CORNER-STONE OF NEW HIGH SCHOOL LAID TODAY

IMPRESSIVE CEREMONY MARKS LAYING OF CORNER-STONE OF NEW HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

Lieut.-Governor Todd Here For The Occasion—Hon. D. A. Stewart, A. W. Crawford, Dominion Director of Technical Education, Pius Michaud And Other Prominent Men Present—Large Crowd Hear Several Fine Addresses.

The laying of the Corner Stone of Campbellton's new Composite High School building took place here this afternoon at 3.30 o'clock. Lieutenant Governor W. F. Todd arrived here at noon for the occasion, having motored through from Fredericton with Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, and Mr. R. S. Barker, his official secretary. His Honor, the Lieut.-Governor laid the corner-stone of the new building which is to be a handsome three-storey structure of brick.

Impressive Ceremony
The occasion was marked by an impressive ceremony. Following the severe weather of the past week, a beautiful autumn day made the opening meeting a pleasant one and the function was, in consequence, very largely attended.

The stirring song "O Canada" sung by a lusty-voiced throng of school children opened the program and was followed by the introductory remarks of Mr. M. A. Kelly, Chairman of the Campbellton School Board. His Worship, Mayor W. C. McKay then extended a hearty welcome to all visitors. Following this Lieut.-Governor Todd laid the corner-stone of the building and addressed the gathering in fitting words.

Hon. D. A. Stewart, representing the provincial government. Mr. Pius Michaud, M. P., Dr. L. G. Pinault and A. W. Crawford, Dominion Director of Technical Education were also among the speakers. Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, Premier of New Brunswick and W. S. Carter, Chief Superintendent of Education, were both unable to attend, owing to the press of their official duties elsewhere. Professor F. Peacock, Provincial Director of Vocational Education was also present as well as Principal Bridges of the local High School and other leaders in educational affairs in Campbellton. The ceremony closed with the singing of the national anthem.

Owing to the fact that the ceremony has just begun as we go to press, it is impossible to reproduce a detailed account of the different speeches.

The late Miss McDonald who was in her 22nd year was always very popular among a host of friends in Campbellton and her passing will be mourned by a wide circle of friends and acquaintances. She had been in ill health for a number of years and during the past twelve months had been confined to her bed.

Deceased leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and affectionate daughter and sister her bereaved parents, four brothers and two sisters. The brothers are Vans of Vernon, B. C.; Austin of Cranbrook, B. C.; Albert and Gerald at home. The sisters are Mrs. Lewis Symons, New York and Harriet at home. To the grief-stricken family the heartfelt sympathy of the community is extended in the loss of their beloved one.

The funeral services which were held Tuesday afternoon at 2.30 Rev. W. W. McNair officiating, were largely attended, friends from far and near being in attendance to pay their last tribute of respect to the departed. MATAPEDIA VALLEY ROAD BLOCKED

Motor Traffic Stopped By Recent Snow Storm—Said To Be Earliest In Quebec In 72 Years.

As a result of the recent snow storm which proved so severe in many parts of Quebec Province, the upper portion of the Matapedia Valley road has been blocked for several days as far as motor traffic is concerned, according to reports received here yesterday.

One motorist from Quebec city, on his way through to New Brunswick, was unable to return. Mr. Boulanger, deputy minister of roads in Quebec, who was also in that district found it necessary to abandon his car at Sayabec and complete a trip from Matapedia by train. His car is still there. It snowed for thirty hours in that district and at the end there was a foot and a half of snow on the road.

While the delays caused to motorists and others is serious enough a more serious condition was made apparent to-day when it was learned that the great majority of the farmers in the district have not yet garnered all their crops, particularly their potatoes. Many of these have been dug up and are now lying on the ground beneath a foot of snow. A large number of trees were badly damaged.

In upper Quebec, four provincial highways have been closed because of storms and dozens of American cars who have been lined up along the roadway through the Beauce valley unable to continue because of the snow. Orders have been issued by the Roads Department to have the road cleared of snow. For the first time in the history of the province the authorities have been caught unawares, through no fault of their own, of course, but merely because the snow arrived earlier than at any time in seventy-two years.

