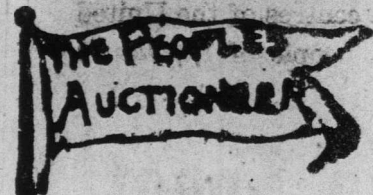

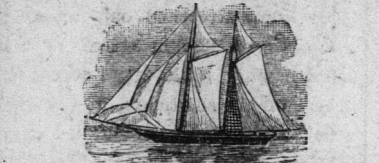

LONDON GOSSIP.

LONDON, April 10th, 1916.
"GINGER" IN POLITICS.

There has been a political truce in this country since the war began and Parliamentary seats as they fall vacant are not contested, each of the big political parties agreeing that the seat shall be filled by a new member of the same political color as the old one. Where occasionally by-elections are contested, this is owing to the appearance of a so-called independent candidate. At the same time in both the old political parties, Unionist and Liberal, there have been formed small groups who stand for more extensive military service and a general "gingering" up of the political control of the country. These are therefore called respectively the Unionist and Liberal GINGER groups. The Unionist group wants an amendment of the Military Service Act so as to include compulsion for married men and the Liberal GINGER group goes for the same thing even more strongly. As a result there has been formed anti-ginger groups of which an extreme case is the small section of the House that follows Sir John Simon. This particular Simonite group is out to throw obstacles in the way of ministers and to object not only to any expansion of the Compulsory Military system but seeks to prevent the present act being rendered fully effective. Amid all these cross currents the Cabinet will need to steer very warily but only on exceptional occasions can the various groups coalesce in the division lobby, and then on matters of purely Parliamentary tactics.

IVANOFF AND BROUSSILOFF.

General Ivanoff's resignation and the nomination of General Broussiloff in his place are most important, both from the political and military point of view. The military importance of the event lies in the personality of the two Generals. General Ivanoff is general of artillery, while General Broussiloff is general of cavalry. General Ivanoff is a man who studied much, who is well versed in higher mathematics, and for whom warfare presents itself as a more or less complicated mathematical problem. Devising a plan of operations he tries to leave nothing to chance. As a good chess-player he foresees all possible movements of the enemy, and has up his sleeve remedies to counteract them. His method is sure but slow. If General Broussiloff, on the other hand, has not such a big scientific baggage at his disposal, he is a man of initiative and, as his brilliant attack on Lemburg during the Russian offensive has shown, of quick decision. He believes in the individual element more than in tactical appliances. General Ivanoff's mind is more adapted for a siege warfare, while General Broussiloff will be very useful if a quick offensive is contemplated.

"THE BALKAN NEWS."

A friend at Salonika sends me a copy of "The Balkan News," the queer little daily newspaper of our army there. It is edited, I believe, by an Englishwoman. It is unexpectedly serious in tone, the staple of it being an excellently selected collection of articles on the Eastern situation, from home and Balkan papers. Like the naughty French book in Browning's poem, it is printed on "grey paper with bluish type." The original article in this number, "When Peace Returns," is a thoroughly democratic warning lest "an undue share of the prize of victory will fall to be paid by those who can least afford it." A nursing sister contributes an interesting account of the tragic trek of the Serbian army and people before the Bulgar-German sweep southwards. She says that the Scottish nurses earned such a reputation for their vigor that they became known as "birzo sestros" ("the hurrying sisters"). There is a flavoring of mildly comic stories, and, by way of a reminder of soldiers' holidays, the advertisement of the Salonika cinema, where "Charlie Chaplin will appear, at the general request of the British Army."

THE CRINOLINE POSE.

It seems that the return of the crinoline, the "hooped" skirt, and the bustle—if they are really returning—will create problems for the twentieth-century wearer, particularly if she be young and one of the "sports" type of modern womanhood. The dress of that time demanded an altogether different physique and bodily habit. Unless the present generation are ready to face tight-lacing, semi-starvation to

gain paller (the girlhood of that day disliked to look robust), and much staying indoors sewing and reading to regain some of the daily routine which produced that girlhood, her attempts to adapt the clothes to the wearer will be a failure. For one of the plays with a bustle a Parisian actress has already announced her intention of sacrificing her health and her comfort to her waistline and her art. But the ordinary chorus girl, who after all is the real stage model, seems to be very ill at ease in a dress with a hoop. The hands must be kept crossed in front and the head must be lowered if the Victorian pose is to be reproduced correctly—a fact which a visit to the West End theatre leads one to think is lost sight of in many cases. There will be sceptics. After all, a trim waist is not unknown now,

even in the days of the tight skirt. And in early Victorian times did good health, rosy cheeks, and sanctities never go with a crinoline? We shall see.

