## England's Ancient Courts.

During the first of October every year there is held at Bristol the last surviving Court of Pled Poudre (The Powder Court) in this country. These courts were established more than seven hundred years ago at towns where fairs were held to "determine the claims of persons passing through them who cannot make any star there." They were called Courts of Pled Poudre from the dusty feet of the suitors.

Since the rise and the extension of the jurisdiction of the Superior Courts the less ancient courts have gradually disappeared until only the one at Bristol remained. The recorder presides in the court, which is opened in the market in accordance with ancient custom, but later adjourns to the Guild-hall for convenience, where all kinds of actions can be heard, provided they arise in the city. Needless to say, the number of complaints is few, although, as in the olden days, the court remains open for the full fourteen days.

Another ancient court little known outside its own district is the Liverpool Court of Passage. It has practically unlimited jurisdiction in cases of action arising within the city, and is one of the very few remaining ancient Borough Courts of Record established in the Middle Ages. In fact, out of 215 of these courts only 19 now exist. The only two of any consequence are the one at Liverpool and the City of London Court, the latter having jurisdiction only where the defendant is employed in the city itself.

Exeter has a peculiar ancient court known as the Exeter Provost Court which by ancient charter has power to determine numerous local causes, while the Peterborough Court of Com-

mon Pleas has similar jurisdiction. Of courts exercising much wider powers, but little known by the layman, the most famous is the Court of Arches, which hears important cases relating to the fabric, ornaments, or furniture of any church or burial ground or concerning ritual in the province of Canterbury. This is presided over by a barrister of ten years' standing—at present Sir L. T. Dibley, who is known as the Dean of the Arches. The court took its name from the fact that it was held in the Church of St. Mary le Bow (Marie de Arcibus).

Several of the ancient manors of England still hold their periodical courts, sometimes presided over by the lord of the manor, sometimes by his steward. They have very limited powers relating to land in the manor, but with the growing enfranchisement of copyhold estates they are gradually disappearing.

### Lord Lascelles' Royal Blood.

A STUDY IN HEREDITY AND ROMANCE.

It is said, with an appearance of truth, that the happy wedding of the princess Mary to Lord Lascelles will be enrolled among the romantic chronicles of Royal ladies who have married a commoner—using this latter word as meaning a person born outside the circle of the blood-royal. But strictly speaking, this is not quite accurate. For it is certain that the bridegroom has a trace-faint, perhaps—of Royal blood in his own veins. Nay, more, he is indeed, a connection of the Royal House of Windsor. It is a story that carries us back a very long way indeed, for the bridegroom's family is one of the old Norman "family trees" that have got very well rooted into the soil of our island kingdom.

### BEARER OF THE POPE'S BANNER.

The Lascelles came out of Normandy at the imperious call of William of Normandy, when that warrior, raised all Christendom against Harold, the Saxon King. John de Lascelles, a petty baron, had his castle and retainers, and he accepted service beneath the Conqueror in a very special capacity—guardian of the "gonfan" or sacred banner blessed by the Pope and sent to William as a sign that His Holiness approved of the attempt to invade England and capture the Crown.

In the memorable fight before the Saxon stockades William was struck down and almost overwhelmed. But John de Lascelles rushed to the rescue, and saved the life of William.

In commemoration of the deed of service the De Lascelles was granted the rich manor of Hinderkirk, Yorks, then belonging to the Saxon Church and counted as an abbey. The ecclesiastics were displaced; but it appears that, in marked distinction to the harsh treatment of most of the ancient priests, the evicted monks were allowed to live peacefully in the neighbourhood, and indeed founded another smaller abbey.

### ROOTED IN YORKSHIRE.

Thus in the year that William won the Battle of Hasting the ancestor of Lord Lascelles settled himself and his family firmly on the broad lands of Hinderkirk. And without a break for all these hundreds of years the family has continued to hold estates in Yorkshire.

It may be noted that the offices of John de Lascelles, who lived in the reign of Richard II and died in 1315, and his wife Matilda were discovered some time ago in Normandy, for they had been taken back to France for burial. The stone image of the warrior of 1315 bears a most striking resemblance to the bridegroom-soldier of to-day.

