

Use the shampoo every nine or ten days. If it smarts, use less of the root, it should not be used if the scalp is covered with eruptions. It is said to be harmless and users say that long continued use will make the hair early.







MICHIGAN MAN **RUNS TURK NAVY**

Bucknam Pasha Is In Control of Sultan's Ships.

ONE WAIF OF LAKES

For Many Years Worked as Deckhan on the Freighters.

Detroit, Sept. 28.-Should there be war between Turkey and Italy, it will fall to the lot of an American to comnand some of the operations of the Turkish navy. Bucknam Pasha— Capt. Ransford D. Bucknam—holds the rank of vice-admiral in the Turksh navy, and when in 1906 there was danger of war between Turkey and England, Bucknam was decided on to direct whatever naval manoeuvres should be necessary. Friends of Bucknam, who is a native of Romeo, Mich., say he will be invested with similar authority should the present crisis result in war.

Bucknam at one time commanded whalebao in the coal trade between Newport News, Baltimore and Boston. His work later with an American shipbuilding company, which constructed a warship for Turkey, attracted the attention of representatives of the Sultan, who offered him a position in the Ottoman navy.

Bucknam returned to America in December, 1910, to visit his fosterparents in Romeo. He draws \$12,000 year as commander of the Turkish

navy.

Twenty years ago, about the time he was adopted by Capt, and Mrs. Lewis Elliott, of Romeo, Ransford was a cabin boy on a great lakes schooner, and reached his present high position by sheer pluck and knowledge of seamanship.



Paper Bag Cookery

Directions---How to Use Cooking Bags:

1. Select one that "fits" the food intended to be cooked. 2. Grease slightly the inside of the bag, except in the case of vegetables, or when water is to be added.

3. When the food has been prepared for the bag, place the same on the table, and lift the uppermost edge of the bag

while you insert the contents. 4. Fold the mouth of the bag two or three times and fasten with a clip, or pins, or in any other way that will

secure as nearly as possible a hermetical closing. Should it ever happen that a bag leaks, simply transfer

it with contents undisturbed to another bag. 5. The oven, any kind of which will do, should be kept clean, and if properly heated, as with the old style of cooking, results should satisfactorily follow. Average oven heat should be about 200 degrees, Fahr., and when the bag is put into the oven this heat should be reduced by about 30 degrees. In the case of ovens with solid shelves, a wire grid should be placed on the shelf with a space between and the bag with contents on the grid. Experience will soon teach the cook when the oven is hot enough without the use of a

thermometer. 6. The oven door will not require to be opened every now and then "to see how the roast is doing." The whole force of the heat is playing upon the bag and from within

it cannot escape. 7. Exercise care in taking the bag out of the oven, and if gas is used the bag should be kept out of danger of con-

tact with the flame. A plate inserted under the bag will best remove it from

8. When taken out for use the bag should be ripped open from the top and the fragments thrown away.