WAR SPRING IN LONDON.

There is no smell of new paint and turpentine in the air this spring and no squeaking of house-painters' cradles, which were always part of the spring song of Regent Street. Even that little nest of early Georgian houses in Knightsbridge that used to show so gay a face of new lilac and cream to the top of Sloane Street is quite dingy and worn. One notices too, in Mayfair how like our fashionable little houses look to our slums. It is really chiefly a case of fresh paint and constant brick-pointing that makes the difference between fashion and slumland in the older parts of London. The flower boxes that used to show dancing daffodil heads and crocus spears are empty this year, and the florists say that almost all their contracts now are for the hospitals. Bond Street, however, is still sprinkled with shy little tickets at the private entrances to the big shops to declare that "good bodice hands" and skirt hands are wanted. Stout asparagus at 6s. 6d. a bundle and French beans at 2s. a pound are in the chop windows as usual, unadorned at the posters counselling war economy that are pasted over the front of a defunct art dealer's shop across the way. There are still a surprising number of carriages with two horses, and two men on the box and big motor-cars, also with two men, chauffeur and groom, are still abroad. The occu-

pants are always old ladies. The spring music season, however, is very much changed, and the placards outside the musical agents' shops are attenuated. Half of Sir Henry Wood's Queen's Hall orchestra wear khaki armlets on their skillful arms; and at the concerts of the Philharmonic Society and of the London Symphony Orchestra some of the performers are actually in khaki. So we are getting near the time when our drums and fifes and bagpipes in the street will be our chief fare. This year again there is one real and terrible sign of the new spring that means the opposite of growth and joy and all that spring stands for. The hospitals are all preparing and being augmented—for the spring.

Mr. Blackall's School Report.

Mr. Blackall expresses concern that every school cannot be visited at least once a year by himself or his staff. He considers the Inspectorial staff should be large enough to provide for a visit twice a year.

Mr. Blackall points out that the Council of Higher Education is "an examining body—pure and simple—that, and nothing more." "As an examining body the Council fills a most useful place in the community."

We presume that the need of additional visits to schools than can be paid at present by Mr. Blackall and his assistant is a corollary to a scheme of limiting the C. H. E. Examination to boys and girls who are about to leave school.

Mr. Blackall deprecates the lack of appreciation of higher education, and the paucity of senior pupils in the schools. He advocates strongly provision for the establishment of some such institutions of higher education as are to be found in the Maritime Provinces.

He testifies also to the excellency of the work being done by Mr. Barnes, P. M. in the Normal School, and of Mr. Brett and Mr. Miffin in the Practising School. "Mr. Barnes has the happy knack of interesting the class intensely in the course and has in every case sent the students off with an exacted opinion of their work and a desire to receive a full course."

PEACE TALK CONTINUED

LONDON.

A doctor was questioning a woman who had come to him with a bad case of nervous indigestion. He asked her if she enjoyed her meals. "Doctor," she said in a burst of frankness, "since I've been married I haven't been able to eat the way I used to, because—well, you know John has a good deal of nervous strain in his business, and he comes home all on edge and, well—he does find so much fault with his meals. Flies out at me if anything is wrong, you know. And when he does that, it simply takes my appetite all away. I don't eat anything and, if I do, I don't want it. And even when he doesn't complain, I'm so afraid he is going to that I'm nervous and I don't enjoy my food. Really, doctor, I'm not such a bad cook. John says so himself, but he says he's nervous and little things irritate him."

He Blamed Her Indigestion On Her Husband's Fault-Finding.

The doctor who told me this conversation added grimly: "There's a subject for you—the selfishness of the man who spoils his wife's dinner and helps give her nervous indigestion by venting all the pent-up irritation of his day in an outburst of temper if anything about the meal doesn't entirely suit him."

A man who will kick a dog because someone he can't kick has called him down, is one of the meanest creatures living, isn't he?

And yet, does he differ so much from the man who will kick his wife

(not in the flesh but in the spirit and that often hurts just as much) when things have gone wrong at the office? Of Course A Man Has A Right To Expect Some Things.

What about justifiable fault-finding, you may say?

Well, every man has a right to expect his wife to learn to cook the food he provides, nourishingly and palatably. But has he any more reason for demanding a first-class cook than she a first-class provider?

