

From the returns which have come in from the several electoral districts, the Government has obtained a victory ; and the verdict of the country, if not unan imous, is, unmistakably against corrup tion in the matter of representation We give, to-day, a list, so far as is known at the time of our writing, of the mem bers elected. Full and accurate figures from all places cannot be obtained in a moment, but enough appears to show that of the two hundred and six members of the House of Commons, one 0 hundred and thirty-four have been elected. Of these it is calculated that the New Government will have the support of one hundred and some a clear majority of the whole house, and a present majority over the Opposition of eightyfour. It is not probable that the same proportions will be maintained to the close, but it is a very moderate estimate. indeed, that the present majority of between eighty and ninety will be attained on a test vote at the opening of Parlia ment.

The people of Prince Edward Island are petitioning for the extinction of the leasehold tenure, and the acquisition by the Local Government of the unoccupied wilderness lands still held by the proprietary right, giving adequate compensation for existing rights. The Patriot. speaking on this subject, says :- "The agitation of the last half century proclaims the will of the people plainly enough ; and the contentment and prosperity of the country demand that the tenant system be grappled with in earnest The money to abolish it, on fair and equitable terms, is at the command of the Local Government; and we do not see why they should hang back until pressed by public opinion to do their duty. It looks as if our present local o rulers were only half-hearted in the mat-0 ter." At any rate, we hope freeholders 0 and tenants will be alive to their own and the Island's best interests, and that the coming season will find the Legisla ture flooded with petitions praying for 62 18 3 an immediate settlement of the Land Question. It is a knotty problem for solution, but, if it is taken in hand in the right spirit, success is certain. In the United States Senate on the 18th inst., the Hon. Mr. Ferry, of Michigan, introduced a bill to authorize the construction of bridges across the Detroit River, which empowers any persons or corporations, having authority from the State of Michigan and the Dominion of Canada for such purpose, to build a railroad bridge across the Detroit River, at Detroit, or at any point within four miles above or below said city; and also a railroad bridge across the Detroit River in the vicinity of Fulton and Grosse Island, and across the several branches of said river.
