

The Bay of Fundy's Tides.

The Bay of Fundy's Tides. Extraordinary stories are sometimes told of the immense tides in the Bay of Fundy. The scientific facts in re-gard to them have reacond geological Survey. The bay is about 146 miles long, and gradually arrows, and be-comes shallower, ag it divides into two main branches, and several small side bays exist. The highest tides at the mouth of the main bay reach eighteen feet. Going up the bay they increase in height. At Digby Neck they at-tain 22 feet, at Petilcodiac River 46 feet, and at Noel River in Cobenuid Bay 53 feet, the maximum. Some branch bays are tett empty at ebb tide.