When the cooking falls below a reasonable standard, a man is of course entitled to criticize and ask that his wife try to improve it. But this criticism does not need to be made in an ill-tempered way. And if a man wants to be especially decent, he might wait until after dinner, that is, of course, if the thing isn't something that can be remedied at the time.

No Man Could Work Well Under Such Conditions.

No man could do his work well in the atmosphere of irritable criticism to which many of them subject their wives.

I have often heard employers boast of the tact they use with their employees and sometimes heard these same men find fault with their wives in an utterly tactless way.

What does criticism mean—fault-finding? Not as its primary meaning. It means primarily the act of judging justly of the beauties and faults of a work of art. The definition is suggestive. I know a man who developed his wife into a fine cook without a single irritable word. He criticized in the true sense, that is, he encouraged the good and courteously pointed out her mistakes.

Liquid Fire.

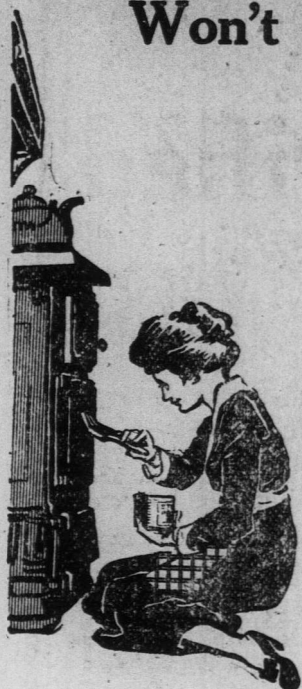

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

PEACE TALK CONTINUES.

LONDON, May 12. The latest peace overtures, said to be of German origin, while not as insistent and impossible as previous statements on the same subject, certainly do not yet offer a basis for negotiations, said Lord Robert Cecil, Minister of War Trade, in discussing with the Associated Press the latest reputed German peace terms. Lord Robert continued: "We have never received either officially or unofficially any direct peace suggestions from Germany. The only indirect overtures, that we are aware of appear in the speeches of Bethmann Hollweg and in the recent German note to America. We would not think of discussing, or even considering any overtures without consulting our Allies. No formal or informal conference for this purpose has ever taken place. If Germany should decide to approach us through the medium of the United States the latter would have to use its own judgment as to whether or not to deliver the request." While disclaiming any knowledge of the internal condition of Germany, Lord Robert declared that the increasing reports of peace overtures indicate that there is some truth to the stories that the Central Powers are in desperate straits.

BRITISH OFFICIAL.

LONDON, May 12. About 500 yards of British trenches in Vermelles were captured by the Germans on Thursday night, but later the British in a counter attack took a portion of their lost ground, according to a British official this evening. The communication says that yesterday, after heavy preliminary bombardment, the enemy succeeded in capturing about 500 yards of our front trenches north of Vermelles. We regained a portion of the lost by a counter attack, made during the night. To-day there has been no further infantry action, but considerable artillery activity was shown in this neighborhood. Further north, opposite Guinchy, we bombed the enemy's positions. Otherwise there has been

nothing but artillery duels at various points on the front, principally in the western region of Thiepval, Neuve Massines, Voormezelle, St. Eloi and east of Ypres.

RUSSIANS' GOOD WORK.

PETROGRAD, May 12. Russian forces in Persia during the past ten days have completed the arduous task of traversing the mountain district separating it from the Turco-Persian frontier, driving the Turks upon their strongly fortified base of Khanikin, and now stand on the very threshold of Mesopotamia. Further developments in connection with the Russian expedition towards Bagdad, are being awaited with the greatest interest. The hasty retreat of the Turks on this quarter seems to imply that the forces defending Khanikin, are greatly over-estimated. It is apparent that they have not as yet been able to transfer the force released by the surrender of Kut-el-Amara to assist their hard-pressed army north of Bagdad. The Russian advance on Khanikin very seriously threatens the whole rear of the Turkish Bagdad army, confronting that army with the possibility of being entirely cut off. From the city of Bagdad forces are operating to the southward against the British.

HOMELESS AS RESULT OF FLOODS

CAPE TOWN, May 12. A hundred persons are homeless as the result of floods in the midland districts. The loss of life is estimated at 150, and the property damage very large.

AUSTRIA-GREEK LOAN.

