**An Average of One War Vessel  
Every Ten Days Is Great  
Programme Outlined.**

London, Jan. 27.—The year 1911 was like being a record one for naval activity among the great powers, for fewer than thirty-six dreadnoughts are expected to be launched during the year—in other words, an average of only thirty-seven ten days. At present only thirty-eight of the dreadnought type are in the water, completing and commissioning being the result of more than five years' work. In one year alone, from now on, thirty-six at the least, and probably more, must be launched.

Of the vessels to be launched this year eleven will be British, 40,000 tons, the first of these will take the form of the Thunderer will be launched at Harlow.

Next to Britain comes Germany with about three launches, but this number includes three which should, according

to the original programme, have been launched in 1910.

Four of the eight vessels of the British 1909-1910 programme are already launched, and it is provided for 1909 only one is launched. The other three will take the water this year, and it is expected also that four 1910 vessels will be launched before next January.

It is clear, however, according to observers, that if the rate of building did not leave the stocks until 1912, in which case Great Britain will have launched in 1911 eleven to twelve vessels, the United States two are expected to take water; in Russia, four; two each in France, Argentina, Chile and Japan; while Germany and Italy each contribute one.

In this connection Rear Admiral Rosendahl, retired, of the German navy, writes in the *Revue Maritime*, the *Revue de la Mer*, published in Berlin, the first of a series of articles on "The Chief Navies of the World." He has no doubt that England has no need to trouble about increasing her naval strength. He shows, for example, that the superiority of naval strength over the Triple Alliance is enormous.

**Kaiser's Army the Most Powerful the World Has Ever Seen.**

Berlin, Jan. 27.—Calculations on the basis of the census taken on December 1. Colonel Gaedke declares in the Tageblatt that Germany is able at the present moment to send "the colossal" total of 5,200,000 trained soldiers and sailors into action.

That number includes only a portion—400,000—of the so-called "substitute reserves." The grand total represents 8 per cent. of the population of the empire, as compared with 5.9 per cent. (274,000) of Prussia's population.

to overthrow the power of Napoleon. In 1812 Colonel Gieckhe moved his troops northward under arms. In 1901 a total of not less than 714,000 soldiers and sailors, "and probably more," were sent to fight the "war against the Kaiser's Service." Colonel Gieckhe states, Germany can at any time now send 4,500,000 trained men in the field from the ranks of the 6,000,000 who have done service with the colors by land and sea during the last twenty-five years.

The official North German Gazette of the past year says "Kaiser's manoeuvres," which are to be on an extraordinarily extensive scale. "The theatre of operations will comprise the provinces of Schleswig-Holstein, the grand duchies of Mecklenburg-Schwerin and Mecklenburg-Strelitz, and the provinces of Pomerania, Brandenburg, and Prussia." The manoeuvres will consist of joint operations between the army and navy, and the guard corps, and will include battleships, submarines, the battleships and cruisers of the high seas fleet will all take part. The navy's operation was made up of three parts, the first, the east coast of southern Schleswig-Holstein and the island of Rugen.

## Eludes Their Vigilance Along Frontier Lines of Switzer- land and France.

Geneva, Jan. 27.—A Swiss chauffeur named Salliet hired a motorcar worth \$1600 from the garage of M. Trollet here, at the end of last November, and was arrested next day at Annecy in France, for smuggling tobacco worth \$740 into that country in the vehicle.

Salliet was tried at Annecy and sentenced to fifteen months' imprisonment and fined \$200—the maximum penalty. The car was ordered confiscated.

On the night of December 11—a few days afterward—the car mysteriously disappeared from the garage in which the police had placed it, and since then it has been reported from a dozen places on the frontier.

Many Grosbeaks About This Winter Resemble Redbreasts.

A great many reports of people having seen "robins" are daily coming in, and although there may be a couple of real robins about, it is altogether likely that many have mistaken a grosbeak for the first harbinger of spring.

Mr. W. E. Sammler, the well-known local ornithologist, states to The Advertiser today that an immense number of these birds are at present scattered throughout Western Ontario. In size they resemble the robin, but the coloring on the wings and breast is very different. Most of the grosbeaks are a dark color, and have no red on them at all, while there are some that are a pinkish shade all over. It is no doubt these which are mistaken for robins. These birds come from the north about every three or four winters. They are a regular winter bird, and are very rare in warm countries. Later when food becomes scarce in the north they come farther south, but do not go past the cold zone.

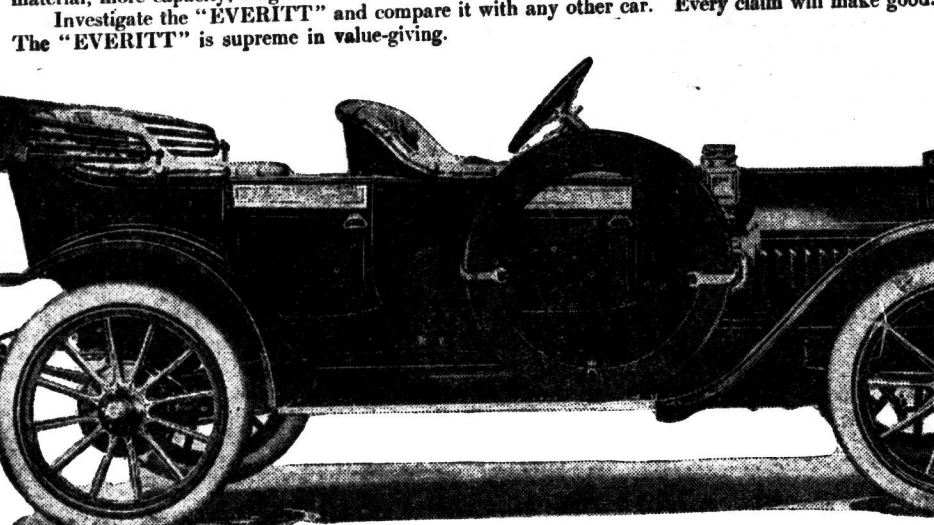

### HAS CENTENNIAL

Present Structure Fourth On the Historic Site.

**MOST PROSPEROUS NOW**

London, Jan. 26.—Theatre Royal, Drury Lane, the most famous theatre in the world, is making preparations to celebrate in fitting style its hundredth birthday. On the 26th of January, 1812, the present playhouse was opened to the public, an address to the public written expressly for the occasion by Lord Byron, being delivered. Since then the great theatre has been through many vicissitudes, and has had associated with it many of the great men linked with the English stage, and today it is enjoying a period of prosperity unequalled in its history.

The present structure is the fourth that has stood on the site. The first was destroyed by fire, the second was rebuilt, and the third, like the first, was burnt down. Before the first Drury Lane Theatre, which dates back to 1663, there was what was known as "the theatre," or "the Cock Pit." This was succeeded in 1663 by the Drury Lane, which opened under royal letters patent granted by Charles II. to Thomas Killigrew, groom of the chamber to the king. Since then the patent has passed through many hands, and strange hands. It was sold in 1797 for the equivalent of \$250.

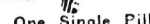


