London, March 16, (By Canadian Associated Press cable)—Many Canadian officers were entertained at dinner yesterday by the National Liberal Club in the room in which the Canadian conrederation agreement was signed over lifty years ago. The Marquis of Lincolashire presided, and the toak of Canada was proposed by Sir Hamar Greenwood, who said that Canada in the war had done perhaps more than any of the other dominions, and had kept her divisions up to full strength by Canadian men from across the Atlantic. No soldier was more loyal to discipline than the Canadian, or provided officers more suitable.

Responding, Sir Edward Kemp said that, at the beginning of the war, a man would have been regarded as a lunatic who had foreshadowed that \$10,000 or \$415,000 Canadian soldiers would be sent to fight in Europe, yet that was what had been accomplished.

Many now lay in France and Belgium. They in Canada were not sorry that Canada had brought upon herself a similar burden to that of other countries, but they were proud they had come into the war.
