LOYALTY TO THE EMPIRE.
The Canadian troops are acquitting themselves with the utmost gallantry in South Africa. Honorable mention lias been made of their services on several occasions and the grim death roll demonstrates conclusively that they have been placed in the thickest of the frav. Canada has every reason to be proud of her contribution to the forces now en gaged in the Boer war. They are for the most part men innured to hardships and capable of entering immediately into active service and accomplishing effective work. The Strathcona contingent will be one of the most effective bodies of men ever brought together in a single command. The pick of Canada's best men will be in its rariks, and the conclusion of the war will dou'tless see the "Strathcona horse" held in the same spirit of veneration with the his toric "Light Lrigade."
The general rally to the support of the empire which has been made by the colonies is one ot the striking features of this war. From Canada, Australia and other british colonies volunteers have been offered until the number in cludes more men than the situation requires.
This war with Kruger will serve to awaken the spırit of federation as it never before has bem awakened throughout the British empire. The spirit of loyalty to the central authority is awakened and the British empire will come out of this war more closely and harmoniously welded than ever before.
That Britain was unprepared for the struggle is now a matter beyord doubt. The strength of the Boers and the vast preparations which they are now known to have long been making for the war which they saw was inevitable, were practically unknown to the war office in London, and in consequence the estimates made as to what would be required to put down the war, were entirely disproportioned to the necessities of the situation, When, however, a realization of the actual conditions came and the word went abroad throughout the colonies that the empire was in need, the respo se came readily and quickly. The wily Boer had caught the Lion napping, but once awakened, he has demonstrated that he is alive to the emergency.
The war bill will amount to a pretty penny, but the knowledge Britain will have of the loyalty of her colonies will
fully recompense her tor any and a:l expenditures.

## OUR OPPORTUNITY.

The expressed determination upon the part of the leaders of the present Lib eral government to go before the country for a general election at the close of the present session of parliament should be made the opportunity for securing hearing from Canada upon the matter
which vitally effect the interests of every person who desires to remain in the Yukon territory.
Insofar as influencing the general results of an election is concerned, we could not hope to do that by strength of votes even though the entire population was granted the rights of suf frage. All we can expect to accomplish is to gain recognition of the points which we wish covered through proper and forceful presentation of the same. If we can succeed in shuwing, as we believe can be done, that a more libera policy toward this country on the part of the home government would he a business policy and result to the in crease of the government's revenues, we can hope that recognition of ou claims will be takt
Govermments, like individuals, ar essentially selfish and when the Canadian government is made to realize that its own interests are being sacrificed as a result of its present policy, we may expect a radical change in its attitude.

## REPRESENTATION

The conncil will this evening get down to the consideration of the question of local representation in its membership. The people of the terri tory have evidenced their desire for such representation with sufficient emphasis as to leave the council in no doubt as to what their wishes are. We believe that the best interests of the people at large will be subserved by carrying into effect the provisions of the laws autnorizing representation on the council. Men who are directly interested in the development of this country and who are responsible to the people of the coumunity for their positrous will have every object in doing their utmost to further the welfare of the territory. We have no desire in saying this to impugn the motives of the gentlemen who at present constitute the Yukon council, but any sort ot govern ment which is not responsible directly to the people it is called upon to govern is repugnant to the spirit of our funda mental institutions.

Uncle Sam is rapidly awakenilg to realization of the importance of his Alaska possessions Among other improvements which will be made in the method of dispensing justice through out the big territory, three distric judges will be appointed, two of whom will be located on th Yukon river, and the third on the coast, with headquarters at Juneau, the capital of Aleska to be. Alaska is nof to be allowed any repre sentation in congress, not even to the extent of a territorial delegate. Should the development of the territory continue and the number of its population increase as now appears will be the case congress will devote more attention to the details of its government. Alaska will justify all the attention it receives at the hands of the Ametican govern ment so long as that attention does not take the form of unjust and restrictive legislation.

Tnere are several distinct classes o people in Dawson, all of whom, in
their own way manage to keep the gaunt wolf from the door. There is first those who are in business and who another. To them the events of life came regularly and plod along pretty week and month after month. Many of them have a good roll of "chechako" in their inside vest poekets and if the suddienly cease to revolve, this class would get on very nicels until that proverbial "something'. turned up. pose another class who pretty well understand fust where ther stand, for the shrewd business man is not going to work a force of men several months knows just-abuut how much that dump now yield to the square yard at cleanup ime, therefore he guages his outlay and ll business factors accordingly. . Many members of this class are today very uncomfortably short of ready cash, but they know they have the certain satisfactun of knowing that when they have finished with the clanup they will have a place in the world as men far above the pauper list, if not with moneyed nagnates.
Another class is composed of horneybanded sons of toil who feel that for them it is foreordained that they must work ten hours each day and every working day of the year. This class is the bone and sinew of the country, and withot its representatives both classes previously mentioned would be completely handicapped. They are the backbone of the mining industry and at the same time contribute liberally towards the support of the government when in the city' by violating the he
ordinance for which they are fined.
Anotlier distinct class is composed men who are really sports, men who try to be sports and others who are simply dreaming that they will be sports some day. The first class, the real sports, had, and even if by the frowns of the fickle goddess, they are "dead flat" for a period they go ou living just the same for the reason that during better days they made themselves good fellows and thereby established a credit which tides them over periods when the dark cloud of adversny hovers temporarily over them. The second class of sports, the
white check fellows, usually keep the price of a meal in the "other" pocket, for they know that their credit at the hasheries is limited and will not-ständ pressing; two meals on a slip is usually the limit. The class that confidently expect to become famed as knights of the green in the near future are the fellows who stand around and make know ing remarks when a plunger is playing, and who rarely ever play themselve unless staked by someone else who has either made a winning or who has been given a "till", by the knowing tinhorn assd staked him, hoping thereby to make ment, but who loses it in nine cases in ment, but
every ten.

Another peculiar stamp of humanity which is as indigenous to Dawson as to any city in the known world is that class which absolutely refuses to work and who would scorn to sit at a gams bling table even if staked to play, But they are not adiverse to spending each day around the stove of a saloon or gambling room, but that is for thier comforts derived from the stove rather

fellows nearly alt bave cabins out on the edge of town or up the Klondike, or in West Dawson, or anly place they find one for which they have no rent to pay, Each one of thẹm carfies a stump of a lead pencil with which he oecasionially
