

Respecting One's Rights.

That there are a great many people in this world deficient in a proper respect for their own rights is largely a general realization. But I think there are.

And furthermore I think there are a great deal of harm in the world. For you will seldom find an excessively meek person who never attempts to defend his rights without flinching about him people whom he has gotten into the habit of encroaching on the rights of others.

Self-sacrifice and self-effacement are without doubt medicinal for the soul but it is right for any one person to attempt to keep all the soul's tonic of the family for himself? And then again, I do not think it is right to let any one without reason keep you from being as happy as you can.

A happy life blesses humankind. "A happy man or woman is a better thing to find than a five pound note," says Robert Louis Stevenson. "He or she is a radiating focus of goodwill; and their entrance into a room is as though another candle had been lighted. We need not care whether they could prove the forty-seventh proposition; they do a better thing than that, they practically demonstrate the great Theorem of the Livableness of Life."

If you foolishly yield your right to healthy happiness you are yielding your ability to bless the world in this way. Among my schoolmates were two girls whose mother had died when they were quite young and who were being brought up by a stepmother.

This stepmother was a very narrow, strict and over-bearing woman. I suppose she meant to do well by those children but her idea of doing well seemed to be to crush out their individuality, cut them off from normal intercourse with other young people and exercise a petty tyranny over all their doings even after they were full grown girls.

The younger of the two girls had one of these over yielding dispositions and was simply crushed by the treatment.

She wore the queer clothes, gave up dancing lessons, stayed at home from parties because her stepmother thought they might give prizes for games—a special bugaboo of hers—and in a hundred little ways allowed the life and fun to be crushed out of her.

The older girl on the other hand simply wouldn't submit. She did not leave home or go to any extremes. She simply pleasantly insisted on being allowed to be and act like other normal girls.

The younger girl, shut off from normal intercourse with other young people as she was by her foolish yielding, grew old without ever being young. She never married. She is a sad, awkward, shy woman, dissatisfied with herself and her life.

The older girl grew into a fine normal woman, married happily—against her stepmother's wishes of course—and to-day blesses the world by radiating happiness and love of life on all with whom she comes into contact.

Incidentally I ought to mention that the older girl is the stepmother's favorite.

I believe the younger girl was lacking in a proper respect for her own rights and that her weakness had ended disastrously both for herself and those about her.

Please do not think I am discounting the value of meekness and unselfishness. I am not. I reverence unselfishness as the greatest of all virtues. But I think there are times when a defense of one's individuality, a firm stand against overbearing demands, a proper respect for one's rights, will add more to the sum of the world's happiness than self-effacement and yielding.

Bunch of Reasons

Why Morris Must Go!

Sir Robert Bond will be the Choici of the People.

Even Michael Parrell, Bernard McGrath, and others will admit that they never forgot the law that timber could not be cut without first getting a License and paying a Bonus and Rent of \$4.00 on every square mile that the timber is cut from. Now Morison told Governor Williams that he thought he could cut timber for nothing, and without License. When Morison wrote Governor Williams that, he made himself out to be a **rogue** or a **fool**. Perhaps he was both! And E. P. Morris told the Governor that it was ridiculous for Morison to remember the law. If it is honesty or dishonesty the Voters want, the issue is squarely before them.

Morison got two of his Canadian friends to give him a Certificate that he has an **unblemished** character. We now ask Premier Morris if he will come out publicly, either in the Press, or on a platform, and **say the same**. Will you dare to do it, Sir Edward Morris? We can confidently say that even Morris would not dare to offer such an insult to the people.

Another thing that must not be forgotten is, that when Morison wrote to Strong and told him that timber could be stolen from Crown lands, the effect of what he said was that any one who purchased his Orange Bay area could steal the timber from the adjoining Crown lands. **Mark the words:** a purchaser of the Orange Bay area which Morison had for sale. Did you think that the depravity of Morison's memory was so great? What can Sir E. P. Morris think of himself for condoning such things? Does Morris expect that the people will condone his conduct because he condoned Morison's?

