A Dominion Conference of Fruit Growers.

According to statistics gleaned from the 1911 Census of Canada, the total value of the fruit growing industry in British Columbia, Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces is in round numbers \$12,000,000. This is the estimate worked out by the Chief of the Markets Division of the Dairy & Cold Storage Branch of the Department of Agriculture, and published in the printed report of the proceedings of the third conference of fruit growers of Canada held in Ottawa last February.

Funeral of Byron J. Hennigar.

The funeral of Byron Hennigar, who was killed by lightning in last week's storm took place last Sunday afternoon from the home of his brother, Mr. Sangster Hennigar, of White Rock. The services at the house and grave were conducted by Rev. J. D. Spidel, of Kentville, the impressive service of the I. O. O. F. lodge, of which Mr. Hennigar was a member, being used at the grave. Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations. ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister of intending homesteader. Duties—Six months residence upon

Fruit growers should commence at once their search for thimbles or offer rewards to those who will bring them the greatest number. The young people might have a chance given them for the making of more than a penny.

Severe Electrical Storm. The most severe electrical storm felt here in many years passed over the Province from western Kings to Halifax city, Thursday afternoon, July 17th, breaking the drought which was threatening to be serious, but leaving in its wake fatality to life and damage to property.

Those killed by bolts of lightning were Mr. Byron J. Hennigar, of Wolfville, Mr. Peter Aalders, of Canso and Mrs. Henry Listaman, of Cow Bay, Halifax.

Mr. Hennigar, who was senior member of the firm of Hennigar Brothers, grocers and meat-dealer, of this town, had left White Rock after dinner to purchase a load of lambs on the mountain. He was near the home of Eugene Schofield when the storm broke and he drove to the barn for shelter. He had been in the barn but a moment, standing near the door with Mr. Schofield, when a bolt struck the building, instantly killing Mr. Hennigar and leaving Mr. Schofield unconscious. Both men were thrown across the barn floor and Mr. Hennigar was bruised down his right side where the bolt passed. His team of horses was lost outside the door. One horse was killed and the other injured. The lightning passed out at the back of the barn taking out the whole side of the building.

Mr. Peter Aalders with his son, at Canso, were driving home a load of hay at the time of the storm. Mr. Aalders was walking behind the load, a pitchfork on his shoulder, when he was struck dead. The fork evidently attracted the lightning for his shoulder was bruised and singed.

Mrs. Henry Listaman was instantly killed by lightning while closing the window of an upper room in her house at Cow Bay. A boarder named

Formerly, at the house, was badly injured, and the house was partly burned.

In Wolfville two buildings were struck, the residence of Mr. T. L. Harvey, Main street, and that of Mr. B. O. Davison, Summer street. At Mr. Harvey's the bolt passed down at the joining of the new sill with the main building, damaging plaster and ripping off shingles. At Mr. Davison's the bolt passed down a chimney with some damage to the plaster of the rooms. The members of both families were uninjured.

At Kentville the Nickel building and the Garage received a bolt causing some damage to the buildings. Many telephones in both towns were put out of commission. At White Rock the house of Charles O'Leary was struck and considerably damaged in the upper rooms. Other buildings were struck, including R. S. Starr's barn, at Town Plot, several houses and a barn in Halifax and a house in Windsor.

The storm broke in Wolfville at 1 o'clock, with terrific thunder and 'forked' lightning. The rain fell in a heavy, fine shower for half an hour then, and in a shower of shorter duration at 3 o'clock, wetting the earth to the depth of one inch.

Systematic Seed Improvement.

In the production of the ordinary farm crops of Canada, approximately 40,000,000 bushels of seed are required annually. In view of the enormous extent to which yield is dependent upon the quality and vitality of the seed sown, it is of the greatest importance to the nation that as much of this seed as possible be of a high order.
L. H. Newman of the Dept. of Agriculture explains the system of Seed Registration and the recently instituted plan of inspecting and sealing all sacks of seed before they leave the premises of those growers who grow seed for the trade. This address which is printed in pamphlet is being distributed free by the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa.

Five-dollar—The same obverse impression and inscription as the ten-dollar; and for the reverse, a shield bearing the arms of the Dominion of Canada, within a wreath of maple leaves, surmounted by the inscription "Canada," and bearing underneath the words, "Five Dollars," with date of issue, with a graining upon the edge.

MARKET ONLY EGGS YOU KNOW TO BE FRESH

Produce Section of Toronto Board of Trade Sends Out Timely Circular

The produce section of the Toronto Board of Trade decided to ask farmers to cooperate with them in the endeavor to give the consumer an egg fit to eat every day in the year. With a view to eliminating the shrinkage entirely the egg-producers will be asked to observe the following rules—

(1) Provide plenty of clean, dry nests for your hens. (2) Gather the eggs daily in cool weather and twice a day in hot or rainy weather. (3) Do not wash eggs. Use the dirty, small, very long and grass-stained eggs at home. (4) Keep eggs in a cool, dry place, which is free from odors. (5) Market your eggs twice a week if possible. (6) Don't sell eggs which were found in a soiled nest. (7) Keep the eggs out of the sun when taking them to town. (8) Don't keep eggs near oil, onions, etc., as they readily absorb their odors. (9) Don't sell eggs known to be bad or which have been in an incubator. It is dishonest. (10) Male birds should not be allowed with hens, except for breeding purposes. After that period kill roosters, save feed, and improve your egg product.

GROWTH OF WESTERN CANADA

Nothing in History to Parallel the Rapid Settlement of Provinces

In all the annals of world history there has been nothing to parallel the present settlement of the prairie and park lands of western Canada. Today from both the east and the south a concentrated river of humanity is pouring into the Canadian west and building up the country with phenomenal rapidity. The gain in population of the four western Provinces between 1901 and 1911, was 1,117,000 people, or an increase of 187 per cent. The gain in population of the five western Provinces was 788,640 people, or only 18 per cent.

Entering into details, the Province of Alberta, which had a population of 117,000 in 1901, has now advanced to 1,425,000 in 1911. This is an increase of 1100 per cent. In the same period, Saskatchewan advanced from 178,000 to 892,450. Compare these figures with the percentage gains in eastern Canada where Quebec advanced by 21 per cent, Ontario by 15 per cent, and Nova Scotia and New Brunswick by very small margins, and it will be apparent that western growth has been much more rapid than eastern growth.

GRANTS OF WATER-POWERS

Steps Taken to Safeguard the Rights of the Public

The water-powers of Canada are among the most valuable possessions the country has. To safeguard the rights of the public, the Commission of Conservation has adopted the following principles which it is formulating the opinions it gives on questions relating to the disposal of water-powers:

WON HARVARD PRIZE

Distinguished Honor for Graduate of Queen's University

Arthur B. B. Boake, of Vancouver, B.C., a brother of Capt. H. B. Boake, adjutant of the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery Brigade, won the best prize open to post-graduates of Harvard University, the Raymond C. Cutting Traveling Fellowship, worth \$1,500 annually, in the Department of History and Government. Mr. Boake was one of the Queen's most distinguished graduates, having taken his M.A. degree in 1908 when eighteen years of age.

GLEVER YOUNG CANADIAN

Mr. Lowell Barnet, B.A., son of Mr. and Mrs. William Barnet of Cobourg, who took his degree at Queen's University, Kingston, winning the gold medal in political science, has now won a 1000 scholarship in the University of Chicago. Mr. Barnet is twenty-one years old, and is said to be the youngest graduate of any Canadian University to be awarded this coveted prize.
