Any person who is the sole head of a amily, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manliobe Saskatchewan or Alberta. The appli minion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy maj be made at any agency, on cartain

each of six years from date of bome ad entry (including the time required homestead patent) and cultivate fifty

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchas ed bomestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.