R. C. PRESBYTERY AT KEDGWICK BURNED

Only Heavy Rain Which Set In During Fire Saved Church Under Construction.

Kedgwick, N. B., Oct. 13.—The Roman Catholic Presbytery at this place was completely destroyed by fire during the week-end, and only for the heavy rain which set in when the fire was at its height the new church, now in course of construction, would have been destroyed too.

The fire was discovered about 1.30 a. m. and for about three hours it burned fiercely until nothing was left of the presbytery or its contents.

Rev. Father Thibault is the priest in charge and he and members of his household were fortunate in escaping with their lives.

Father Thibault, while deploring his loss, is ready to face his duties as before.

RATS INVADE PALACE AND DRIVE STARTS

"National Rat Week" Begins Early in Great Britain

London, Oct. 12.—Owing to the recent invasion of Buckingham Palace by rats and their increase throughout the country, the anti-rat society has started its fall campaign urging housewives, storekeepers and all other patriotic citizens to "do your rat killing early."

Ordinarily, "national rat week" when special efforts are made to exterminate the pest, is celebrated late in November, but this year the date has been shoved up on the calendar owing to indications that there will be an early winter.

FATAL ACCIDENT ON THE RESTIGOUCHE

Frederick T. Mowat Fatally Shot By His Own Gun On Monday—Funeral Services Tomorrow.

England's Flats on the Restigouche River about 31 miles from Matapedia, was the scene of a most distressing accident on Monday when Frederick Thomas Mowat, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Mowat of this town, was accidentally shot by his own rifle and died from the injury about an hour later.

The late Mr. Mowat, accompanied by his father, was up the Restigouche inspecting a fishing lodge which had just been completed and was in readiness for next season's activities. Father and son were just leaving for home when the sad accident occurred. Both men had stepped into the canoe in which they were to run the river, Mr. Mowat-Sr. taking his place in the stern.

The younger man showed the craft off from shore and stepping in noticed that his rifle lay with the muzzle pointing toward him. As a precautionary measure he proceeded to re-arrange it and evidently the hammer caught on the seat or some article of his luggage, for the next instant it was discharged. The bullet shattered his right hand and followed the arm, cutting the main artery in the upper arm and apparently lodging in his chest. Whether the bullet found its way to the lung or not has not been definitely established but the unfortunate young man died within an hour from the loss of blood. He was conscious for some minutes after the accident occurred.

Sandy Fraser, a young riverman who was near at hand, assisted the father and the remains were brought down the river as far as Flatland from where they were conveyed by motor to Campbellton.

The late Mr. Mowat, who was in his twenty-ninth year, was well known here and throughout the province in military circles. For some time he had been engaged in the lumber business with his father who has long been prominent in the business life of the North Shore. The deceased engaged in active service during the late war having gone overseas as a lieutenant with the 132nd North Shore Regiment and being later transferred to the famous 26th Battalion. Since the war the late Mr. Mowat took a keen interest in military matters in the province and was also very popular among a wide circle of friends here, all of whom will deeply regret his untimely death.

Besides his bereaved father and mother the deceased is survived by three sisters, Mrs. H. A. Carr of Campbellton, Mrs. A. R. Fraser of Moncton and Miss Claire, R. N. of New York.

The funeral services which will be held from the deceased's late home on Andrew Street and which were postponed until tomorrow afternoon at 3.30 o'clock owing to the unfortunate delay in getting word to Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Carr who have been absently despatched after news of the accident had reached here but owing to the wires being down as a result of the recent storm, the message was, in consequence, delayed.

The bereaved relatives have the heartfelt sympathy of all in this sorrow which has so suddenly come upon them.

SUDDEN DEATH OF JOHN W. RICHARDS

Well Known Member of Firm of Richards Mfg. Co. Passed Away On Monday Morning.

