Mr. Shepley replied that he was fully sensible of the necessity of inspiring public confidence in the commission. He conceived, however, that the best means of inspiring public confidence was to consider the conduct of the enquiry as a whole. Mr. Hellmuth did not suggest that there would not be a thorough departmental enquiry. He did not know what Mr. Hellmuth's instructions were, whether he proposed to promote the throughness of the enquiry or to criticize at every turn those who were anceavoring to conduct it in the interests of the public. "We will not take the trouble," said Mr. Shepley, "to vindicate my own desire for a thorough and honest inquiry, for I know that when this investigation is brought to a close what we have done will be a subject of legitimate and proper criticism. So long as I am entrusted with the conduct of the enquiry I propose to act as seem in my own judgment best in the public interests."
