### F. F. BUSTEED PASSED AWAY

Former C.P.R. General Superintendent Dies of Heart Failure.

Francis Ferguson Busted, former general superintendent of the C. P. R. and one of the best known railway construction superintendents of the West, died suddenly of heart disease last night, at his home at 2174 and Tolu- mie streets.

Mr. Busted was 60 years old and had been a resident of Vancouver for many years.

He was born at Basking Point, P. Q., in 1858, attended Montreal High School and graduated from McGill University. He was married in 1885 to Miss Clara Ferguson and entered the C. P. R. service in 1879.

In 1890 he left the C. P. R. to enter the employ of the Canadian & Great Falls Railway and was subsequently in the office of the city engineer of Bristol, Va. He returned to the C. P. R. in 1892, being successively employed as rodman, assistant engineer, resident engineer, engineer in charge of way and structures and division engineer and superintendent.

Final Promotion.

He was appointed assistant chief engineer in June, 1904, and in 1907 was appointed general superintendent, succeeding the late R. Marpole. He was transferred to Winnipeg as general superintendent of the Manitoba division in 1911 and departed for the occasion for a banquet sponsored by Vancouver business and professional men. He re-entered the engineering department of the road the same year, in charge of double-tracking and grading the division from Calgary to the coast, which included the Comnought tunnel through the Selkirk.

Mr. Busted went on the retired list in 1918 and since that time had done little active work. It was during the period of his retirement that he superintended the largest political gathering in the history of Campbellton.

Engineering Expects.

Mr. Busted was in charge of some of the greatest engineering work of the Dominion, among them the construction of the Selkirk tunnel through the Rockies at Field, B. C.

After retiring from active work Mr. Busted made his home at Glencoe Lodge until a week ago, when he took a house at 2174 and Tolu- mie streets. He had apparently been in excellent health and his death was entirely unexpected. He was stricken early yesterday, in his home, and died a few hours later.

Surviving Mr. Busted are Mrs. Busted, a brother T. D. Busted, Cross Point, P. Q.; a son, Dr. D. F. Busted, 1163 Twenty-sixth Avenue West, Vancouver; and a daughter, Miss Marjorie Busted, living at home.


A younger son, Francis A. Busted, was killed in the war. Mr. Busted was a brother of the late Lieut.-Col. Edward Bosford Busted, K. C. of Montreal.

Arrangements for the funeral had not been completed last night.—Vancouver Sun.

### LIBERALS WILL MEET

Convention to be held at St. Leonard's on Friday, Oct. 14th.

The Liberals of Restigouche and Madawaska will hold their convention at St. Leonard's on Friday, Oct. 14th. A large number of supporters and delegates have signified their intention of going up as to give the convention the necessary impetus and the workers greater enthusiasm.

A special train will leave Campbellton at 7:15 a.m. returning the same evening, besides the inducement of being able to make the trip in one day there is a further one, that of a reduced fare; the fare being \$6.15 re- turn. All necessary arrangements pertaining to the comforts of the 2 supporters have been gone into and no one will regret having made the journey.

At a meeting of the Liberals held last evening in the Murray Block four delegates and four alternatives were chosen to represent Campbellton and the Parish at the Convention. The delegates are—

Campbellton—W. S. Comeau and Edward Alexander, alternatives, Jos. Bonneau and Max Moore.

Parish Delegates—Harvey Gillis and Joseph Duncan, alternatives, P. S. Martin and Jack McBeath.

Besides these delegates it is expected that a large number of supporters throughout the country will attend the convention and help make it the biggest and grandest ever held in Restigouche and Madawaska.

### NEW BRUNSWICK GOES DRY

Great Prohibition Victory for New Brunswick—Majority Two to One.

It is believed that the referendum on the importation of liquor into New Brunswick was carried on Monday by about 25,000 majority. Every county but two—Gloucester and Madawaska, voted for prohibition. Restigouche County gave a majority of 339, the figures being as follows—

### MUFFS ARE BACK

IN FAVOR AGAIN.

Silk Stockings Made From Sand.

LONDON, Oct. 8.—Muffs have returned to favor among fashionably-dressed women here after having been banished from their wardrobe for several years. West End shops are now selling old-fashioned "granny" muffs, made to match coats and stoles. Shopkeepers explain that one reason for this change is that the price of skins has fallen considerably. Most of the large muffs shown have velvet ribbon chains, but they are made to hold instead of slip over the neck.

