### Death of Dr. Allan.

One of the best known and the most genial of men passed away suddenly at the railway station, Harbor Grace this morning. The Bay Metropolis in the person of "Dr. Will" has lost one who embodied in his person the genius and goodwill of the bay. Dr. William Munden Allan was born at Brigus, May 26th, 1844. He received his school education at Harbor Grace Grammar School and at Scott's Academy, St. John's. After leaving school he dispensed drugs in Harbor Grace, where his father had an extensive practice as a medical man. After a time he proceeded to the University of Edinburgh, and attended the medical schools and walked the surgical wards. Here he took his degree and secured his qualification as a medical practitioner.

Since 1881 Dr. Allan has been Medical Health Officer, ocul surgeon and district surgeon for Harbor Grace. He was also a representative of the Newfoundland Medical Board of the Conception Bay Medical Society, which he founded and of which he became first President. Mr. Mott in his "Newfoundland Men" wrote of him in 1894 as follows:—

"Dr. Allan has been health officer, ocul surgeon, and district surgeon of Harbor Grace since 1881, positions made vacant by the death of his father, whose practice the son succeeded."

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### Fatality at Grand Falls

Editor Evening Telegram.  
 Dear Sir,—A very sad disaster occurred here this morning, and in order that the true facts of the case may be published accurately, I am sending you herewith an account of what took place.  
 At 9 o'clock this morning a party of eight men were engaged in hauling a stick of timber 8 x 10, 22 feet long. This was being hauled up by pulleys attached to each end of it by parties of three men at one end and two men at the other, and there were three men up above on the construction of the conveyor, for which this

stick was to form a part. One of the pulleys was being pulled up by three men and the rope of the pulley broke and down came the stick. One of the men jumped forward and escaped; the other two men jumped sideways, with the above result. The accident affected two men—one, George Colish, who was so severely squashed that he succumbed to injuries received in the region of the ribs within two hours of the accident; the other, both legs are broken.  
 Every possible attention was given to the sufferers at the new hospital (weeks), and Dr. Chamberlain and his staff were enabled, through the up-to-dateness and excellence of the

hospital, to administer everything that could possibly be done for the sufferers.  
 The man who succumbed was Geo. Colish, of Smith Sound, Trinity Bay, who leaves a wife and four children. The other man is Eli Button. Neither of these men were residing in Grand Falls, but were just here for the summer's work.  
 The news of this terribly sad accident quickly spread through the town and cast quite a gloom over the place.

### Declines to Arbitrate

The air round Nelson is dense with smoke, and fires north of the city are still blazing furiously.

 A Bill has been passed by Parliament authorizing the Government to pay three months interest in advance on the vouchers of the interior debt. The Government is also authorized to borrow from the surplus remaining in the treasury an amount sufficient to cover the deficit in the Budget.

### An Attempt to Wreck Trains.

 TORONTO, July 20.  
 The strike situation of the Grand Trunk in Ontario seems to be getting more acute. Most of the passenger trains are moving on the main lines and some on the branches, but no attempt is being made to move freight. Many firms which have rush orders on hand are using boats wherever possible. The fruit trade is in rather a peculiar position. There is a large quantity in the city and as the strike is preventing distribution, something in the nature of a glut threatens. An attempt was made last evening to wreck the north bound London train at Brucefield near Clinton. A railroad tie was placed across the track, but was discovered and removed before the train came. Rioting broke out in the Grand Trunk strike at Niagara Falls to-day, 100 men mobbed Supt. C. S. Cunningham. He took refuge in the Telegraph office and was rescued by the Police.

### Exhibition at Rome.

 In 1911 an International Exhibition will be held here to commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of the proclamation of Rome as a Capital of United Italy.

### Want Dr. Crippen.

 WASHINGTON, D. C., July 20.  
 The British Government has asked for the arrest and detention of Dr. Crippen who is wanted in London, charged with the murder of his wife, should he be found in America.

### Ewart K. C., Continues.

(Daily News Message.)  
 The Hague, July 20th.—Mr. Ewart, K.C., continuing his argument, said that the Treaty accorded fishing rights solely to the inhabitants and not to American vessels, so that the Newfoundland laws in 1906, prohibiting the inhabitants of the Island from taking service in foreign ships, did not constitute an infringement of the Treaty. Further, the British law of 1824 contained similar provision with regard to foreigners. Even in 1899 Newfoundland adopted a law prohibiting foreigners from fishing in her waters. The Treaty did not, Mr. Ewart maintained, allow American to carry on fishing, with a crew composed entirely, or in part, of foreigners. Newfoundland, he contended, had the right to prohibit the sale of bait, other than fishing requisites, to American vessels, for these vessels were entitled to no commercial privileges under the Treaty of 1818. He denied that the Treaty implied the right of extra territoriality for Americans, fishing in British territorial waters. The right to fish, accorded them by the Treaty, was not synonymous with exemption from Colonial laws for the preservation and protection of the fisheries. The Americans were subject to these laws, equally with British subjects. In the negotiations concerning the treaties of 1783 and 1818, there was not one syllable indicating any intention on the part of the British delegates, to abdicate the sovereignty in their territorial waters, so far as American fishermen were concerned.

