HAVE DECLARED WAR

Turkey and Greece are Now Locked Arms.

The Preliminaries soon Over, and When the Envoys Get Their Passports From the Turkish Legation, the Greek Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary, and ordered Edhem Pasha, the Turkish military attaché, to leave the city.

Constantinople, April 17. - War with Greece has been declared.

Constantinople, April 17. - Following the news of the incursion by the Greeks on the Turkish territory the Council of Ministers at the palace to day recalled the general assembly, gave passports to Prince Marcourato, the Greek Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary, and ordered Edhem Pasha, the Turkish military attaché, to leave the city.

The annual summer camps will be held this summer in the mountains of the Balkans, and will last until the end of the month.

The circular expresses the hope that the powers, in a spirit of justice, will agree that the entire responsibility for the war falls on Greece.

The situation explained. London, April 18. - The Greco-Turkish situation is understood here to be substantially as follows: War has not officially been declared between Turkey and Greece, but it has been declared officially to have "broken out."

The Turkish cabinet has decided to sever diplomatic relations with Greece, and has ordered Edhem Pasha, the Turkish military attaché, to leave the city.

The Turkish declaration that "war has broken out" being made for the purpose of diplomatically putting the onus of the war upon the Kingdom of Greece.

The Northern Pacific Railway bridge at St. Norbert, a few miles from Winnipeg, has been washed away, and the Northern Pacific rail line under several feet of water.

The water in the Red River at Winnipeg has risen gradually, and there can be no doubt that within a few days there will be exceptionally high water.