The family portraits of the male members of the Lascelles family also show an unvarying likeness. Perhaps there is no great family in England that can trace its descent in so unbroken a line as the one under notice. For some hundreds of years the De Lascelles flourished in Yorkshire. The call of conflict caused them to become mixed up in a great deal of border fighting with the Scots. "In foray and cattle-driving, plundering and burning—you will always find a Lascelles," was the old saying. "Then came a singular episode, imparting a touch of the romantic and the mysterious to the family name.

### THE SECRET MARRIAGE.

James IV. of Scotland had a young daughter. It is said that in her youth she disguised herself as a man and rode in a mad skitter after some flying Border invaders. She was captured by the De Lascelles who was conducting the raid. Love sprang up

between the pair when she confided that she was a member of the gentler sex.

It is a tradition of the Lascelles House that there was a secret marriage between the pair, and that the child born of the union was thus of Royal blood. But James IV. fell upon evil days and, in those distracted times tales of secret weddings were not taken much account of. It was in 1790 that the head of the Lascelles family was raised to higher rank, becoming Baron Harewood, and acquired fresh estates near Leeds. But he died without issue and the Barony became extinct. He was succeeded by his cousin, Edward Lascelles, who on the 18th June, 1796, was created Baron Harewood.

### FRIENDS OF ROYALTY.

It is interesting to note that this Baron Lascelles was on intimate terms with Royalty, being a close friend of the Dukes of Sussex and Cambridge, two of the sons of George III. As a mark of this royal favour the Baron was made Viscount Lascelles and Earl of Harewood on the 7th September, 1812—a very memorable time in our military and naval history.

The present Earl is the fifth, and succeeded to the title in 1891. He married the third daughter of the third Earl of Bradford. Lord Lascelles was born 9th September, 1832. From 1905 to 1907 he was in the diplomatic service as attaché. For his war services he received the D.S.O. and bar, and the Croix de Guerre.

### Breeding Pearl Buttons.

So anxious are the button-makers to perpetuate the supply of a material indispensable to their industry that the National Association of Button Manufacturers is co-operating with the Government Fisheries Bureau of the United States in efforts to propagate artificially the pearl-mussel in streams and lakes of the Middle West.

The Fisheries Bureau now makes a regular business of rescuing millions of fishes which each year are left stranded in dryingup pools by the retreating waters of the Mississippi and Illinois Rivers. Large numbers of them, before being restored to their native element, are inoculated with the larval "glochidia" of pearly mussels. The Button Manufacturers' Association is furnishing men to help in this work.

During last October and November seven agents of the buttonmakers accompanied for this purpose seven rescue crews sent out from the fish-hatching station at Homer, Minn., and nearly 6,000,000 fishes were inoculated with about half a billion glochidia. The latter fasten themselves upon the gills of the fishes (this accommodation being necessary to enable them to pass through a stage of their development), and some weeks later drop off. They quit the fishy nurse and take care of themselves thereafter.

The inoculated fishes were liberated in Lake Pokegama, Minn., and at several places in the Mississippi River. It is worth while to add that the only spawn of exceptionally fine varieties of mussels is used such as the river mucket and Lake Pepin mucket. The cost of planting mussels in this way is less than six cents per thousand.

### Professional Golfers Hike for America.

London (Associated Press)—The persistent exodus of leading British golfers to the United States continues to receive emphasis in the local press. A special correspondent in writing on the subject states: "It would seem to

be a deliberate attempt to make a deliberate attempt to make a corner in the world's golfing talent." Referring to Hutchinson and Barnes as two British-born players, acknowledged masters, who have migrated to the United States, he reviews the list of others which is "not only a formidable but a starting one." Apart from hundreds of renowned amateurs from the Scottish "hurdies," he finds the names of Wilfred Reid, of Banstead Downs; James Hepburn, of Home Park, Strathgordon; Laurence Ayton, of St. Andrews and Rye; Philip Taylor, of Fulwell; J. Mason, of Montrose; R. S. Cruikshank, of Edinburgh; Ralph Douglas Edgar, of Newcastle; Charles Smith, of West Middlesex; the late Mayo, of Burchill; Tom Varion, of Jersey; James Scott, Worthington, of Sunningdale and M d-Surrey; Robert Andrew, of Prestwick; Philip Gaudin, of Jersey; W. H. Horns, of Chorley, and Alan Gow, of Banstead Downs.