ATHENS, May 12. The Austrian member of the International Financial Commission has been instructed by his Government to support the Greek Government's project for a new international loan. The Government expects to issue the loan at 85% with interest at 5%.

EXECUTIONS.

DUBLIN, May 12. James Connolly and John McDermott, were shot this morning, for complicity in the rebellion. James Connolly was styled by his associates, Commandant General of the Irish Rebel Army. He was one of the seven who signed the proclamation issued by the insurgents. In the Dublin outbreak Connolly was wounded fighting, and was taken prisoner. His thigh had been broken by a bullet. It was announced in London last week that he could not be placed on trial at the time on account of his wounded condition. At a session of the Commons yesterday, protests were made by Irish members against the execution of rebel leaders, and an attempt was made to obtain an undertaking that there would be no more of them. Mr. Asquith said that two other persons were under sentence of death, and that he did not see his way to interfere with Major General Maxwell, Commander in Ireland, and say that the extreme penalty should not be inflicted. The Premier thought it unjust that preferential treatment should be accorded in the case of men of equal guilt. Connolly lived for several years in New York, where he was active as a Socialist and writer on labor topics. He returned to Ireland about five years ago to assist in organizing the Irish Labor Party. He was about 50 years of age. Official headquarters announcement regarding executions follows: The trial of two prominent leaders of the rebellion, whose names were appended to the proclamation issued by the

so-called Provisional Government, namely Jas. Connolly and John McDermott, took place on May 9th and sentence of death was returned in each case. The sentences were carried out this morning after confirmation by the General Commanding in Chief.

SKETCH OF McDERMOTT'S LIFE.

NEW YORK, May 12. John McDermott was known to Irishmen in the United States as one of the most brilliant orators in Ireland, and as one of the so-called inner circle of revolutionists active in the recent uprising. Authorities in this country on Irish affairs, say that he was one of the original organizers of the Irish Volunteers in November 1913, in Dublin. On the outbreak of war he, comparatively a young man, was editor of the Irish Freedom, a Dublin journal ardently opposed to recruiting among the Irish for the British army. This paper was one of those suppressed for its attitude on the subject. McDermott, according to his friends in this country, made an anti-recruiting speech and was arrested and sentenced to four months in jail. McDermott who has never been in the United States, was a leading athlete in Ireland during his youth participating in Gaelic games throughout the country. During a visit of Queen Mary to Dublin some years ago, McDermott and his friends declare that he was arrested during the disturbance and so roughly handled by the police, that he was removed to hospital, remaining there for some weeks, becoming permanently a cripple.

PRaise FOR THE PRIESTS.

DUBLIN, May 12. Behavior of Catholic clergy during the recent outbreaks was so courageous that General Maxwell, Commander of the British forces has sent to Archbishop Walsh a special letter of thanks, requesting him to give the names of priests who had displayed special gallantry. Archbishop Walsh replied, expressing appreciation, but declining to give the names, as he said it would be invidious to practice in numerous cases.

LANSING'S ANXIETY.

WASHINGTON, May 12. Secretary of State Lansing announced to-day that he had asked Ambassador Gerard at Berlin to ascertain the nature of the punishment imposed by the German Government on the commander of the submarine which sunk the steamer Sussex. Lansing said the request was not in the nature of a formal enquiry to the German government.

A Praiseworthy Example.

The people of Grand and Little River have just demonstrated in a most practical way that they possess to an eminent degree that sentiment which we call "public spirit," a disposition to pool labor and intellectual effort for the common good.

In the midst of their pressing agricultural activity, which at this season of the year demands all the farmer's attention they voluntarily gave a day's free labour on the roads.

This display of public spirit is worthy of all praise and deserves to be recorded in public print as an appreciation and encouragement as well as an example to other communities. By this application of a day's free labor the roads have been put in tolerable condition, that previously were in a deplorable state owing to governmental neglect. The present improved state of the roads must prove an inspiration to independence and self-reliance on the part of the men who so cheerfully gave of their labour to effect the improvement. This voluntary labor is, of course, nothing new to the good people of the Colroy Valley, but as far as public works are concerned, the younger generations are almost forgetting the fact that their fathers were great in the giving of labor for the public good.

