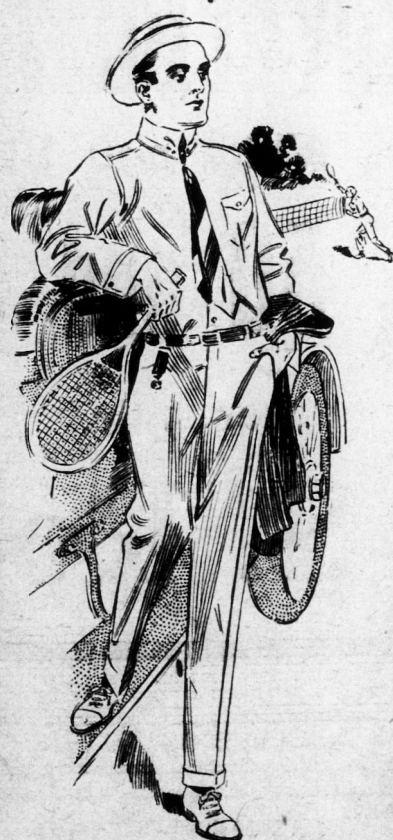

Morison Scandal

AND THE GOVERNOR'S VERDICT.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—Since the Evening Telegram of the 23rd June reached here containing your words of wisdom on the Morison scandal and the Governor's verdict, the people have been anxiously looking out for further news respecting this shameful travesty on justice. The Governor's verdict, as published over his own signature is read as declaring that in this ancient dependency of King George there is one interpretation of the law for the men who the people elected as their representatives in the Government, and another interpretation of the law for the poor fishermen who were duped into returning them to power.

This view of the case is brought home to us by the fact that early in April two poor men, our near neighbours, were summoned before Magistrate Lilly of Trinity and fined twenty dollars each, or to go to prison for forty days, for killing a deer or two for food for their families. These poor hard-working fellows pleaded, like Morison, ignorance of the law. They thought that a poor settler could kill a deer for the use of his family at any time, but the Magistrate would not accept their plea of ignorance or forgetfulness of the law and they had to pay the forty dollars or go to prison. The loss of that money to these poor men meant more to them than the loss of salary would have meant to Minister of Justice Morison. But they have had to suffer for the ignorance of the law while Minister of Justice Morison goes clear, with a certificate of character from the Governor in the bargain. If the plea of ignorance or forgetfulness of the law is good in the case of a Minister of Justice and an ex-judge, should it not be good in the case of these poor fishermen? I have been informed that it is in the power of the Governor to remit fines. That being so, if he acts with justice and impartiality as the representative of our King, should he not remit the fines imposed on the two poor men I refer to? He has established a precedent in Morison's case which, if he is a just man, he must either pursue in all cases of alleged ignorance or condemn himself by not doing so.

The Governor in his letter published says he was staggered by Morison's ignorance of the law, but the public are not so much staggered by that as by the Governor's verdict. Two men are badly needed in power in this country to-day—a man like Sir Herbert Murray as Governor, and a man like Sir Robert Bond as Premier; two men who ever saw their duty, and did it.

Privy Council Decision in Cable Case.

Yesterday we published a short message stating that the Privy Council had reversed the judgment of the Supreme Court in the Commercial Cable case. The Government sued the Commercial Cable Company for a tax on four cables. The Company paid into Court in respect of two cables, with a denial of liability. The majority of the Supreme Court, Mr. Justice Johnson dissenting, held the Company liable for the tax on four cables, with costs of course to be paid by the Company. Mr. Justice Johnson dissented from the judgment of his brother judges, and held that the Company had paid enough into Court to satisfy its liability. Apparently the Privy Council sustains the substance of the finding of Mr. Justice Johnson. How far this

so can only be determined by a perusal of the text of the Privy Council's judgment, which is not available. The finding of the Privy Council will occasion no surprise to those who have followed the case closely, and the reversal of the judgment was expected by Mr. Kent, K.C., who had charge of the Commercial Cable case here. The message states that the Privy Council holds that the contract which was repudiated by the Morris Government was valid, apparently without the sanction of the Legislature. It is, however, unsafe to draw inferences on a message which is so meagre in its details. Mr. Kent is to be congratulated on his able conduct of the case.

It is hardly correct, as the message states, that the Supreme Court sustained the repudiation of the Government. That would be to sustain a political act. Two judges held that a clause of the contract exempted the Company from a tax and was not operative without legislative sanction. The third judge held that the clause did not exempt the Company from a tax and did not require legislative sanction.