PARIS, Oct. 3.—Silk stockings made from ordinary sand is the latest invention of Michael Roboulet, a young Russian engineer who succeeded in escaping from the Bolshevik two years ago and with a small fortune established a laboratory in Paris. Roboulet asserts that by combining silica with other ingredients he has succeeded in creating a material which can be woven as easily as the choicest silks, while the cost will be less than one-fourth.

By increasing the quantity of silica used non-inflammable silks for cin- ergas can be produced.

RUSSIA WOULD BUY CANADIAN WHEAT

Might Purchase Grain if Advantageous Offers Were Made, Declares Russian Soviet Trade Com.

London, Sept. 22.—M. Krassin, Russian Trade Commissioner, who is at present in Berlin, told the London Daily Express correspondent that he was returning to London to continue negotiations with the British Government for new trade arrangements after which he would perhaps go to Canada.

Government was most interested in Canadian agricultural machinery and in Canadian industrial arrangements to fight the drought. Russia, he said, might buy Canadian wheat if advantageous offers were made and Canada, he hoped, might become a market for Russian wine, tobacco and furs.

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### GRIM PICTURE AT ASTRAKHAN

Famine, Disease, Rain and Snow the Portion of Helpless Emigrants.

Astrakhan, Russia, Oct. 3.—Hopeless groups of famine refugees crowd the wharves of Astrakhan. Bitter rains are falling almost continuously, and the first snow of the Russian winter has whitened the roofs of the buildings of the city but the throngs of emigrants have no shelter while they wait, perhaps vainly, for transportation to the Kuban and Don regions, where they can obtain food. Astrakhan is a city of misery and suffering and death.

Astrakhan once was a city filled with industries and commerce, but it is now but a shadow of its former self. Death seems to dog the footsteps of the refugees. They are fleeing from starvation, but many hungry children and adults die from the first food they eat, because of their weakened condition. Black typhus took a terrible toll in Astrakhan during the winter of 1919-1920. Four out of every hundred physicians died during the awful scourge. During the past summer Asiatic cholera and malaria have carried off thousands of victims.

The pastor, Rev. E. Val Tilton, occupied the pulpit of Central Methodist church at both services Sunday and in the morning preached a powerful sermon on "Endurance." The evening service was addressed by ex-Mayor Hanford Price and Mr. Amos O'Brien, Secretary of the School Board, regarding the Referendum being voted on Monday.

Special music was rendered by the choir under the direction of Prof. Mountford. In the morning Mrs. Frank Bedford and Mr. Walter Neale took solo parts in the anthems. At the evening service Mrs. Caswell took the solo part in the anthem and Miss Mary F. Dickie of Boston, sang two solos splendidly.

After the service the congregation joined in a song service in the vestry.

### OBITUARY.

Mrs. Alexander Loudoun.

The death of Chatham is announced of Mrs. Loudoun, widow of the late Alexander Loudoun, at one time an active business man of that town. She was born in Scotland and came to the Miramichi when quite young. She was one of Chatham's oldest citizens, being 90 years of age. She had a family of ten, all of whom are living.

The funeral took place today, and was largely attended.

## KAISER WAS KEPT IN IGNORANCE

March on Paris Was Practiced in Army Manoeuvres

PARIS, Oct. 6.—Before the great German rush was made on Paris in 1914, every detail of it had been rehearsed three times at Cambrai, army manoeuvres. Further, at each rehearsal, the scene was played out before the Kaiser who was in command of the night watch, went forward to take and received from General von Moltke, who was in command, the report: "If you do that when the war begins we will lose." The prophecy was fulfilled.

In a passage of his memoirs the General relates how, right up to the last moment, the Kaiser believed that England would not fight and would prevent France from doing so. The whole war, he believed, would be on the Western front, and when he had been persuaded to sign the mobilization orders he wanted them recalled and the troops halted an hour's march from the French and Belgian frontiers.

#### NOW, AND THEN.

In the election campaign of 1896 the supporters of a dying administration went about the country telling the people that the return to power of a Liberal government would mean the ruin of Canada. Stories of economic and industrial disaster in the event of a change were spread from coast to coast. At that time the unemployment question was a grave one. The farmers were discouraged, trade depression was marked and many soup kitchens were being operated in the more thickly populated centres. In the midst of this disheartening condition Canadians were warned that if the Liberals were selected to deal with the tariff the change would be disastrous to the Dominion. The Liberals were chosen, and everybody knows what happened. The soup kitchens disappeared, trade increased tremendously, agriculture and the other great industries speedily found themselves on a firm footing, and for fifteen years Canada grew as it has never grown in any other period.