The numerous friends and many business acquaintances of the late John W. Richards of this town will learn with regret of his sudden death which occurred at his home about 5 o'clock on Monday morning. Mr. Richards sudden death was due to a stroke of paralysis and was altogether unexpected as he had just returned on Sunday from Montreal where he had received encouraging word from a specialist regarding his health.

The deceased gentleman who was in his 54th year was a member of the Richards Mfg. Co., large lumber operators here and was well known throughout the province. Besides his wife he leaves to mourn six sons and one daughter. The sons are William in California, Claude in the West and Lyman, Cecil, David and Thomas at home; the daughter is Miss Mildred of New York.

The late Mr. Richards is also survived by three sisters, Mrs. James Evans, Mrs. Eliza Moore, and Mrs. Beatrice Somers of Campbellton and one brother Mr. W. S. Richards also of this town. To these sorrowing relatives the heartfelt sympathy of the community is extended.

The funeral services which were held yesterday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock and which were conducted by the Rev. Dr. Camp, were very largely attended, friends and acquaintances from all sections of the country being present.

ALCOHOL SEIZED AT BUCTOUCHE

\$2,000 Taken at Buctouche in Raid Interrupted by U. S. Customers' Arrival.

Chatham, N. B., Oct. 14.—Customs Officer G. P. Stewart, W. P. Dawes, O. B. McQuarrie, E. LeBlanc and Prohibition Inspector J. B. Springer made a surprise raid on premises of James Nowlan at Buctouche, resulting in a seizure of about two thousand dollars worth of alcohol.

The liquor had been ready for shipment by auto. When the officers were searching two American cars drove up but left hurriedly when they saw that officers were on the premises. A diligent search was made but no further trace of liquor was found on the premises. Nowlan has had the name of being one of the most successful rum runners in the province; his location near the seashore and the main highway makes his business easy, so all he has to do is land the goods in secret there and the buyers have only to come for it.

BANK ACCOUNTANT SENT TO PRISON
Toronto, Oct. 14.—W. A. Chavner, former accountant of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, was yesterday sentenced by Magistrate Jones to a determinate period of two years less one day in jail, to be followed by an indeterminate period not to exceed two years less one day for theft from the bank.

\$250,000 WORTH OF ALCOHOL BURNED
Halifax, N. S., Oct. 14.—Twenty-five thousand gallons of alcohol, valued at \$250,000, were destroyed by fire that ravaged the 35,000 gallon cargo of alcohol on board the steamer Hohenlinden here yesterday. The fire was caused by escaping fumes from the tin containers being ignited in the ship's engine room.

STORM SEVERE IN SOME SECTIONS

Nearly Two Feet Of Snow Fell In Some Districts—Wires Down and Other Damage Caused.

While the recent snow storm was not as severe in the immediate vicinity of Campbellton as in other parts of the country, it marked the roughest weather experienced here so early in the season for a number of years.

Hunters who had gone to the woods last week in search of game, however, experienced some difficulty in getting about. In some sections the snowfall amounted to one and a half feet and in many cases back roads were blocked to motor traffic by the drifts. On the I. N. R. the storm was quite severe and here as well as in other sections telephone and telegraph lines were down. The storm also interrupted the towns hydro power service and the Electric Light Department was obliged to utilize their emergency plant. On Monday night however, hydro was again turned on.

On The Coast.
Along the lower section of the Gaspé Coast the storm was quite severe. Between Chandler and Gaspé telephone and telegraph wires were out of commission for sometime. In the Gaspé district the snow fall amounted to about a foot and a half. It is reported that considerable damage to crops has also resulted in the Peninsula but details are not available as to the exact loss in any locality.

At Chandler.
A wind and snow storm here followed by heavy frost has caught many unexpected farmers with parts of their crops still under ground. The storm reached here on Saturday morning at eleven o'clock with a gale of wind accompanied by rain which quickly turned to hail and later to snow, causing havoc with the electric wires and casting the town in darkness for the night. The snow fall was about four inches and was the first of the season in this district.

