He then in a few words proceeded to make an explanation of the purport of the second of the series of resolves, and moved that it be put upon its passage.

Mr Glathorne Hardy next rose and said that the Opposition intended to destroy the Irish Church. The Ministry wished to alter it for the better; but after the recent vote upon the first resolve, they would make no resistance to the succeeding one, or ask for a division upon its passage. The second resolve was then adopted. Mr Gladstone then moved the passage of the third resolve, and after some discussion and the proposal of various amendments—nearly all of which were rejected—it was adopted, in substance as follows:—Resolved, that an address be presented by the House, to Her Majesty the Queen, humbly praying that to prevent by legislation at this session, the creation of new personal interests through the use of the public patronage, she would be graciously pleased to place at the disposal of Parliament her interest in the temporalities of all the dignities and benefices of the Church of Ireland.