Today the unemployment question is again grave, trade is depressed, agriculture is suffering and the whole industrial outlook is dark enough. Yet Mr. Meighen is going about Canada pleading for public support and warning the people that a change of government will be followed by the ruin of the Dominion. "That talk," says the Toronto Globe, "is pitifully reminiscent of that which flooded the land before the general election of 1896." But the very thing that Mr. Meighen is warning the people against is the change that Canada needs at this critical time. Mr. Meighen and his government have failed. The policies, such as they are, which he has followed, and which he now asks the people to endorse have not brought prosperity. Mr. Meighen has been Premier for more than a year and he has been a member of the cabinet for nearly three years. During that time Canada, economically, commercially and industrially, has gone from bad to worse. The government has done nothing to remedy these evils. There is in the Premier's manifesto not a word which leads to the hope that if the government were sustained it would do anything to remedy these evils. There is not a word which promises relief from "the staggering railway deficits, the revenue shrinkage, the excessive taxes and unemployment." In fact, as the Globe says, "the country has come to the realization that the Meighen government like the government that clung to office prior to 1896, is an obstacle to better conditions. The electors have determined it ought to be defeated and will be defeated."

Bearing in mind the great prosperity of Canada during the fifteen years following the advent to power of the Laurier government, Mr. Meighen's talk about ruination if the Liberals are elected will not carry much weight. It is ridiculous on the face of it. Canada will welcome a return to settled industry and good times, and it is plain enough that this improvement cannot be brought about by the decadent Meighen administration.—EX.

#### THE PROHIBITION REFERENDUM.

##### NOW WHAT?

The Dominion law requires that, upon any province voting against importation of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes, the Federal Parliament shall issue a proclamation by order-in-Council forbidding interprovincial traffic in liquor from a certain date and that such action shall be taken inside of three months after the vote. New Brunswick can then look for tangible evidence of the value of last Monday's polling.

In the meantime, however, the overwhelming majority in favor of prohibition affords abundant proof to the law enforcement officers that public opinion is at the back of them, and that the public requires from them all strict fulfillment of their duty.

Probably no town in the Province is more strongly manned in this respect than is Campbellton and with three policemen, two liquor inspectors and the recent expression of public opinion, this town demands that every boot-legger and all illicit traffic shall be stopped.

It is no excuse for such a boot-legger "higher ups or lower downs" and a clean town is not only possible but also strictly demanded.

"A hunter in New Brunswick," says the Montreal Free Press, "heard a noise in the bush and fired, killing a man. 'This sort of thing will go on so long as that kind of people are allowed to remain outside of jail.'"

**TRADE IN CANADA IS IMPROVING**

Many Staple Lines Are in Demand—Conditions Are Better.

Sentiment in Canada business circles continues to show gradual improvement, according to despatches received by Dun's Review from branch offices of R. G. Dun and Co. in the principal cities. Dry goods wholesalers report orders fairly numerous, and there is an increased demand for the better wearing apparel and shoes. Seasonable wearing apparel is moving freely at retail, and wholesalers and manufacturers are receiving a satisfactory number of replenishing orders. In other staple lines, the trend is toward improvement, and expectations of a return to more normal conditions are heightened by further recovery in industrial departments and generally favorable harvesting results. Collections are slightly better, and the gradual easing in the financial situation is helpful to the growing feeling of confidence in the future.

Montreal reports a slightly improved sentiment demand for seasonable dry goods, clothing and the finer grades of footwear being fairly active, while city retail trade has picked up and orders from country merchants are increasing. Collections are well maintained. Business at Quebec is well up to the average for this period, both in wholesale and retail lines, with country merchants ordering more freely and collections better. Halifax reports that buying is closely confined to immediate needs, which is largely a result of the quietness in the lumber industry and the stringency in the money market. Collections are slow. Although the tendency is towards improvement increased demand for seasonable dry goods at Toronto, and here is a somewhat staples, buying remains cautious and goods, footwear, clothing and other does not extend very far beyond requirements in sight. Collections are fairly prompt.

While weather conditions in the Far West and Northwest have interfered with threshing in some districts, harvesting results are favorable, on the whole, and the business situation shows improvement. Wholesalers at Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Regina and other important trade centres report that retail distribution is better, and wholesalers state that both city and country merchants are operating with more confidence. Their orders cover a wide range of commodities, including seasonable dry goods, clothing, footwear, groceries, provisions, hardware, furniture and many other staples. Collections are slightly easier.






