Cured Herring.

Scotch cured herring market has shown little change since last reports. Offerings continue to be made to the trade of this city both from local importers and from packers in Newfoundland, and prices follow closely the prevailing quotations given elsewhere in this paper. While it is agreed that some factors are able to get as high as \$20 per barrel for fancy goods in small quantities, the prevailing market on both fall and ary quality" is about \$14 per barrel and in some instances less. As there is a fair supply on hand, merchants in New York are showing a little more anxiety to sell, and this has not charming suede glove has self had a good effect on market conditions. As there is a supply yet to come forward from Newfoundland, buyers have taken the position that it is just as well to wait until the market is settled before making heavy purchases. So far as can be

observed the demand has been of a hand-to-mouth order. Jobbers have been taking only sufficient stocks to meet their requirements for a short time, and retailers have been buying in the same manner. As the retail trade has figured heavy profits on all goods handled this season, the consumption demand has naturally been restricted. This, of course, has had the effect of reducing the volume of business for the summer season, and many contend that this petty profiteering on the part of the retailer has worked a permanent injury to the herring trade, in that it has removed parations too numerous to mention goods now in the market. How "The Stars and Stripes'

Remained American in Europe.

The Stars and Stripes was a piece of Yankee madness. Who ever heard of an army that proposed to let its Privates have a newspaper all their own, and so much their own that the officers couldn't get an official statement into it with a shoe-horn? What sort of discipline could you expect from an army with a newspaper in which the men could say pretty near-

ly what they liked? "This is the American private soldier's newspaper, and his alone! Nobody else can horn in on it!" The Stars and Stripes told its army that in every issue, and proved it, so that the American army from one end of the line to the other knew that it had an organ that wouldn't stuff it with ganda from any source whatsoever.

And who didn't try to horn in on it? Well, a candid and complete list of those who did would fill a few columns of this newspaper, and it would include some crowned heads or heads invested with European dignities akin to crowns. It is easier to say

No Big Bosses.

One who didn't try was the President of the United States. Another who didn't try was the Commanderin-Chief of the A.E.F. Though General Pershing was the big boss of all the works and thus might have considered himself the great Editorial and Publishing WE, he turned that sacred paper over to a second lieutenant and a squad of privates and

let them go to it. And whenever (which meant nearly every day) somebody tried that horning-in act, he was un-horned, often without knowing just how it had happened—though it is whispered Patrick's Church, by the Rev. Fr. Rethat a few distinguished worldcharacters had to be taken firmly by the tossing horn and led back to

their own proper homes. That is how the army paper mained American in what was then just about the most hotly European part of Europe-and not only American, but the plain, private soldier's kind of American, preaching discipline to the limit without ever having the slightest reverence for rank merely as rank; saying it in mighty plain American, and managing at one and the same time to get a whole lot of fun out of the war and yet to build up that wonderful, grim morale which imbued every man with the perfect

readiness to die. American journalism may be proud of this most extraordinary feature of war-making, for the men who made The Stars and Stripes were all American newspapermen, from New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Washington, San Francisco. Portland, Cleveland, Kansas City, and half a dozen other towns. And hardly one of them was more than a common private. 



Editor Evening Telegram Dear Sir,-At the outset of our campaign for better and cleaner houses for workingmen and their families we adopted the slogan of Co-operation, Thrift and Common Sense. In addition to these three great principles, we add whitewash and paint, to brighten up many of our city homes.

Last night, in company with Mr Linegar, we visited many parts of the old town, and came to the conclusion that there must be at least over seven hundred houses in this town unfit for the cook. Then, although he was human habitation. Discipline and Heroism.

