





It is certain there was one staioned there a few years after, moreover a small Hospital was erected on the town site of Placentia, the site being near the present post office, and the Hospital was maintained for years. We may therefore conclude that the first Medical man and first Hospital in the Island were both French.

About the beginning of 1703 a permanent garrison was established in St. John's. This garrison was under the command of Major Lloyd, who apparently was a very poor specimen of numanity. He treated his soldiers badly, robbed them of their pay and did many other iniquitous things. A etition for his removal was sent to the Lords Commissioner for Trade and Plantation in London, and this petition contains the first reference. I can find, to a British Medical Man, for amongst the charges against Lloyd. which numbers seventeen, "the third