If Morison was bad enough to write to anyone advising him that he could steal logs from Crown lands without a license; if he was bad enough to write for a Governor's benefit that he forgot the law; if the matter were so simple that even laymen like Michael Parrell or Bernard McGrath could not forget such law, then do not wonder that Morison has been termed "a rogue or a fool." But the people do wonder that Sir Edward Morris condoned his acts.

In the Telegram of Friday is an article signed "Honesty." These words occur: "We cannot expect a legislature of paragon, and do not expect paragon, but we are not extravagant in our demands when we say that **ordinary common honesty**" is essential in public men. Is it not more especially essential in a Minister of Justice? What honesty can be found in his letter to R. W. Strong? And worse than all, what honesty can be found in his letter to the Governor saying he forgot the law?

That is not the only Minister of Sir Edward Morris's Government who "speaks the truth with mean frugality." A. W. Piccott is a shining example of a Minister of the Crown who tried to cheat a man like Mark Gibbons out of his share of the proceeds of a timber area. Will Sir Edward Morris deny this publicly, either in the Press or on a public platform? These examples are not rumours of wrong-doing, they are hard, stern, stinging facts. Is another example necessary to bring Sir Edward Morris to an ordinary common sense of honour? We find it in the Bay de Verde Iron Ore Prospectus of 1911. Here they are, Morison, C. H. Emerson, M. P. Cashin and F. J. Morris, two of them Ministers, three of them members of Morris's Government, all bunched together as Counsel and Directors on that Prospectus; which states that they would have active participation in a Company exploiting iron ore. The main object of that Prospectus was to defraud innocent people. It is a most serious matter to find the names of Ministers of the Crown on a fraudulent document. But neither those Ministers nor their Leader have offered any defence, or any palliation. It is a most serious thing to believe such a charge to be true. But can anyone do otherwise? Ordinary decent men will suffer pecuniary loss to sustain character. Those very members of the Government rushed to the Court House to take out an action for libel when they were charged with making a deal in timber (which was true as regards one of them). Morison gloated over that action. That charge was made but once and Morris and his men invoked the law the same day. But in the face of that fraudulent Prospectus they stand silent, and their silence condemns them as public men.

Is another example still necessary? If Sir Edward Morris has any sense of honour left, must we formally bring to his notice that John C. Crosbie received the scalding price of \$2,200.00 for two spars. That odious transaction has seared the minds of the public and left its sting. Sir Edward Morris, as Premier and Crosbie's leader, stands condemned in that spar business as much as John C. Crosbie himself. No one has attempted to justify that miserable transaction. And probably no one ever will. Sir Edward Morris has a duty to perform in that matter: to make Crosbie refund the excess in value. That is the least we can expect; it is more than Morris will do.

Has the cupidity of some of his Ministers, and of some of his Executive members, blinded his sense of honour as THE "Trustee of the Country"? Yet his soul is vexed with fear, and he spoke in words of anguish that "Water Street would be draped with mourning" if he were defeat-

ed in this election. He pleads before high Heaven that Water Street should not suffer, and therefore that he should be kept in power. He sticks himself up as a Break-water to shield Water Street! What utter, drivelling nonsense is this! What an example of sardonic humour! No man knows better than Sir Edward Morris that Water Street is better able to take care of itself, and its business, than some of his principal Ministers can take care of their character. A man may be honest though poor; but no man (at ease in the seat of power!) is likely to be honest if his instincts lean the other way.

It is not religious teaching such a man wants, but a dose of **ordinary common honesty**. And there is not room for doubt that the votes of the people of Newfoundland will banish the Morisons, the Crosbies and the Piccotts from public life; will teach a supine Leader like Sir Edward Morris of some defects in his make up; and will invest Sir Robert Bond—not with the spoils of office, but—with the duty of re-establishing the Government of the Country on a sound basis. A **spendthrift Government spells Confederation**. Continue the former and the latter will follow. These are some of the reasons why so many people are saying

LONDON, To-day.—Addressing a great Liberal meeting at Manchester, Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, expressed on behalf of the Admiralty and Navy keen sorrow for the Zepplin disaster; he then proceeded to comment upon the disquietude occasioned by expenditure upon naval armaments which he said was higher now than ever, while next year it would be higher still. The Brigus Exhibition.