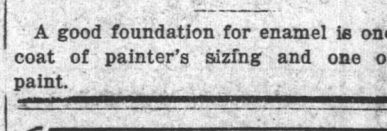
Esthonia to Have Sporting Meet.

### Russia's Most Dreaded Season.

FOOD AND FUEL SHORTAGE ANTICIPATED.

Moscow, (Associated Press)—Russia is approaching her most dreaded season—the early spring—with the realization in government circles that her first year of free trade under Communism has not filled her warehouses with supplies of food to tide her over until the next harvest. With foreign aid, principally American, devoted largely to relieving the terrible distress in the Volga and Ukraine famine regions, Russia promises to be unable to feed the rest of her vast population during the spring and summer, and, according to official government predictions, even next year's harvest probably will be bad. The early spring months, before the first harvest is in and when the sleigh traffic vanishes along with the snow and the thaw make the highways impassable, will be the test, both for food and fuel. Even now, with the roads in good condition, Moscow, Petrograd and other large cities are short of food.

### DEPENDENT UPON CHARITY.

The government warehouses have enough to dole out to the Red Army and favored employees for some months. The rest of the population is dependent on food brought in by traders. Each spring for the past five years, however, a similar crisis has been met in some way. Foreign aid, grants from abroad, is now hoped for but not confidently expected by the Soviet leaders. The fuel shortage looms up even more prominently than the lack of food. The Donetz basin, Russia's great coal fields, showed increased yields during the early winter when by a special drive food was secured for the miners. Now, the famine in the Ukraine and the general lack of food and transportation elsewhere all have contributed to cut down coal production again. Without food the miners cannot work. Similarly, in Siberia and Turkistan, according to the newspaper Economic Life, a lack of fuel is responsible for failure to more food to central Russia. Owing to the lack of supplies in government warehouses, the number of persons rationed by the state has just been further reduced from 14,000,000 to 11,000,000, including the Red Army. Only these 11,000,000 in all Russia, receive the ration. All others are dependent on their own meager harvests, if peasants' or in what they can buy, if city dwellers.

**NEW STEAMSHIP LINE FOR NEWFOUNDLAND.**  
BROCKVILLE, Ont., March 28. The operation of a new steamship line between Newfoundland and the Great Lakes, carrying coal and pulp wood, was forecasted when Montreal and Toronto men acquired control of the former American Shipping Board vessels.

**LOCKOUT TEMPORARILY AVERTED.**  
LONDON, March 28. The threatened lockout in Great Britain's engineering industry appeared to be at least temporarily averted today. Representatives of the engineering unions decided to accede to the employers' proposals as a basis for renewed negotiations.

**NEGOTIATIONS AGAIN OFF, IS REPORT.**  
LONDON, March 28. It was reported late to-night that the negotiations between employers and engineering trades unions had comparatively broken down. The employers demanded recognition of certain managerial rights considered vital and the unions declined.

**IRISH GOVERNMENT SUSTAINED.**  
OTTAWA, March 28. A resolution declaring the King Government has solemnly repudiated its pledges to provide for the soldiers' re-employment and disregarded political honor, was defeated in the Commons to-day by 162 to 42. The Progressive voting with the Government. The resolution was regarded as a motion of non-confidence.

**KING NOT A PROHIBITIONIST.**  
OTTAWA, March 28. "I am not in favour of prohibition in anything, but I do favour temperance in everything," said Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Prime Minister, to a large delegation of the Canadian Temperance Alliance, which met him

Premier Craig, replying to the charge of Michael Collins, the Southern Premier, that he had not kept his word to reinstate expelled Catholics in shipyards, said loyalists workers had admitted the principle, but there were 67,000 unemployed in Belfast. Craig added the whole aspect had been changed since the revelation of predatory attacks on Ulster territory. Sir James repudiated the charges that Belfast Protestants were conducting a program against Catholics as Catholics. Craig reiterated that the South of Ireland was sending men with bombs to create unrest in the North. Ulstermen were, he said, not up against Catholics, but against rebels, murderers, Bolsheviks, and enemies of the Empire.