PARTRIDGE SEEM SCARCE THIS YEAR

Reports From Different Sections of N. B. Show Dearth of Valuable Game Birds.

Partridge are scarce in New Brunswick this year, according to reports which have been received from different sections of the province. In York County alone there is said to be a marked dearth of these valuable game birds.

As a result of the pronounced scarcity of birds, as already indicated by the reports which have been received here by Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon it is expected that special steps will be taken to investigate the causes leading up to the shortage, which is attributed in some sections to the depredations of the parasites which were discovered on numbers of the birds killed last year. These parasites were also found on dead partridge in the woods, whose death had apparently resulted from the destructive parasites.

Arrangements are being made to co-operate this season with the special commission appointed last year by the representatives of the American and Canadian game associations to investigate the situation which was reported to exist then. It is expected that following the opening of the partridge season special efforts will be made to secure specimens for examination in this connection.

Toronto, Oct. 13.—Two men answering the description of the bandit who shot and wounded Alexander Turner, grocer, of Tollmorden, on Saturday night, after they had robbed him, are believed to be the gunmen who last night entered a Canadian oil service station in Toronto and robbed the man in charge, John Bond, of \$15.

Bond had just completed putting away the day's receipts, with the exception of \$15, and was sitting in the office eating his lunch when at 11.30 two men walked in on him. As Bond looked up at the men one of them drew a revolver and said, "Put your hands and hand over your money and both walked out of the door. BOBBED HAIR BEGAN IN ODD WAY

Brought In Fashion By Women Who Faced Decapitation By The Guillotine

Hollywood, Cal., Oct. 14—The fashion of bobbed hair was in vogue during the French revolution, at least by women who faced decapitation by the guillotine. Testimony to this was disclosed in a grim little satire, written by a French woman at the time of the Commune, which was found in a mass of French books and manuscripts obtained by a large motion picture studio here for research work.

The writer commented on the prevalence of shorn tresses in this wise: "It is the custom before women are executed to cut off their hair, that it may not interfere with the executioner's blade. So all Royalist women go to the guillotine with their hair off at the neck. Incidentally, the head soon follows this example.

Grisettes, as a bit of humor, began cutting their hair the same way—spicing the aristocrats in their last fashion. They are finding that it is comfortable and the custom is growing. No one knows where it will stop."

RAPID GROWTH OF AUTO BUSINESS

New Record In License Receipts—N. B. Has More Than 20,000 Licensed Cars.

Motor vehicle license fees receipts at the Provincial Department of Public Works have passed the half million dollars' mark and the fiscal year will not close until the end of October.

Last year's receipts from automobile fees reached \$452,489.23, and skeptics shook their heads when Premier Veniot's estimate of \$500,000 for the present year was presented to the Legislature. Five years ago receipts were less than \$200,000, while ten years ago—in 1915—the total receipts were \$23,116 and in 1910 the amount was less than \$1,000—\$763 to be exact.

The number of cars licensed in New Brunswick this year is to be upwards of 20,000 and the registrations show that the automotive industry has had an exceptionally good season, there being many new cars on the lists this year. Last year there were 18,310 cars and 1,443 trucks licensed. Complete returns for the present year will not be available for some time.

Meanwhile a good many sales of 1926 models are being made by automobile dealers throughout the province.

At present there is considerable speculation as to what changes will be made by the new Government in the system of licensing of automobiles. Reduction in the present license fees and introduction of a gasoline tax were promised by Premier Baxter during the election campaign.

AS THE SENATE WILL STAND WHEN SESSION OPENS

With Vacancies Filled Still A Conservative Majority Of Twelve Members.

Ottawa, Oct. 14.—A party Analysis of the Senate, whose representation, is now complete, following the nine appointments made by Premier King in the last six weeks, and as it will appear with the opening of the fifteenth Parliament, provided no more of its members die in the meantime, shows that only some radical change in its constitution can free it from the hold of the dead hand which a minority party in the popular House of Commons is still able to maintain.

