GERMAN DELEGATES ON WAY TO SIGN TREATY SATURDAY

26,333 ORDERS-IN-COUNCIL ARE PASSED BY BORDEN GOVERNMENT TORONTO STREET RAILWAY STRIKERS REFUSE OFFER

ORDERS-IN-COUNCIL

Out of This Grand and Appalling Total, But 577 Orders-in-Council Were Passed Under the War Measures Act -Brought Into Force Under Borden's Regime.

Ottawa, June 27.—During the four years of the war, from 1914 to 1918, orders-in-council, to the appalling number of 26,333, have been passed by the Borden Government. To this extent has responsible government been discarded and parliament set at naught. It may be contended that the war measures act gave the government wide powers to legislate wihout parliamentary of 1,511 to 21, the striking Tosanction. It did, and these powers were taken advantage of to an extent never dreamed of by those who helped pass the war measures act. But out of the grand total above referred to only 577 mum of 48 cents per hour offered orders-in-council were passed under that act.

HUNDREDS WHO WENT ON STRIKE IN WINNIPEG ARE UNABLE TO GET BACK THEIR FORMER POSITIONS

Many Who Were Dragged Into General Walkout Against Their Will May Find Themselves Without Jobs-Special Committee May Be Appointed To Interview Employers. Famine Prevailed

Winnipeg, June 27.—With the termination of the sympathetic strike yesterday, the general strike committee which ordered it automatically ceased to exist. The position at the Labor Temple is now the same as it was prior to the general strike, the chief authoritative body being the

The possibility of a considerable number of men being left without jobs as a result of the unconditional surrender of the general strike committee caused great consternation at labor headquarters. It was unofficially reported last night that a movement was on foot to get a committee appointed to take up the question of reinstatement with employers, to watch the interests generally of those who though in many cases were dragged into the strike against their will, may find themselves out of work as a result. The failure of many to get their jobs back yesterday is given as the reason for the movement. While no approximate figure could be put on the number whose applications today were turned down, it was declared in labor circles last night to be very large. For the 225 vacancies at the Manitoba Government telephones 350 applications have been received, according to Commissioner George A. Wilson. None of those who had been taken on the staff permanently would be removed in favor of others who had come back after the general strike had been declared off, the commissioner added. The Montreal Herald publishes a letter from a correspondent who England. VERSAILLES PACT MAY TURN OUT TO BE LIKE BOLSHEVIK TREATY AT BREST-LITOVSK

Allied Peace Delegates Fear That Even If Germans Do Sign, No Confidence Can Be Placed in Their Agreement To Keep Conditions of Peace Pact—No Clause As To When Germans Must Ratify the Treaty.

Paris, June 27.—Disappointment over what is termed the apparent weakness of the present German Government is not concealed in peace conference circles, and the feeling has been expressed that the signing of this peace treaty may mean little more than the signing of the Bolshevik pact at Brest-Litovsk did.

The defiant tone of the German note, which grudgingly agreed to sign the treaty without reservations, created an unfavorable impression on members of the various delegations, according to statements made today, and this seemingly has beer intensified by the delay of the Germans in arranging for the carrying out of their promise.

The peace treaty contains no provision as to when they must ratify Consequently delay in ratification may cause the peace conference additional annoyance, although it is generally agreed by the delegates that enforcement of the reparations clause need not be delayed until there is ratification by the Germans.

Berlin June 27.-Former Emperor William is planning to speedily return to Germany before the Entente can demand his surrender from Holland, according to a Stuttgart dispatch to the Neue Berliner Zeitung. The dispatch states that the Dutch British, French and Italian Government "thoroughly approves of his return, as the former emperor is an unwelcome guest, and his presence in Holland is increasing the problem

Mr. Henderson explained that the demonstration would be an attempt to prevent the governments of Europe from adopting a reactionary policy throughout that continent. Resolutions would be passed protesting against any intervention in Russia and demanding the abandonment of conscription.

TORONTO. June 26 .- Amid a scene of enthusiasm the Liberals of Ontario in open convention in the Canadian Foresters' Hall on College street this afternoon elected Hartley Dewart, K.C., M.P.P., as the permanent leader of the party in the Province of Ontario. The selection of Mr. Dewart was never in doubt during the convention, and his heavy majority in the first ballot clearly indicated his election.

Declaring that labor questions were of paramount importance at the present time, the Liberal convention today devoted considerable time to a discussion upon resolutions of the provincial Liberal party which

were presented to the convention. A resolution was passed calling upon the Government to set up provincial industrial council with equal representation of employers and employees, the chairman to be appointed by the province, the Government undertaking that it shall give effect to the council's findings.

A second resolution, presented by Arthur Roebuck of Toronto, de-

manding specific reforms, also received the indorsation of the convention. Mr. Roebuck's resolution showed considerable knowledge of the reforms now being sought by labor. Liberals' Labor Platform.


Pleased With Platform.

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

His father, Carolus Laurier, was a land surveyor. Wilfrid Laurier was educated at the parish school at St. Lin and afterwards at New Glasgow. Later he attended L'Assumption College, and in 1861, at the age of 20, he entered a law office in Montreal. In 1864 he graduated in law from McGill University at Montreal, occupying the highest position in his class. In 1871 Wilfrid Laurier was elected to the Legislature of Quebee for the constituency of Drummond and Arthabaska. In 1874 Laurier resigned his seat to enter the federal arena, and was again elected to represent the above constituency. In 1896 he became premier of Canada, and remained leader of the Opposition since 1911, upon the defeat of the Liberal party. In 1868 Sir Wilfrid was married to Mile. Zoe Lafontaine of Montreal,

The commissioners feel that the new reservoir is needed in order to facilitate making provision for emergencies arising out of an exceptionally large demand for water. Chairman Philip Pocock pointed out that under present conditions the commission is restricted by the limitations of the capacity of the well from which the water is pumped, which aggregates about six and a half million gallons a day. The present reservoir holds only that amount, so that the storing of an adequate surplus against emergency is impossible.