**BULLET REACHES WRONG MARK.**  
BERLIN, March 28. An attempt to assassinate Professor Miltukoff, former Minister of Foreign Affairs in the Russian Provisional Government while addressing a meeting of Russians, was frustrated by Vladimir Nabokoff, who was himself killed by the bullet.

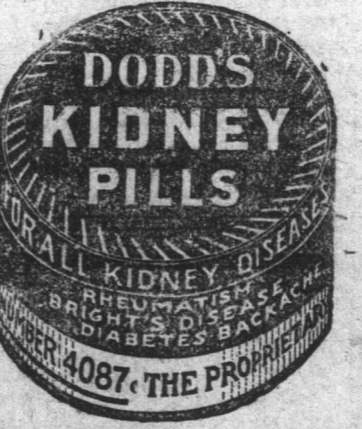

## When Children Ask Awkward Questions.

None but the most perfect parent in the world can hope to reply to all the questions children ask.

When a boy asks his father why the wind blows, it is more than likely that Dad would find himself puzzled.

The reason is that when air gets heated it expands, gets lighter, and rises from the earth. More air blows in to fill the vacuum and this brings about the wind.

How fast does sound travel? It is something like a quarter of a mile in a second, and although this is slow compared with light, it is more than ten times the speed of an express train.

If you watch a man hammering stakes into the ground, or if you see a gun fired at a distance, the sound reaches you some time after you have seen the action. When a storm is far away the thunder clap follows slowly after the lightning; when the storm is near the reverse is the case.

Sound travels through the air, earth or water. Most sounds reach us through the air; but on a still night the sound of galloping hoofs may be heard by placing one ear to the road, and a diver down in the sea may hear sounds around him coming through the water.

The reason why one cannot hear one's voice far off is that sound travels outwards from the lips in all directions, so the sound which reaches any particular point in the distance must be small.

If a child asks when the first clock was used, the answer is that the oldest record in England was put up in a former clocktower in Westminster in 1285; that sundials were used long ago to tell the time; and that King Alfred the Great's "clock" took the form of candles which were marked by colored rings.

### Some Puzzling Questions.

Another question that a child might ask is: "How is a road paved?" It is said that the Carthaginians were the first people to use a system of road paving, but the Romans were the most famous road-makers. The name of John Macadam will always be associated with roads because he invented a form of road now known as "tarmacadam." Wood-paving was first used in Russia and introduced to Britain in 1836.

From roads the child perhaps goes to bridges. The longest bridge in the world is that over the Forth. It was commenced in 1882 and took 4,000 seven years to build. The Zambesi Bridge at Victoria Falls in Africa is the world's loftiest bridge, and the Pontoon bridge at Calcutta is probably the largest floating bridge. The Chinese built the first wooden bridge. The most interesting wonder in the world is Giant's Causeway, which stretches for four miles along the coast of County Antrim in Ireland. It is a collection of huge rocks which go down into the sea, and many reach a height of thirty feet.

## The Origin of the Foundling Hospital.

Captain Thomas Coram, who originated the Foundling Hospital, was born at Lyme Regis, in Dorsetshire, in 1668, but emigrated to America, and became captain of a trading vessel. Having made a considerable sum of money, he came to London, and was living at Rotherhithe in 1720. While walking from there to the city he occasionally saw infants abandoned in the streets and the idea occurred to him that there ought to be a hospital that would take them in. For 17 years he laboured to get influential people interested in his project, and at last succeeded. In 1739 the Foundling Hospital in Guildford Street, Russell Square, was established by Royal Charter, a small hospital having been first opened in a house in Hatton Garden.

The foundations of the present building were laid on September 16, 1742, and in 1754 it was occupied by 600 children. A basket was hung at the gate in which the foundlings were soon supplied with more infants that it could support, and the basket plan had to be abandoned, the conditions of admission being made much more strict. The children receive a good plain education, the girls when old enough being put out to service and the boys apprenticed to various trades. Handed the composer and Hogarth the painter, both took great interest in the hospital and did much to aid it. Handel conducted musical performances there in which the children took part. Hogarth painted Coram's portrait, which still hangs there along with other fine pictures. The chapel services are open to the public.

Captain Coram died on March 29, 1751, and was buried in the chapel of his hospital. He was a downright honest, kindhearted sailor-man, and there is no doubt his hospital has done and is doing a very useful work.

