WHAT HONEST GOVERNMENT HAS DONE.

Many interesting facts regarding the improvement that has taken place in the administration of the affairs of the Province under the present Government have been brought out in the speeches made so far during the budget

In 1909, the first full year of the present Government, revenue of the Province was \$1,259,826 and in 1911 \$1,347,077, an increase of \$\$7,251.

The territorial revenue for 1907, the last year of the old Government, was \$321,550. As a result of four years of honest administration of the Crown lands of the Province the territorial revenue in 1911 was \$528,439, an increase of \$206,899.

Crease of \$206,899. The stumpage collected in 1907, the last year of the old Government, was \$180,135. In 1911 it was \$376,679, an increase of \$187,593. This stumpage was collected from practically the same areas of land and there was no increase in the lumber cut, as shown by the return of trans-Atlantic shipments and the logs cut in the saw
