# SIR ARTHUR CURRIE **WARMLY WELCOMED** BY TORONTO CITIZENS

Inspector-General of Canadian Forces Is Guest of Sir Henry Pellatt.

TO ATTEND EXHIBITION

General Will Deliver Addresses to Various Organizations of Veterans.

Toronto, Aug. 29.—Gen. Sir Arthur Currie, inspector-general of military forces in Canada, and commander of Canada's fighting force in the great war from 1917 till the victorious finish, reached this city this morning and was given a warm welcome.

Although Toronto spent the first three days of the week in a tumultuous reception to the Prince of Wales, it has laid itself out for another two days of welcoming enthusiasm for the commander of the Canadian army, to which this city and district contributed about 100,000 men. Sir Arthur was received at the North Toronto station this morning by Mayor Church, Brig.—Gen. Gunn, commanding the district, and other prominent citizens, including Brig.—Gen. Sir Henry M. Pellatt, at whose famous "Castle on the Hill" Sir Arthur will be a guest during his stay here. A children's choir sang welcoming choruses when the distinguished soldier stepped from the train, and a detachment of "Originals," who served with the general in France, formed the guard of honor. The streets were lined with school cadets and cheering citizens.

# Six Ways to Make Grape Delicacies

Converted into jelly, the grape has. no superior in flavor, and no preserve shelf is complete without a goodly array of grape jars neatly filled with

the purple fruit. the purple fruit.

Grape jelly is probably also the easiest to prepare, for while other fruits lack some of the necessary ingredients for a perfect jelly, the unripe grape is ideal for jelly-making. Grapes can also be used for spicy preserves as an accompaniment to meat dishes or a relish, as well as the sweet breadspread that has drawn all children to the jam closet since time immemorial.

Grape Jelly.

1 pound of water.

4 pounds of grapes. Crush the grapes and boil in the water for 20 minutes, Press through a jelly bag and allow to drain through a fiannel bag.

Test the strained juice with alcohol to determine the proportion of sugar to determine the proportion of sugar to use. Bring the grape juice to boil-ing, add necessary sugar, and stir until

the sugar is dissolved. Continue the boiling until the jelly point is reach-ed. Remove from the fire and skim. Pour into hot sterilized glasses, seal Pick over and wash grapes, barely cover with water, and cook until soft and white. Drain through cheesecloth. To each quart of juice add one cupful each of water and sugar. Bring to holling point; skim, bottle and cork each of water and solding point; skim, bottle and outly. When cold dip corks into me







### UPPER SCHOOL EXAMINATION FOR FACULTIES OF EDUCATION



The reduction to \$66 per ton, it is regarded, was due to the lower manufacturing costs in July, August and September, 1918, and it was hoped that these months would be treated separately, allowing October and November, when higher costs were prevailing, to stand on their own merits. vailing, to stand on their own me This was the view taken by Judge Archer, one of the members of the tribunal, who entered a memorandum to this effect in the judgment, although not formally dissenting from the decision of his colleagues.