The transport "Abercrombie-Robinson," conveying detachments of the 27th Regiment and Cape Mounted Rifles, with the 91st Highlanders, was overtaken by a storm in Table Bay on the night of August 27, 1842, the fury of the gale causing the ship to break from her moorings, and to be driven inshore upon some rocks. After a terrible experience through the wild night, communication was established with the land when morning dawned, and a couple of surf-boats were secured; then the difficult task of disembarking seven hundred souls was begun. Captain Bertie Gordon, who was in command of the 91st Highlanders, gave the orders. First, the women, children, and sick were sent ashore, then the 27th Regiment, followed by the Cape Riflemen. The 91st were the last and were made to draw lots as to who should land first. To add to their difficulties, a convictship also broke from its moorings, and one of the surf-boats had to go to their assistance, so that the disem barkation of the whole 91st (four hundred and eighty officers and men) had to be carried out with one small hoat. The "Abercrombie-Robinson." later in the day took a heavy list to leeward, and the remainder of the 91st were drawn up amidships, the men having to jump from the chains one by one, to be picked up by the surf-boat, which when full was hauled ashore. The men left the ship in full marching order, and not a single life was lost.

WHO MANAGED TO REACH THE PEACE CONFERENCE.

Of the innumerable delegates, ambassadors, representatives, plenipotentiaries, and such who went to Paris to watch the wheels of the Peace Conference go round, probably not one went through such strenuous experiences in getting there as William Monroe Trotter. Of the eleven delegates chosen to appear for the estimated 14,-000,000 negroes in the United States, Trotter was the only one who landed. The other ten applied for passports, but failed to receive them, and so stayed at home. But William Monroe, being made of sterner stuff, disguised himself as a cook, and crossed the ocean in that capacity on a small steamer. He did not succeed in securing an audience with any of the important personages meeting in solemn conclave to establish forevermore the good of man, the rights of opprest peoples and a few other things, but he did send them protests against the denial of passports to American negroes and against the failure to insert in the Peace Treaty a clause guaranteeing them life and liberty. He also gave out sundry stories to the Paris papers, among others one setting out the details of a lynching in the South. "The colored soldiers in France charged that they had been discriminated against in France. Leave was regulated by the color line, and negroe troops were restricted from viscertain cafes. The white soldiers spread damaging stories about the colored men, in order to make the French people fear them. All menial tasks were shouldered upon colored soldiers. I prepared a protest to President Wilson in behalf of the colored soldiers, which was also widely printed in France. A Summary of the Six Attempts.

THE BLIMP C.-5.

On Saturday, May 10th, the American cruiser "Chicago" arrived in port. Aboard her were men who constituted an advance guard to prepare a landing place for still another attempt at crossing the Atlantic. This was the American dirigible, C .- 5, which arrived at Pleasantville from Montauk Point, N. Y. The balloon arrived in St. John's, having flown the 1200 miles without stop, on Thursday morning, May 15th. Pleasantville and vicinity were black with people, and the cheer that rose as she gracefully floated in between the hills forming Cuckhold's Cove, with the sun shining on her beautiful fabric sides, was the most enthusiastic heard in connection with any Transatlantic attempt. Seen by me on board the U.S.A. Chicago, a few minutes after alighting, Commander E. W. Coil, head of the crew of six gave these facts: The gas bag was 200 feet in length. The car, suspended beneath, was thirty-five feet long. In this the crew rode. She was fitted with two Union motors, driving one screw, and was, in fact, quite an ordinary balloon, having no special features at all. The speed was 55 miles an hour, plus or minus the wind. The flight from Montauk Pt., N.Y., to Pleasantville, lasted 26 hours and 50 minutes, the additional time being consumed by extra distance flown while the balloon had lost her way on the South-West Coast of the country. The dirigible arrived in the morning. In the afternoon she broke her moorings and rapidly drifted out to sea, passing over Signal Hill. The men who were in the carriage jumped out, one. Lieut. C. H. Little, having to jump from a height of thirty-five feet. He suffered no further injuries than a sprained ankle. The American cruiser "Edwards," which had arrived in port in the morning, was despatched to look for the balloon, but had to return without even seeing her. Thus ended this attempt at crossing the Atlantic by air. The crew, very downhearted, left port soon after by the






