





Morison Scandal

ND THE GOVERNOR'S VERDICT. Editor Evening Telegram

Dear Sir,—Since the Evening Tele-gram of the 29th June reached here ontaining your words of wisdom on he Morison scandal and the Goveranxiously looking out for further news respecting this shameful travesty on ustice. The Governor's verdict as oublished over his own signature read as declaring that in this ancient lependency of King George there one interpretation of the law for the representatives in the Government, and another interpretation of the law for the poor fishermen who were dup ed into returning them to power.

This view of the case is brought ome to us by the fact that early in April two poor men, our near neigh-bours, were summoned before Magistrate Lilly of Trinity and fined twenty dollars each, or to go to prison for orty days, for killing a deer or two for food for their families. 