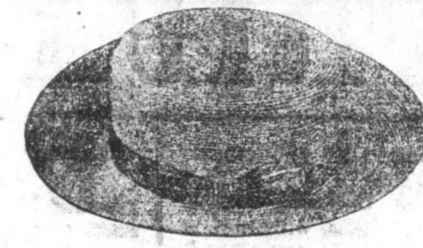

### Fell Over Bell Island Pier.

Saturday afternoon a thrilling accident occurred at Bell Island by which a man named Isaac Batten, of Coley's Point, was severely hurt and now lies in a precarious condition in hospital on the Island. The man was at work on one of the piers there and fell over it going into the water over a hundred feet below. All the workmen on the pier were horrified when they saw him fall, and believed that if not killed outright when he struck the water that he would be drowned. Boats hastily put out to the rescue and the man was picked up unconscious and floating on the water. It is believed that he struck a plank which was found floating near him. He was terribly injured, was a long time unconscious and gave grave fears for his recovery are entertained. People who arrived over from the Island yesterday and came in by last night's train say that the man is simple and about 50 years old. He has relatives in Topsail, who fear at any moment that they will hear of his death.

### Big Banking Voyage.

Yesterday the schr. Uda A. Saunders, Capt. Corkum, arrived here from the Banks for water and bait. She is a fine vessel, built at Lunenburg and is of the knockabout type. She is perfectly new and only launched the past April, and is about 120 tons gross. She has landed 1,000 qtls. of fish for her spring's voyage to the Banks. The vessel fished latterly on the eastern end of the Bank and has on board now about 1,600 qtls. of fish, which makes her voyage to date 2,600 qtls. for 7 dories. The vessel, considering that the season is yet comparatively early, will make a good bid to be high liner of the Lunenburg fleet. She will sail for the Banks this evening. The crew say that squid were making their appearance on the Bank and that dogfish were very numerous and a great nuisance to the fishermen, as they eat the bait from the hooks. Several schooners were giving up fishing for the time being owing to the presence of these pests on the Bank.

### WELL PATRONISED.

The outgoing trains were well patronised yesterday, and though the weather was cold, many people went to the country to spend the half holiday. A large number left at 8.45 a.m., and 255 went out by the 2.30 excursion train. A special left at 4 p.m. with 160 passengers, and the regular at 6 took out 130. Nearly all these arrived here by the 9.45 train last night.

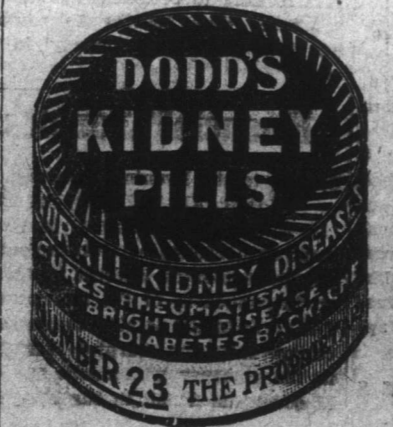

ing-off as in the main due to the dearthness of many of the staple articles of food. It might at first glance be assumed that these high prices would assure greater, rather than less, profits to retailers generally, but this does not appear to be the case; for the inevitable curtailment in the demand, especially in those articles which have advanced most in cost more than counteracts the possibilities of gain. The effect of this is seen in the case of Liptons, Limited, by a diminution in the dealings in bacon alone of over two thousand tons within twelve months.

### Increases in Sugar, Cheese, Butter, Meat.

"Sir Thomas Lipton stated that, in the past twelve years, an article in such widespread use as sugar has risen in price by nearly fifty per cent, and cheese in the same proportion; hams, bacon and lard have more than doubled; while butter is also much dearer. Outside these items, with which the company is especially concerned, the head of every household is painfully aware, as he gazes at the swollen size of his weekly or monthly bills, that meat is also much dearer than of old, while poultry threaten to join pigs as luxuries, or even rarities.

"It is easy to see that an increase in the prices of commodities which, like these, are, or have been in the past, in universal demand affects every member and every class in the community. True, it affects them in different degrees, hitting with greatest severity the poor and that numerous middle-class which finds it a matter of extreme difficulty either to expand its income or contract its expenditure. Under the present condition of affairs prove permanent, it needs no prophet to foresee that a

general readjustment of the standard of living will, for the great majority of the population, soon become unavoidable.

"We are thus brought face to face with an economic factor of great importance. For this rule of high prices is not confined to these countries; it appears already to be gaining sway over the whole world. An effect which is world-wide must have a cause which is as widely diffused. This argument at once puts out of court many of the popular theories, on the simple ground that they are restricted, and therefore inadequate.