The committee in charge of the Brigus Exhibition spared not themselves in any way to make the undoubted success that it has proved. The many exhibits from all classes of the district showed that the interest of the people had been aroused and the friendly rivalry brought forth exhibits of such merit as would do credit to any District in the Island. One lady of seventy-six years, sent a beautifully-worked piece of point lace that gained much praise, especially when it was considered how hard it was for young ones even to do such work.

We read that the early Anglo-Saxons gained fame all over Europe for their skill in needlework, but that since the advent of the sewing machine, needlework has degenerated a great deal. Happily for those who delight in dainty, well-executed needlework there are many in Newfoundland that find pleasure and profit in this work and the display of work at Brigus was most creditable and compared favourably with any exhibition on the Island. Hooked-mats, artistically designed and well-worked; Kensington Art Embroidery, second to none; lace and drawn-work, eyelet-hole, embroidery, made an exquisite showing and one over which a lady interested and experienced in such work, could pore for hours. There were garments, neatly and well-made that were made from the wool of the sheep that last year gambled on the hills. All the various processes of carding, spinning, and weaving are done by the industrious women of Brigus and it all goes to prove that with a bit of land, some sheep, cows and hens and a willingness to work, one can be independent of the outside world.

The Riverside Woollen Mills had an excellent showing of local-made blankets and the butter, preserved fruit and home-made pickles formed an appetizing display that made one's mouth water. The produce of the land was an interesting portion of the exhibit especially the seven different kinds of apples produced on MacKinnon's farm. The live stock spoke for themselves and were not at all shy especially the "roosters," who had lusty voices. The prize pig was killed on the second day of the exhibit and tipped the scales at a cool 600 pounds!

An exciting pony race formed a pleasant diversion on the road side. Last, but not least, the freehand drawings and pen-and-ink sketches showed that the fine arts in this direction were not being lost sight of. Exhibitions like this are good in that the exhibits are not, as it were, prepared for display but are the ordinary products of the farm and the home, being made well for their own sake, and not for the purpose of gaining any prize. The visitors were very hospitably received and well looked after by the people of Brigus.

BOND CAN'T LOSE.

Murderous Attack on His Lordship Bishop March

Special to The Evening Telegram. HARBOR GRACE, Today. This town was thrown into wild commotion yesterday by a report that His Lordship Right Rev. Bishop March had been fired at while saying Mass at the Cathedral. People could scarcely believe it. On investigation I find the following particulars:— James Hare, a young man, of about 28 years, who had been working in Sydney several years and who came home about two weeks ago, entered the Cathedral by the sacristy door shortly after the Gospel at second Mass, and walked over to within a few feet of the altar at which His Lordship was celebrating Mass. He pointed a revolver directly at His Lordship and fired a shot, then advancing a step, he fired a second time, the bullet grazing the Bishop's forehead. The first shot attracted the attention of the congregation and a rush was made to capture the man and thus save further trouble, but before the three or four foremost could reach him he fired a third time. He was quickly captured and disarmed and taken through the side door of the church and to prison in the court house near by, great excitement prevailed. Many females became weak and several fainted and much trouble was experienced by those who now had the man in charge to keep the excited people from committing violence on the man who came so near taking the life of their beloved Bishop. It is a credit due to Mr. Edward Moriarty, one of the first on the scene, for his presence of mind in grasping the revolver so as his finger came between the hammer and the cartridge, thus preventing the third and perhaps a fatal discharge of the weapon. His Lordship, however, continued the Mass and requested his congregation not to think too seriously of the affair as it was the work of a poor demented man. The citizens of all classes and creeds while regretting the incident, are delighted to find that His Lordship is not injured. Hare shows no signs of insanity so far as is known since he returned from Sydney, and spoke quite rationally to people who met him half an hour before the awful affair, but his action was no doubt that of a mad man, as no other person would attempt to take the life of his own Bishop.
