread, we have a depôt in the east, under the care of Mr. James Simpson; two in the west, under Mr. G. Wiley and Mrs. E. Fair; and one in the north, supervised by Mr. James Hickman, corner Belmont and Yonge streets.

50,638 loaves of bread, costing \$4,555, have been distributed this season, as against 50,316 last year, with an added cost of

13,550 lbs. of groceries, consisting of oatmeal, rice, sugar and tea, costing \$648, have been given out to the sick, the amount last year being 15,205 lbs., at a cost of \$818.50.

Two Conferences of Visitors have been held during the season, the first in November, the second early in April.

As the result of these conferences it has been ascertained that about five per cent. of all applicants are refused assistance, and about twenty-five per cent, are new cases.

Among the causes of distress drink and improvidence take a leading place, while forty per cent. of those relieved were able and willing to work but unable to find employment.

The question of providing work, instead of relief, for the ablebodied is so important that it was recommended by the Conference of Visitors that when Supplementary grants were made to the House by the City Corporation, a certain proportion of the grant should, if possible, be given in the way of furnishing labour to those who are out of employment, and that then work-coupons could be placed in the hands of the visitors, to be distributed amongst able-bodied applicants.

The work of visitation throughout the forty-five districts was never more efficiently performed than it has been during the past year; and these fifty gentlemen who give so much of their time to the cause of the poor and the friendless, are not only seeking to afford them temporary relief, but to encourage habits of industry, frugality, temperance and good living, and thus render them permanent benefit by promoting their self-respect and self-support.