### What Are the Causes?

"The discovery of the cause, or causes, of this inflation would go far towards finding the answer to a question which is of interest to all—namely, whether the present prices are likely to go still higher, or to go downwards. Economists, in attempting to solve this riddle, find themselves at once in a region of many conjectures. Nevertheless, some of the main facts in the situation can be readily grasped. Working on the side of cheapness there are those increased forces which the higher prices must bring into being: additional capital and energy, applied to the cultivation of land and the rearing of live stock; a greater use of scientific methods, which are as yet

One thing is, sure and that is, we are lacking in the true spirit of independence when we give what we can't afford and then stop up half the night growling about it.

ly applied, here and there, in mere patches on the surface of the globe; and the possibilities of new inventions cheapening production.

"It must also be remembered that progress in agriculture has been much less rapid than in manufactures, probably because these latter have for over a century attracted the best brains by more tempting rewards. Improvements in transport have been so vast of recent years that here does not appear to be room to hope for much more progress in this direction; but the unexpected may always happen.

### How Gold Affects Prices.

"On the side of dearthness we have a power which is only beginning to attract attention, but may yet be strong enough of itself to work a revolutionary change. This is the enormous production of gold within recent times. It has been calculated by competent authorities that the total golden store of the world has been more than doubled within the last twenty years. This must inevitably make its effects felt, sooner or later, by raising the level of prices all around. For to speak of an increase in the price of commodities is to speak of a decrease in the value of gold—the terms are practically interchangeable. That this value can be maintained at its former level, when the supply was less by one-half, is contrary to economic theory, and to the lessons of past history.

"It may easily be that we are now well advanced in a movement such as formerly caused both social and financial revolution, when the floods of silver from the New World worked havoc with the monetary standards of the Old. That chaos ceased only with the demonetisation of silver; can it be that a similar fate is in store for gold? Considerations such as these show that behind the question of dear meat and dear bacon may be involved issues of the highest importance to the economist and the financier, as well as to that plain, but ubiquitous, individual called 'the man in the street.'

## Yesterday's Cable Messages.

Special to Evening Telegram.

OTTAWA, July 19.—An attempt was made to wreck the pay car of the Grand Trunk Railway yesterday afternoon on the Rockland line. At a slow rate of speed the engineer ran into a plank across the road. He quickly reversed his engine, his alertness avoiding a serious accident. A little further on there were two other planks across the tracks. There were many thousands of dollars in the van of the pay car and the object of the deed is not clear as there was no attempt to hold up the crew.

KIEV, Russia, July 19.—The expulsion of Jews continues at the rate of 45 a day. From July 4th until July 15th four hundred and ninety-seven were expelled by what is known as the second method; that is, they were forced actually to leave the town. During the same time 1,121 were expelled by the first method, which in effect is a warning for their departure but permits them time for a settlement of affairs. In the majority of cases the latter method proved ineffective, as the Jews in the category are prone to return after a temporary absence. During the 12 days mentioned there were 165 expulsions from Solomenka and 151 from Demileffka. Since May 14, when the Imperial decree became effective, ordering that all Jews who could not establish a legal right of residence should be expelled within the pale. In the restricted district of the Polish provinces there have been expelled from this city and the suburbs 3,011 persons by the second method and 3,661 by the first method. However in making up this total of 6,672, allowance must be made for a large percentage of duplications in the count.

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, July 19.—The gas works of the Zeppelin Airship Co. were demolished by an explosion to-day. Seven persons were injured.

LONDON, July 19.—A strike that threatens to reach serious dimensions has broken out among the employees of the Northeastern Railroad. Traffic is disorganized.

BOURNEMOUTH, Eng., July 19.—Robert Lorraine, who on July 16th in an attempt to make a flight to the needles and return in a heavy rain-storm and was obliged to land on the Isle of Wight, flew back to the mainland this evening. He made a safe landing here.

MONTREAL, July 19.—The Acadia Coal Co., Ltd., of Pictou County, having coal areas to the extent of 16 miles and over and producing 300,000 tons. (Sir Montague Allan being the president) has been strengthened by the influx of French and Belgian capital, and the statement was made to-day that at least a million dollars will be spent in developing and generally improving the property.

OTTAWA, July 19. — The Grand Trunk Railway and the conductors, rainmen and yardmen now on strike may come to an agreement on the suggestion already made from both sides that the matters in dispute be submitted to a board of arbitration, whose finding shall be binding on both sides. Then the Government will bear all the expense of that arbitration. The Department of Labor will assist in the prompt appointment and organization of the board, and meanwhile the men might return to work.

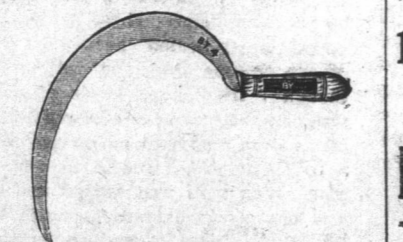
