his residence in St. John. Dr. Hopper's health has been gradually failing for years and while it was well known that his tenure of life was uncertain, his end came most unexpectedly. Only a few moments before he breathed his last he was conversing cheerfully with his family.

1)r. Hopper was born at Coverdale, Westmorland county, on December 18th, high class horses. 1841, and completed his academic studies at the Baptist seminary, Fredericton, and matriculated in Acadia college, Wolfville, the junior year, which he spent at Madistudies were pursued in part under the direction of the Rev. Dr. Cramp of Acadia preached his first sermon 29th April, 1860, at Greenfield, Nova Scotia. In 1865, after completing his theological studies, he for a short time preached at Shediac, Petitcodiac and Sussex Vale. At the latter place the first regular services in connection with the Baptist denomination were held by him and resulted in the establishment of a small church. In the same year he accepted an invitation to become associate principal with Rev. Dr. Spurden of the Baptist seminary at Fredericton. In 1869 he resigned the principalship of the seminary and on the invitation of the Baptists of St. Stephen began the work of organizing a church there. In 1872 he accepted the pasturate of the first Baptist church, of Burlington, Iowa, and remained there six years.

In April, 1878, Dr. Hopper having purchased a half interest in the Christian Visitor newspaper, published in St. John, returned to Canada. In 1879 he bought the other half of the paper, and enlarged the printing, publishing and book business, editing and publishing the Christian HERALD last week: Visitor, Canadian Record, Youth's Visitor, Gem, and International Sunday School lessons. This business he carried on until he sold it out in 1885 and assumed the to this province to take charge of the seminary at St. Martins. The doctors say they do not believe she will live. Mary died from pneumonia. She was sick but a few days. At the time of his death Eugenie was in bed suffering from pneumonia. When she heard of her father's death she lapsed into unconsciousness. She was dead four bours afterwards. The Secretary-Treasurer submitted his accounts, which were referred to a committee Mowatt, Cliff, Scott. In submitting his accounts Mr. Black said that the past year had been a very hard one. There was great difficulty in getting the collectors to respond to the demand he had frequently made upon them. On Nov. 36th, 1894, there was an overdraft in the bank of \$4,800; but yesterday when his accounts closed there was a balance of \$57.18. On Dec. 28th last only \$9.992 of the \$18,000 assessed in 1894 had been collected. The income from other sources included \$917 received from the city on account of administration of justice, \$700 from debentures and two or three small sums for jury fees etc. In the meantime accounts came in that had to be paid, consequently he had to make overdrafts at the bank upon which the county had to pay interest. He said that during the year there had been some exceptional expenditure, among which might be named \$500 paid to the Gibson fire sufferers, \$500 paid the estate of the late Hon. R. Bellamy, an old loan, and \$480, balance due the York Agricultural Society. In addition to these amounts the county had to pay certain expenses of criminal prosecutions which


