German Airships Raid Northeastern England

London, Mar. 13-Hostile airships again raided the northeast coast of England tonight.

In his report on the raid, Field Marshal French says: "One or two hostile airships attacked the northess coast soon after 9.30 o'clock tonight. About twenty bombs have fallen close to the coast. There are no reports regarding the casualties or damage as yet.'

French Get Four.

Paris, Tuesday, Mar. 12-Four German machines brought down and fifteen trained aviators, mechanics and pilots killed or made prisoners, were the German casualties in last night's air attack on Paris. The raid was attempted on a scale of magnitude hitherto unapproached, nine squadrons participating in the attack. Some of the machines followed the Rivers Oise and Ourcq, while others came along the Creil-Paris and Soissons-Paris railroads.

The percentage of the units that succeeded in reaching Paris was small. The aerial defense has improved greatly since the time of former raids and many of the German machines were forced back and obliged to drop their cargoes of bombs in the vacant fields.

THE BRITISH ARMY WINS IN PALESTINE

Attacking Over Eleven Mile Front on Coast Section Allenby Captures Seven Villages, Gaining Three Miles—French Inflict Heavy Losses on Enemy in Champagne.

London, Mar. 13-Attacking over an eleven mile front on the pastal sector in Palestine, East Anglian, South Anglian and Indian troops have advanced to an average depth of three miles, according to an official statement issued by the war office tonight.

The official statement says: "We captured the villages of Rentis, El Lubban, Deir Ballut, Mejdel, Yaba and El Mirr, on either side of Wadi Abulejja and Wadi Deir Ballut, which were passed in the course of the forward movement. The enemy resisted stubbornly about Deir Ballut and El Mirr. Our air service cooperated with the infantry and dispersed enemy troops with bombs

Destruction by German Submarines Continues at Practically Same Rate of Prog-

London, Mar. 13-The Admiralty re London, Mar. 13—The Admiratity reports the loss by mine or submarine of eighteen British merchantmen in the past week and one fabing vessel. Of this fifteen were 1,600 tons or over and three under that tonnage.

Americans Still Active.

The American sector in Lorraine, which is now definitely located east of Luneville, is the most active on the French front. Great artillery combats are being carried out by the Americans, who have determined, by raiding operations, that their artillery fire has forced the Germans virtually to abandon their front lines.

Two hundred gas projectors installed for the purpose of supporting attacks on the Americans have been destroyed by shells.

London, March 13.—Premier Lloyd George, speaking in London today, said there had been criticism because the cabinet ministers had not given sufficient prominence to the idea of a league of nations in their speeches. The Bolsheviki had taught them one lesson—that was that a real league of nations did not come by talking about it. The critics had forgotten something which was essential—that once a war was begun you had to fight for it. They must not be misled by mistaking phrases for facts. He could invent phrases about peace which even a Prussian war lord would hall with satisfaction.

Nobody had been so eloquent on the subject of a league of nations, said the premier, as the German em-peror. His reply to the 19pe breath-ed the spirit of brotherly love, but ed the spirit of protherity love, out in it there was no word about Bej-gium. On the subject of a league of nations the German emperor was absolutely sound; he was prepared to put Germany at the head of it. All through those protestations on the part of the Emperor breathed the spirit of domination; the dagger was wrapped up in the sermon on the

A league of nations could only be possible when the entente armies had won; only then could a league of and the sword be converted

and the sword be converted into a ploughshare.
Coming down to internal affairs, the premier said there was no longer. There was no privation, but the people were being deprived of a good deal they had been taught to regaard as the essentials of a comfortable existance. There was no lack of abundant food to sustain the strength of

ant food to sustain the strength of the people and no prospect of such deficiency, but there was a tendency to grumble at restrictions.

"The people face big things" continued the premier, "but get worried over small ones. There has been only one successful food controller in the history of the world—the One who made five leaves and two small fishes feed a multitude. I tell you what rationing means. It means that a nation in the furnace of war is becoming more of a brotherhood."

While the Entente Allies are "nibbling" at the German lines from the North Sea to Switzerland, but are making little or no serious attempts to break through or bring about a culminating struggle, the Teutonic powers have taken another step in the exploitation of the east. The advance guards of the Germans have entered Odessa, the greatest Russian port on the Black Sea and the center of a great agricultural section, the products of which are desired to feed the hungry peoples of the Central Empires. The German advance through Moldavia and Bessarabia has been virtually unop-

With Odessa safely in their hands, the Teutons will have access to vast stores of wheat which can be transported overland or by sea to points where it can be readily shipped into Austria and

But the capture of Odessa will mean something more over the route to Persia and Afghanistan and possibly India, which is to be followed now that the British have severed the famous Berlin and Bagdad route to the east.

The congress of Russian soviets, which was to have convened at Moscow on Tuesday, postponed its meeting until Thursday. This gathering may be historic, as it will be asked to ratify or reject the peace forced upon the Bolshevik peace delegates by the Germans at Brest-Litovsk.

The government emphasizes that the whole character of the war has gradually changed since last year, involving the complete transformation of the British admiration and organization.



He regarded the road set as one of the important pieces of legislation that could come before the House. Although he had only been in office a short time, he had managed during the last year to visit nearly every section of the province. He had travelled 9,800 miles in automobile and had experience with all kind of roads, so he might claim to be more familiar with the roads than many hon, members of the House. Acting upon the knowledge that he had gathered during his travels, he had endeavored to place in the bill certain sections to meet the conditions as he saw them.

Two Classes of Roads.

One section of the bill proposes to divide the roads into two classes, trunk roads and branch roads. This division was to be made by the minister of public works, and before acting it was his intention to discuss the matter fully with his colleagues on the government side, as well as with the hon members opposite. Having adopted the principle of road divisions, it was only fair that those familiar with the conditions in the different sections of the province should be consulted and their views obtained. While he differed in politics from the hon members opposite he did not propose to allow that fact to make highway legislation successful it was necessary to get as close to the people as possible. They had also taken the ground that road supervisors should be elected, as accessed trustees are now elected.
