# **Public Notice**

I am directed by His Excellency the Governor in Council to issue the following notice under Authority of Minute in Council passed 28th February, 1918.

# Augmentation of the Pay of Royal Naval Reservists Newfoundland.

The Government of Newfoundland have decided to augment the pay of Newfoundland Royal Naval Reservists so as to place them on the same footing as men of the Newfoundland Regiment.


Under the provision of the War Measure Act, authority is given to the Minister of Militia to deal with the matter of augmentation of pay of the Royal Naval Reservists, Nfld., in consultation with the Senior Naval Officer, St. John's.

It is ordered that a sum of 33c. per day be placed to the credit of each Naval Reservist from the time of commencement of the war, in cases where men were then serving, or otherwise, from the time when their services began up to the time of discharge, or of death, or to the 30th of September, 1917, inclusive.

As the rate of pay of Naval Reservists was in-creased from October 1st, 1917, and as the difference between the amount they receive and that allowed the members of The Royal Newfoundland Regiment is 17c. per day, this difference will also be credited them from that date.

The foregoing amounts will not in any case be made a payment from Admiralty sources. The Minister of Militia, St. John's, Nfld., is solely responsible for the issue of any sums due.



(a) Payment will be made on personal application to the Minister of Militia, St. John's.

(b) Payment will be made to the nominee of any Reserve man, on written application duly witnessed, to the Minister of Militia. St. John's.

(c) Sums due will be placed to the credit of Resesrve men who do not desire to avail themselves of the foregoing and can be drawn by them at the expiration of their service.

The following form is to be compiled and for-warded direct to the Minister of Militia, St. John's, Newfoundland, at the earliest possible date:-

All communications of any description with regard to these payments are to be made to the Minister of Militia, St. John's, direct.

### Payment will commence on 1st May, 1918.


In cases where members of the Royal Naval Reserve (Newfoundland) have been killed in action or died of wounds or sickness, or through any other cause, the amount due as Augmentation Pay will go to the Estate of the deceased. The authority to ob-tain the Estate of the deceased is, in case of a Will, Letters of Probate; and in case there is not a Will, Letters of Administration. Such letters are issued by the Supreme Court of Newfoundland on the Petition and Proofs of Executor of the Will, or the next of kin. If the Estate does not exceed \$500.00, after the proof of the facts has been obtained the petition can be applied for by the Minister of Justice.

With reference to the foregoing, it is suggested that the next of kin of Reservists who are now serving should com-municate with them and request them to send their instruc-tions to the Militia Department. No action can be taken until such instructions are received.

Next of kin of deceased Reservists will be communicated with in due course when their claims have been proved.

and sally port of the submarines. Through the mine-fields, through the blast from hundreds of guns the British raiders dashed. One actually made fast to the great pier and land ed a raiding party. Others filled with concrete ran clear into the channel and were sunk by their crews. Two destroyers apparently smashed through the harbor defences and blew up the gates of the canal. A submarine filled with explosives ram-med the pier and blew itself up, de-stroying the enemy works. Then they came back, "but not, not the six hundred."

The casualties were heavy, says the official report. How could they be otherwise? Probably not a man who volunteered for such a hazardous service expected to return, but went forward to give his life gladly for the honor of the white ensign and the safety of the Empire.

Britons hundreds of years hence will be proud of this splendid deed, as we have been of Drake's dash into Cadiz Bay three hundred and fifty years ago when he "singed the King of Spain his beard," or of that daring night at Santa Cruz de Teneriffe when Nelson lost his right arm, or of midshipman "Nobby" Hewitt's raid on the Russian guns in the Crimea, for which still "We drink to-night to that midshipmite, singing, cheerily lads, Yo Ho!"

Except for a few rare opportunities the British navy's part in this war has been largely that of a traffic police force. It has kept the surface of the seas inviolate and enabled the Allies to perform miracles of transportation of troops and supplies. The growing feeling that its direction, though efficient, was too cautious, led lately to the retirement of Admiral Jellicoe. This, the first sharp evidence of the new policy, will be greet-ed around the Allied world with a cheer. There was never a doubt that the Nelson spirit still lived, and British hearts to-day are lifted up with, the reassurance that it again holds sway, "as in the days of old and as it still shall be."-Montreal Daily Star.