## Japan Next Stage of Prince's Tour.

ONE MONTH TO BE SPENT THERE.

London (Associated Press)—The Prince of Wales is to spend nearly a month in Japan and numerous dinner parties, balls and other ceremonies and entertainments have been arranged in his honor. The programme of his stay in the Mikado's Empire, as announced here, shows that after arriving in Yokohama on the battleship Renown, April 12, he will go straight to Tokio, where he will be entertained with dinners at the Japanese foreign office and at the Prime Minister's official residence. The British Embassy in Tokio and the British colony in Yokohama are planning to give balls to celebrate his visit. After a week in those two cities, the Prince will go to Nikko for two days and afterward will visit Odawara and Lake Hakone, visiting Yokohama on the way to unveil the Inter-Allied war memorial arch, which has been erected by popular subscription on the "Bluff," the foreign residential district. Later, he will proceed by automobile to Shoji, where he will remain over night and on the following day will go to Iida, whence he will descend the Tenryu-gawa rapids as far as the railway line where he will take the train for Kioto. One week will be spent in this ancient capital of Japan in which the Prince will visit Lake Biwa and the island of Chikubushima. Next the Prince will go to Nara for two days and then to Kobe, where he will be entertained by the British colony. On May 8, he is to sail from Kobe to the Inland Sea, possibly stopping at some of its ports and, on May 9, he will leave Japan for Manila, where he will spend two days.

## Canada's Heavy Losses

BY GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP.

"The government of the Dominion of Canada," says the Railway Age in its current issue, "is in serious danger of having its credit destroyed by its railroad policy. The Dominion is considering trying to float a large loan in the United States. American investors probably will consider Canada's railway policy before deciding on the desirability of buying its government securities."

These statements are made in an editorial commenting on an article by Professor W. T. Jackman of the University of Toronto, entitled "The Problem of the Government Railways in Canada," which is published in this week's Railway Age.

In its editorial the Railway Age estimates that the railways owned by the Dominion of Canada failed in 1921 by about \$20,000,000 to earn enough to pay their operating expenses. "To this should be added," it says, "about \$100,000,000 for interest on the investment which was not earned. Therefore, directly and indirectly, government ownership of the railways last year added to the burdens of the Canadian taxpayer around \$120,000,000. The deficit officially admitted by the Canadian government for 1920 was over \$70,000,000, but this did not include interest on the investment in a large part of the railways. J. L. Payne, formerly controller of statistics of the Department of Railways and Canals, estimated the total losses, direct and indirect, in 1920 at about \$138,000,000.

"The Dominion government now actually owns about 17,000 miles of railway. It is still carrying on negotiations for the acquisition of the Grand Trunk which would make the total mileage actually owned and operated by it about 22,500 miles. In view of the enormous deficits which always have been incurred by every railway owned by the Dominion government since it acquired the Intercolonial over a half century ago it would seem wise for the people of Canada to do some very hard studying and thinking before they finally take the title to the Grand Trunk. Not only the experience of Canada, but the experience of every democratic country in the world, indicates that under permanent government ownership the Grand Trunk itself would become and remain a producer of large deficits.

"Now, the railway deficit of Canada is becoming an extremely serious thing. Canada has only nine million people and the Dominion government has an annual revenue of only about \$450,000,000. It needs about \$108,000,000 a year to pay expenses due to its participation in the way, including interest, pensions, etc. Its national debt is heavy and instead of declining has been mainly or entirely due to the deficits incurred by its railways. The government will be positively inviting bankruptcy if it engages in any more railway ventures.

"Government railway deficits are not peculiar to Canada. Large deficits were incurred by the railways of the United States in 1918 and 1919 under government operation. They were not due to the official personnel, which was not much changed, but to the system of management, which was radically changed. The organization and policy always are and always must be different under government from what they are under private management, because the controlling influences are different, and these controlling influences always tend to produce deficits. Since the government guarantees to the railroads of the United States were withdrawn they have incurred losses, but the taxpayers have not had to pay them.

