Mr. M. J. Butler, former Deputy Minister of Railways, has been making a speech before the Boston City Club. He told the club that the new Transcontinental line will cost \$350,000,000 when completed. This is about \$75,000,000 more than Mr. Borden's estimate of 1908. Mr. Borden figured that the eastern section, and the guarantee on the western portions would amount to \$250,000,000. The cost of the Mountain and Prairie section above the guarantee would be \$25,000,000. Mr. Butler's additional \$75,000,000 would probably include rolling stock and other equipment.






