

The Mail Experiment.

The experiment with the trans-Atlantic mails, by intercepting the steamer Virginian near Sydney, was not a success, and will not be repeated. The ordinary summer route of the Victorian and Virginian, the new Allan Line turbines, is via the Straits of Belle Isle. the first Canadian port of call being Rimouski. The Virginian, on her latest trip, took the southerly route, and was met by the Canadian cruiser Canada about 80 miles off Sydney. The mails were transferred to the Canada at sea, and carried to Sydney, where a special Intercolonial train was in waiting. The train covered the distance to Montreal at an average speed of nearly 45 miles an hour, which speaks well for the road and equipment. The mails reached Montreal about the same time as they could have been delivered had the Virginian taken her regular route. The result was very disappointing to the advocates of the Sydney route, who were confident the record could be broken. Allowance must be made for the detention of the Virginian by a dense fog off the southern coast of Newfonudland, lasting eighteen hours. On the other hand, the Virginian lost time, ten hours, it is claimed, by deviating from the Belle Isle course. The Minister of Finance, speaking of the incident in the House on Tuesday, said the advantage had been shown to be with the northern route, although Sydney was well qualified to be the mail port for steamers which regularly took the southern

The St. Lawrence route is being well advertised by the achievements of the new turbine steamers. The Canadian Pacific, with its usual enterprise, has determined to grasp the pennant, and will next year put two 20-knot steamers

No doubt the number whose incomes are in excess of \$500 is greater than given in the official returns, because there must be tax-dodgers in the British Isles as elsewhere. In the whole country there are 20 persons with incomes exceeding \$250,-000: 200 persons with incomes between \$50,000 and \$250,000; and 428 who pay

taxes on incomes from \$25,000 to \$50,000. The comparisons made with the returns of ten years ago are not discouraging. In the past decade the incomes of property owners have increased to the extent of \$155,000,000, and the men employed in trade and professions are receiving \$150,000,000 in excess of their incomes of ten years ago.

There has been a corresponding but less satisfactory increase in the emoiuments of government, corporate and other public officials, whose salaries have advanced to an aggregate extent of \$100,000,000. On the other hand the incomes derived from agriculture have fallen off at the rate of a million dellars a year during the decade, and are now less by \$10,000,000 than they were at the beginning of the period.

While the agricultural interests have been declining undoubtedly for many dogs. years, the figures do not justify the argument of the Chamberlainites that British trade and industry are on the down grade. PRIEST VICTIM OF BLACKMAILERS

Chicago Gang of Swindlers Take Thousands From Innocent Clergyman.

Chicago, July 19.—Blackmail levied spon the Rev. Lawrence A. Erhard, pastor of the Roman Catholic Church of the Epiphany, has led to the arrest of three men, who are alleged to have ecured \$2,000 from him.

Warrants for others have been issued, and their apprehension is exected within a few days. Isaac Hartman, justice of the peace in Harvey; Michael J. Maloney, lawyer and associate of Hartman, and Harry H. Nye, private detective and constable's custodian, were the men arrested.

The arrest followed a peculiar story of extortion and threats told reluctantly by the priest. For several years Father Erhard has been pastor of the Church of the Epiphany at 2185 West Twenty-sixth He is a native of Germany and asserts his unfamiliarity with the laws or legal usages of the country. Three weeks ago, he said, he was visited in the parish residence by Nye, who said he was a member of the or else driven from the system. parish, and conversed for some time

on resident topics. Reference to the visits of the priest the downtown district were made, but were unintelligible to the latter, and the visitor departed. Two nights later, Father Erhard was called to the door of the residence by



Mary Clark is the daughter of Tzi Kal Tzae, who was born in the Lolo Valley about 1807. He called himself "Me Clark," and had the sandy hair of his father, the explorer. "Me Clark," son of the explorer, was killed in a fight with the soldiers of Gen. Miles in the Bear Paw Mountains on Snake Creek in the fall of 1877. It was between the months of May

and September in 1805 that Capt. Clark Indians treated the exploring party kindly and a stop of some time was made among them, while the party was preparing to descend the great divide. The little Nez Perce maiden looked with wonder at the strange white man with wonder at the strange white man and would wander forth from her tepee in the moonlight to watch the tent

The explorer noticed her parent devotion and he, too, took a fancy to the Indian girl and under the skies they were married. The Indian bride accompanied the explorer to the coast, learning to speak English, and returned with him to her own country where her son was born.

"Me Clark," the 53½ son, or "Ta Lac," as the Indians pronounced it, learned English from his mother. He was known to many prominent old time residents of Mon-Knowles and Judge F. H. Woody.