Even after four years of Liberal rule, and with a considerable number of deaths—Premier King has appointed 18 to the Upper Chamber since he came into office in December, 1921—the party representing the majority in the elective chamber are now actually in a minority of 12 there being at this date 42 Liberals and 54 Conservatives.

Another feature of this present composition of the Senate is that only in two provinces of the Dominion—Quebec and Prince Edward Island. In one other province, Alberta, the parties are equally divided, each having three. In Quebec, there are now 15 Liberal Senators and 9 Conservative, and in Prince Edward Island there are 3 Liberal Senators and 1 Conservative. Nova Scotia is now represented by 2 Liberals and 8 Conservatives; New Brunswick, by 4 Liberals and 6 Conservatives; Ontario, by 10 Liberals and 14 Conservatives; Manitoba, by 2 Liberals and 4 Conservatives; Saskatchewan by 2 Liberals, (including Senator Turfitt, who is called a Progressive) and 4 Conservatives; Alberta, by 3 Liberals and 3 Conservatives, and British Columbia by 1 Liberal and 5 Conservatives.

WOUNDED MOOSE CHARGED HUNTER

Freeman McLean, of Chatham, Saved by Unerring Aim at Close Quarters.

Chatham, N. B., Oct. 14.—Freeman McLean, who goes annually on a moose hunting trip, has had great luck this season.

He started out from home and after a comfortable night's rest was early on the way path. Just after dinner he saw a big fellow in the distance and made off after him. He hadn't got far on the way when he heard the report of a rifle from another direction. His quarry, however, only moved about uneasily, so he pursued his course to get within sure rifle shot.

He was going along easily and came to seek vengeance on Mr. McLean. Suddenly he heard a great crashing to his right. Turning quickly he got the surprise of his life, for there not more than fifty yards away was a big bull moose coming at him as quickly as he could. Mr. McLean had just time enough to recover himself and get his rifle into action.

When Mr. Moose fell with a bullet in his forehead he was only fifteen feet away from the hunter. He rose, however, and made off. But another shot brought him to a full stop. A curious discovery made on examining the carcass was that the animal had been shot before, the bullet hitting the hard bone of the head about three inches below the left eye.

It is supposed that the shot that had been heard at the beginning of the hunt was the one that hit the animal and in its pain it had attempted to seek vengeance on Mr. McLean.

The head is one of the finest ever brought out of the woods here. It has a spread of 53 inches with eight points on one branch and nine on the other. The carcass weighed over 700 pounds when dressed.

\$5 POTATOES IS AROOSTOOK'S HOPE

Farmers Holding Off Although as High as \$4 Has Been Offered at Some Places

Presque Isle, Me., Oct. 14.—Aroostook potato growers are having visions of \$5 potatoes, which is said to be the reason that some of those who can afford to do so have been holding off and have refused even \$4 a barrel during the past few days.

Prices generally have run over \$3.50 for some days for table stock, with occasional sales up to \$3.90 and even \$4 reported. Meanwhile stocks are being moved at the rate of about 200 cars a day out of Aroostook county. Latest reports of the movement of potatoes show almost twice as many potatoes shipped out of Maine's commercial potato growing belt as for the same date last year. Shipments to date run up to almost \$7,500 cars this season; total shipments last year were 43,129, but up to this time less than 4,000 cars have been shipped.

2 KILLED AND 30 WOUNDED WHEN POLICE CLASH WITH STREET MOBBS

Paris, Oct. 14.—The twenty-four hour general strike, called by the Communists ended officially at dawn today, but transport workers in the vicinity of Paris attempted to prolong the walkout and met with some success among the drivers of auto buses and trams. There was, however, a notable increase in the number of taxicabs on the streets and the general public was little inconvenienced. Most of the factory hands and workmen who were out yesterday, returned to their tasks this morning and the police felt little fear of a recrudescence of yesterday's rioting in which two persons were killed and some thirty wounded. Police maintained their vigilance, however, posting strong forces at possible danger points.