"Most of the government railways of Australia incurred deficits before the war. These have been increased since then. The deficits in the year ending June 30, 1921, of the Australian railways for which we have statistics were as follows: Queensland, \$7,694,000; Victoria, \$3,171,000; New South Wales, \$2,808,000; Western Australia, \$2,000,000. The total for the railways of these countries was almost \$15,000,000. The New Zealand state railways had a deficit of almost \$600,000.

For 1921 the deficit was estimated some time ago at seven billion marks, but we shall know better what the deficit really was when complete figures for the year's actual operations are available.

### Prosperity in Ontario.

**DEPENDS UPON PRODUCTION.**  
Agriculture is the greatest industry of this country—agriculture, lumbering, mining and fishing—agriculture is the biggest brother. The life of our people depends upon the producing land. One of the problems of the nation is to prevent that land getting into the hands of the unintelligent. If Ontario is to go ahead in the production of wealth, we must have more people on the land, more intelligence on the land, more production and more prosperity. If we hope to accomplish this, our farmers must get down to the basic principles which underlie co-operation. If through co-operation in marketing the farmers of California have made a success of their industry, where production is practically three thousand miles from consumption, what can we not do in Ontario, the most advantageously situated province or state on the American continent? Ontario is centrally located; it has markets in all directions; it has practically water transportation to Europe and the southern part of the province is like a wedge driven into the great consuming section of the United States.  
The markets are provided. What Ontario needs is sensible marketing. That means co-operation. Co-operative marketing cuts out waste, increases production, lowers the price to the consumer and invigorates national life. Conditions in this province during the recent years of depression happily have been better than those in most other countries, and the standard of living here compares favorably with that in any other part of the world. The splendid results of co-operation in California should be an inspiration to the agricultural people of Ontario.—Hon. E. C. ### Sweden Declares War of Extermination

**STOCKHOLM, (Associated Press)—**Sweden has been asked to declare war of extermination on rats and mice. The militarists behind this project are the members of the Medical Board of Sweden. The board has submitted to the government a memorandum proposing that a bill be introduced in the present Riksdag to finance the war on rodents and points out the huge economic damage wrought by them. It is proposed to impose compulsory obligation on towns, villages, municipalities and rural communities to take steps for the killing of rats and mice and that the law extend to all ships and ship owners. ### Notice! TO INCOME TAXPAYERS!

Returns for the accounting period of 1921 will be due on March 31st, 1922. Persons whose returns are not filed with this department on or before the above date are hereby notified that the negligence penalty as provided by Section 2 of the Act to amend the Income Tax Act of 1918, shall be added to the assessment of all taxpayers who have not complied with Section seven of the Act. All others to whom forms have been sent under the Eighth section of the Act, as persons suspected as being liable to taxation, are bound to make returns even though they would have no tax to pay. For every default in not making returns under Sections 7 and 8 of the Act, the taxpayer and also the person or persons required to make return, shall each be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each day during which the default continues.

The penalties provided by the sections named apply to fiduciaries, executors, guardians and legal representatives; it also applies to all employers, corporations, associations and syndicates, who are required to forward returns for estates, &c.

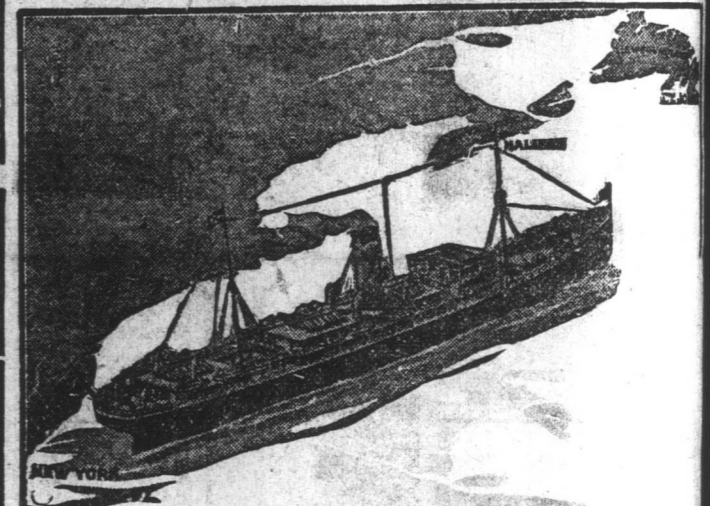
