

U.S. Counsel Was Stoned to Death

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—How Robert Imbrie, United States Consul at Teheran, was stoned to death by natives as he lay unconscious upon an operating table, was related to-day by Joseph Kornfeld, United States Minister to Persia, just resigned, who returned on the Leviathan with a report of the tragedy which he submitted to the State Department at Wash-

ington.

"In Teheran, as in most Persian cities," Mr. Kornfeld related, "there are numerous drinking fountains where there is stationed self-constituted attendants who, in the name of a Mohemmedan Saint, Abbas, solicit alms. At the time of the Imbrie affair there had gained wide circulation the story of a miracle that was reputed to have occurred at one of these fountains only a few weeks

before."
"The story was that a native approached the fountain to fill a gourd with water. "In the name of Abbas," asked the alms solicitor.

"No, in the name of Bahai," replied the gourd bearer. Straightway he was stricken blind for his blasphemy; then, when he dropped to his knees and recanted with a prayer of apology directed to the Saint Abbas, his

sight was restored.

The fountain became the gathering place of thronged thousands, who tied themselves to it and lapped up the trickling water or fought their way to it and prayed.

Clamored For His Life.

"Imbrie heard of this. One day he strapped on a camera, and, with his aide, Seymour, drove in a harouche to the miracle spot. Imbrie forced his way through the crowd to take a photograph. The natives surged around him clamoring, and he fied to the barouche and drove away.

"Behind the carriage the infuriated natives ran, shouting 'Stop him, the infidel has killed four of the faithful and poisoned the waters of the foun-

Although he was not wholly informed of events that immediately followed, said Mr. Kornfeld, the gist of conflicting reports was that the natives believed Imbrie's camera to be a weapon which silently dispatched

heart-

They overhauled Seymour in an alleyway where he had taken refuge, and mauled him, he continued. They pursued Imbrie into a tea store; they clubbed and stoned him until the police rescued him and carried him into a hospital.

Even then the outraged natives were not satisfied. They clamored for Imbrie's life in atonement to their Mohammedan Saint Abbas. They stormed the hospital, battered down the doors, and, finding Imbrie unconscious upon an operating table, tore the tiles from the floor and crushed out his life with them.

The State Department already was in possession of evidence supporting the story he related, said Mr. Kornfeld.

Turks Rush 3,000 Greeks to Prison

CONSTANTINOPLE POLICE TAKE POPULATION EXCHANGE INTO OWN HANDS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, October \$21.—
(United Press)—At the point of the bayonet, routing their victims from bed, the Turkish police have taken matters of exchange of populations with Greece into their own hands, and marched some 3,000 Greeks to imprisonment in the historic fortress of the Seven Towers.

The Greeks, who were hustled off without being permitted to bring along their belongings, included many who were not to be exchanged, but their protests fell upon deaf ears.

A child suffering from smallpox was dragged off to the fortress, old men and women were prodded along the road by armed envoys and in one instance a baker's boy, his hands and apron still white with flour, was hurried off to the prison.

The Greek population of Constantinople is terror-siricken as a result of the action of the police. The latter claim the Greeks seized belong to a category slated for exchange, and that they have delayed too long after obtaining passports. Many of the prisoners had no passports, however.

Strong protests have been made to the mixed Inter-Allied Commission, which has charge of the transfer of Greeks to Greece in return for Turks to Turkey, but the commission has been unable to check the arrests.

LONDON, Oct. 21.—(United Press)

—The Turkish legation here issued a statement regarding the wholesale arrest of Greeks at Constantinople declaring that those interned did not hold registration papers and therefore were not exempt from expulsion.
