

Leave of Absence on Ground of Extreme Hardship Procedure to obtain Leave of Absence

Men Nineteen and Dwenty Years of Age.

It has come to the attention of the Government that there is a wideep and impression that young men of nineteen years, and those who became twenty since (Crobbe 18, 1917, as well as those who may become mineteen from time to direction by have seen obwill selection up a for enter under the land by Service Act, are to be immediately ealed to the colours.

This impression is quite incorrect. No date has yet been fixed for calling upon such men to so report for outy, nor has the question been brought be ore the Cabinet for decision. In view of the need of labour on the farm, it is most unlikely that consideration will be given to the matter until after the harves is over, although or course the Government's action must be determined primarily by the military situation.

There is no further obligation in umbent upon young men of the ages above mentioned who have registered or who do so hereafter, until they receive notice from the Registrars.

Harvest Leave.

Some engineer have been received as to the possibility of granting harveste leave to such troops as may be in the country at that time. No definite assurance can be given on this fooling at salvantage, must be taken of ships as they become available. On the other hand, harvest leave will be given if at all possible.

Leave of Ansenderon Grounds of British Paraship.

It is desired that the Regulations respecting leave of absence in cases of hardship should be vicely known and fully understood. Such leave will be granted in two cases - (a) where extreme hardship arises by reason of the not that the man concerned is eit ler the only son capable of earning a livelihood of a father killed or disabled on service or presently in service overseas, or in training for such service, or useer breatment after returning from overseas; or the only remaining of two or more prothers capable of earning a livelihood (the other brother or prothers having been killed or disabled on service, or being present in service overseas, or in training for overseas or under treatment after his or their return from overseas); brothers married before 4th August, 1914, living in separate establishments and having a child or children not to be counted in determining the fact that the man 's the 'only' remaining so so brothers (b) where extreme hardship arises by reason of exceptional circumstances such as the fact that the man concerned is the sole support of a widowed mother, an invalid father or other helpless dependents.

It is to be noted that in all these cases the governing factor is not hardship. lose or suffering to the individual concerned, but to others, that is, members of his family or those depending upon him.

Procedure to obtain leave of absence.

A simple system for dealing with these cases has been adopted. Forms of eation have been supplied to every Depot Battalion and an officer of each battalion has been detailed whose duty it is to give them immediate attention. The man concerned thould on reporting to his unit state that he desires to apply for leave of absence on one or more of the grounds mentioned and his application form will then be filled out and forwarded to Militia Headaugue a Divivio. In the meantime, if the case appears meritorious, the man will be given provisional. leave of absence for thirty days so that he may return home and continue his civil occupation while his case is being finally disposed of.