To the generous toll of the older folk now passing away, the younger people owe the existence of many a bridge and highway. The road on which the writer of this humble note had the pleasure of giving a helping hand was built by a pioneer of the district who is now well up in his eightieth year, but as keenly interested to day as ever. His great regret on the day of giving of the free labor was that he was no longer able to "dig in" with us; of course there were some "blackies" who held back and it is to be regretted that some of those men who by reason of their position in the community were naturally expected to set a worthy example, but they failed to measure up to their duty and their conduct might almost be regarded as treasonable. Some of those men would not only work but they discouraged others from giving of their help. Let the "good men and true" who fear not to labor for the common good take no heed of those elms on public progress, but go on doing their duty to the community and take joy in the performance of a work well done.—Com.

Western Fishery.

The Board of Trade have received the following from R. Furneaux regarding the fishery between Rose Blanche and Harbor LeCou:—"The catch is better in 1915, with 200 for last week. Forty-five dories and skiffs and two boats are fishing. There is a good sign of fish on the Rose Blanche Bank, about 20 miles off and a few herrings are obtainable for bait. Several small schooners during the last week were on the Rose Blanche Bank and found cod of a large size plentiful. No schooners are fishing here now as all have left for the Gulf fishery."

Rifle Covers Not Required.

His Excellency the Governor was advised by wire yesterday that the War Office were now supplying rifle covers and are of a different pattern, and adding the request that no more at present need be made locally. The W. P. A. under whose supervision this work has been going on are asked to discontinue. However the material will not be wasted as it can be turned into socks and other useful articles.

Bay Bulls Project.

Much progress is being made at Bay Bulls in getting ready the site for the new premises of the Newfoundland American Packing Company. Messrs. W. J. Ellis and E. St. J. Howley, who have been in the States in connection with the project, are expected to arrive back Wednesday next.

Notwithstanding the war, the tourist traffic by the Red Cross ships promises to be the best ever during the coming summer season. Already hundreds of people in the States have booked passage ahead for the New York-Halifax-St. John's round trip. The Stephano and Florizel are our most luxurious and best equipped passenger boats and their popularity is growing rapidly. It is said that a strong reason adduced why the tourist traffic will be exceptionally large here this year is the fact that people, Americans particularly, who used to take in the European trips before the war now entertain the idea of visiting Newfoundland instead.

Baseball Meeting To-Night.

A very important meeting of the Baseballers will be held to-night at the office of the Vice-President, Mr. Hawvermale, to discuss Mr. W. J. Collins' motion to rescind for the playing season of 1916 the residential clause governing players. Sir Hugh Bell says: "When the war is over and life returns to a normal course, can it be doubted that the best way for all parties will be to obliterate with all possible speed the horrible injuries it has inflicted? Not to stimulate and excite angry feelings, but to calm them, should be our object. Will a policy which seeks to exclude Germany from the comity of nations and from the markets of the world have that effect? Would any reasonable moralist desire to cultivate hatred? Would he not rather wish to allay it in every way in his power?"

Fabre Liner Was Not Chased

BY COMMERCE RAIDERS.

New York, May 8.—The report that the Fabre liner steamer Venezia was attacked and chased by two German commerce raiders and submarines in mid-sea on May 1, was denied to-day by Captain Bonifacio, the shipmaster. In making his report to the Fabre line office, and to Captain Gaunt, the British naval attaché.

Captain Bonifacio said that two steamers were sighted in mid-sea, that flashes of gun-fire were seen, that two small boats, apparently tenders, were observed, but the nearest the Venezia got to either of the ships was about four miles, and that neither of the ships paid any attention to him.

Captain Gaunt, in reporting to the British Admiralty, stated his belief that the two ships sighted were either French or British converted cruisers guarding the steamship line, were evidently engaged in target practice and were employing the tenders in observing and placing the targets.

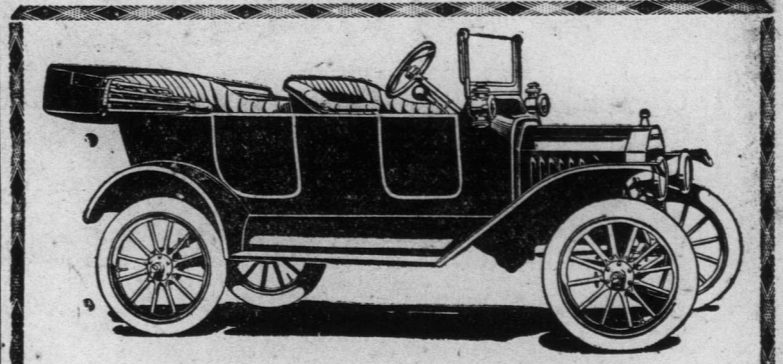
